Motion No. (CCC)

A MOTION relating to King County's areawide water quality management responsibilities and activities, setting forth guidelines for their implementation consistent with the objectives of the Areawide Water Quality Plan for the Cedar-Green Basins.

WHEREAS, the Congress passed the Federal Water Pollution Control Act of 1972 and recognized as a national goal that the Nation's waters should be "fishable" and swimmable" by 1983, and

WHEREAS, Section 208 of the Water Pollution Control Act calls for areawide waste treatment management planning, and

WHEREAS, the State of Washington designated METRO as the responsible agency for developing an areawide water quality plan for the Cedar-Green River Basins, and

WHEREAS, the Areawide Water Quality Plan for the Cedar-Green River Basins was prepared by METRO and adopted by the Metropolitan Council on January 19, 1978, and

WHEREAS, King County participated directly in the Areawide Water Quality Plan by preparing the Juanita Creek Basin Plan, and

WHEREAS, the Areawide Water Quality Plan established the development of adequate surface water drainage control programs as the primary water quality improvement objective within the region, and

WHEREAS, the Areawide Water Quality Plan also recognized fecal pollution, weeds and algae, and toxicant control as additional water quality problem areas, and

where where the basic policy of the Areawide Water Quality Plan is to rely on existing governmental units to deal with water quality problems rather than to create a new unit of government or to shift responsibility to other levels of governments, and

WHEREAS, the Areawide Water Quality Plan sets forth detailed responsibilities of specific agencies to achieve implementation of the Plan's objectives;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT MOVED by the Council of King County:

- 1. The purpose of this motion is to express King County's intent to assume and carry out certain responsibilities for implementing the Areawide Water Quality Plan for the Cedar-Green Basins. It is the County's goal to make substantial progress on each of the water quality management responsibilities herein identified within one year from the effective date of this motion.
- 2. King County hereby assumes the following responsibilities for surface water management:
 - a. Consider for adoption the Juanita Creek Plan and conduct the following activities as initial steps toward implementation of the plan:
 - develop a detailed management and financial program for implementation of the Plan, and
 - 2) establish priorities for the public acquisition of property and easements and for the construction of drainage facilities recommended in the Plan.

- b. Review the Areawide Water Quality Plan's evaluation of King County's runoff control program and comment on items labeled "insufficient" and either explain why the evaluation is inaccurate or, if the evaluation is accurate, develop a schedule for addressing each deficiency.
- c. Coordinate surface water management programs throughout the study area by:
 - 1) developing a procedure for establishing priorities in which subbasin surface water management programs should be prepared,
 - 2) developing and executing interagency agreements for coordinated runoff control among jurisdictions sharing common subbasins, and
 - developing a method to insure compatibility among local runoff controls, such as uniform standards regarding design storms, data collection, public survey techniques, runoff release rates, storm drainage computer simulation.
- d. Collect environmental base data in such a format that it can be disaggregated by drainage subbasins.
- e. Work with Metro to develop and conduct educational programs to broaden public and agency understanding of surface water issues.
- 3. King County hereby assumes the following responsibilities for weed and algae control:
 - a. Co-sponsor the aquatic weed control demonstration project in Union Bay.

- d. Establish with METRO and the King Sub-regional Council a uniform data reporting methodology (including information regarding sewerage needs, water quality, and land use) for use in determining short and long term sewage management needs and in preparing annual updates of the Areawide Water Quality Plan.
- 4. King County hereby assumes the following responsibilities for control of toxicants:
 - a. Assist METRO to explore the feasibility of developing emergency procedures for spill clean-ups on a regional and sub-regional basis. Coordinate the participation of fire districts in this process.

BE IT FURTHER MOVED,

- 5. Accountability for implementing the water quality management responsibilities is necessary to assure compliance with federal requirements and to provide a basis for additional funding. Therefore, King County will include in the annual budget and or capital improvement program an identification of the amount of resources allocated to activities which directly relate to implementation of the County's water quality management responsibilities. Particular emphasis should be placed on the identification of annual expenditures for the surface water management program and drainage control projects.
- 6. Successful implementation of the water quality management responsibilities identified in this Motion is dependent upon the cooperation and assistance of other parties integrated under the management framework of the Areawide Water Quality Plan. Proposed amendments to the Plan, such as those precipitated by State or Federal certification reviews, shall not
