MOTION NO.

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Introduced by DAVE MOONEY DIT

A MOTION relating to comprehensive surface water planning and management, watershed protection, and providing for the development of a Surface Water Utility in King County.

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WHEREAS, the King County Council passed Motion 1478 on March 11, 1974, which created a Surface Water Utility Board to determine the feasibility of establishing a Surface Water Utility in King County, and

WHEREAS, Motion 1478 required the Board to submit a report of its findings to the County Council, a copy of which is attached to this Motion, and

WHEREAS, the County Council, after reviewing and considering the Board's Report, deems further county implementing action both necessary and appropriate in the area of comprehensive surface water management,

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT MOVED by the Council of King County:

1. The King County Council hereby acknowledges receipt of the Surface Water Utility Report, dated October 1974, and approves the Utility Board recommendation, contained on pages 3 and 15 of the Report, that the county acknowledge the urgency of the surface water utility as a priority item for 1975 county energy and revenue.

2. The Council adopts as planning guidelines for the further development of a Surface Water Utility the criteria prepared by the Board, as set forth on pages 5 through 8 of the Report, which provides as follows:

(a) A Surface Water Utility should be county-wide in scope.

(b) Initial funding for planning and administration should come from the general fund, either through the creation of a revolving fund or through a "one-time, lump-sum" appropriation. (c) A substantial initial monetary investment will be required for planning and administration for the first 1 - 2 years. These costs cannot be recovered until the 3rd or 4th year of operation via the assessment of benefit charges.

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- (d) Four kinds of costs must be dealt with by the utility: (i) planning; (ii) administration;
 (iii) maintenance and operation; and (iv) capital costs.
- (e) Planning and implementation of proposals should proceed on a sub-basin by sub-basin approach. All sub-basins should be prioritized according to magnitude of the problems, thereby indicating which areas should be addressed first.
- (f) The public who will benefit from and pay for King County's surface water management service must be sufficiently informed and involved in the defining of solutions to water control problems in order to knowledgeably support the formation of a countywide utility. Therefore, additional public education on the nature of the problem and the proposed solution and meaningful opportunities for community input must occur within each sub-basin to effectively implement both the county-wide utility and sub-basin water management solutions.
- (g) The terms of the County Services Act (RCW 36.94) should guide the operation of the utility.
- (h) There are various revenue sources available to the utility, all of which should be pursued and used in combination - general obligation bonds, revenue bonds, service charges, §208 planning funds under Federal Water Pollution Control Act, §201 construction funds, and millage.
- (i) A county utility will have to be cognizant of the existence of related surface water managers cities and towns, special districts. Interlocal cooperation agreements should be utilized to effectuate cooperative and unified management.
- (j) Service charges should not be levied until each respective sub-basin plan is complete.
- (k) The utility should be governed by the County Council.
- (1) An administrative agency responsible for the utility's operations should be designated.

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- (b) Prepare alternative administrative and organizational structures for the implementation of operation of a surface water program.
- (c) Consult with other jurisdictions regarding related activities, including, but not limited to, the RIBCO Urban Runoff and Basin Drainage Study, the designation of an area-wide waste treatment management entity, and the initiation of drainage utilities by cities and towns within King County.
- (d) Arrange for the preparation of an Environmental Impact Statement assessing the environmental impact of the proposed action.

The above tasks shall constitute Phase II of surface water utility planning and shall be completed by December 31, 1975. 4. To insure the proper coordination of the next phase of surface water utility planning, the Council hereby establishes a Surface Water Utility Task Force, composed of representatives from the following departments and offices:

Department of Public Works

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Department of Budget and Program Planning

Department of Community and Environmental Development

Office of the Council Administrator

Office of the Prosecuting Attorney

Department of Health and Social Services

The responsibility of the Task Force will be to advise the Department of Public Works on Phase II activity.

5. The Council hereby requests the support of a citizens' committee of the Policy Development Commission to advise the Council throughout the planning and developmental stages of the Surface Water Utility.

Further, effective citizen involvement from each of the major sub-basin areas should be used to guide the development of the specific plans for each of these major areas.

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6. To complete Phase II activity, \$58,000 has been provided in Ordinance No. 2230, Section 49, Special Programs, Item 8, as follows:

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- \$31,000	Salaries and benefits for a full time Task Force Coordinator and an Administrative Assistant
- \$ 2,000	Office equipment, supplies and travel
- \$15,000	Consulting services for finance and administration studies and environmental assessments
- \$ 5,000	Department of Health and Social Services
- \$ 5,000	Council Administrator's Office

The Council further acknowledges the organizational responsibilities delineated herein and the appropriation are interim in nature and intended for the completion of Phase II studies. The identification of ultimate implementing arrangements and required appropriations are dependent upon Phase II studies and subsequent actions by the Council.

7. The Council requests the Department and the Task Force to submit a detailed work program and activity schedule for Council review by March 31, 1975, and report progress at least quarterly thereafter to the joint committees of Public Works and Transportation and Community and Environmental Development.
