

MOTION NO. 4929

A MOTION authorizing the County Executive to make a grant application for funds in the approximate amount of \$2,000,000 to support the Summer Youth Employment Program.

WHEREAS, the Department of Labor, Comprehensive Employment and Training Administration through the King Snohomish Manpower Consortium is empowered to make grants to support Youth Employment Programs for disadvantaged youth, and

WHEREAS, the Summer Youth Employment Program will assist the County in meeting the needs of the disadvantaged children.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT MOVED by the Council of King County:

1. The King County Executive is hereby authorized to make application for funds in the approximate amount of \$2,000,000 to the King Snohomish Manpower Consortium for the Summer Youth Employment Program on behalf of King County;

2. The King County Executive is hereby authorized to file and execute such application and enter into and execute such contracts as are required by the grantor;

3. The King County Executive is also authorized to enter into and execute such subcontracts as are necessary for the implementation of the project;

4. The Department of Labor and the King Snohomish Manpower Consortium are hereby assured full compliance with Title VI of the Civil Rights Act.

Summer Youth Employment Program (SYEP) 1980

4929

The Summer Work Training Program is administered by the King County Department of Youth Services. The program provides work experience, on-the-job training, career exploration, counseling, support services and education and training opportunities for approximately 2,000 low-income or disabled youth aged 14-21, residing in King County, outside of Seattle. The program is funded through the King Snohomish Manpower Consortium with federal CETA money. Program participants are paid \$3.10 per hour for working in non-profit or public agencies and learn basic work behaviors and work skills. Special projects serving schools and community organizations are set by the Work Training Program to provide jobs for participants. Participants go through a comprehensive eligibility interview and intake process to assure appropriate job placements. Extensive monitoring and quality control mechanisms are in place.
