MOTION NO. 5232

 A MOTION relating to the proposed 1982 Municipality of Metropolitan Seattle Budget.

WHEREAS, the Municipality of Metropolitan Seattle Council is scheduled to adopt the 1982 METRO Budget Resolutions for the water quality and transit programs on June 4, 1981, and

WHEREAS, the METRO Council has not yet evaluated or set priorities for the 1990 Transit Plan as required by METRO Resolution
3647, adopted by the METRO Council on March 19, 1981, nor adopted
productivity standards for increasing the number of passengers per
hour, nor studied alternative fare structures, and

WHEREAS, the proposed water quality budget is based upon a \$531 million scaled down water quality capital program and is a de facto adoption of the Renton 201 Plan and may violate environmental and public review standards, and

WHEREAS, the METRO Council is scheduled to complete a long-range study on water quality in September 1981, and

WHEREAS, a base budget with no increase in the fees, fares or sales taxes would provide adequate revenue to fund the transit and water quality operating and capital budgets in 1982, and

WHEREAS, the METRO staff has proposed a 10% increase in the average bus fare, an increase in the current sales tax rate in King County from 5.4% to 5.6%, and a minimum 45 cent increase in the sewer rate, and

WHEREAS, the present uncertain future of both federal and state funds for METRO capital and operating programs heightens the need for careful attention by local officials to the transit and water capital improvement and operating programs.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT MOVED by the Council of King County:

The METRO Council delay decisions to increase the revenue until the long-range capital plans and priorities for transit and water quality have been adopted by the Metro Council, including uniform water quality rate structure. It is the Council's policy and intent that prior to METRO incurring future financial and

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program obligations, the following major policy issues should be studied and resolved by action of the METRO Council.

1. TRANSIT

- a. The 1990 Transit Plan, adopted March 19, 1981, will be prioritized by October 1, 1981, and a 6-year Capital Program will be prepared for adoption by the METRO Council and updated annually thereafter.
- b. The METRO staff is directed to present to the METRO Council by October 15, 1981 alternative methods of increasing the productivity of transit service to 30 passengers per hour, such methods to include revised services standards and reallocation of unproductive routes.
- c. The METRO Council will study the revision of transit fares to include alternatives to the current two-zone system and the percentage of operating expenses to be covered by fare box revenues.
- d. The scope of work of the Downtown Transit Project improvements will include the financial and operational impact of this project upon the other transit corridors and planned system-wide investments.
- e. The PSCOG Light Rail Transit Feasibility study findings will be integrated into the scope of work for the Downtown Transit Project during the next phase of the technical, environmental and economic analysis and the review of the Downtown Transit alternatives.
- f. The Policy Management Committee and the Downtown Citizen's Advisory Committee memberships will be expanded to include membership from the government of King County and other METRO Councilmembers from outside Seattle, and that the Policy Management Committee will report regularly to the METRO's Transit Committee.

2. WATER QUALITY

a. The METRO Council shall adopt the Renton 201 Plan by

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September 1981 and determine the level of sewer rate increase and alternative water quality capital projects that are appropriate for the adopted METRO long-range Water Quality Plan.

3. REVISION OF THE 1982 METRO BUDGET

- Before October 15, 1981 the METRO Council will have completed the required studies and will determine if additional revenues are needed from an increase in the sewer rate, and/or increase in the fares and/or increase in the sales tax, and if a revision of the 1982 METRO Budget is necessary.
- b. The METRO Finance/Personnel Committee should develop a capital budgeting process which will allow the METRO Council to consider and adopt a six-year capital improvement program for both Transit and Water Quality Programs before June 15, 1982, and that the METRO Council direct METRO staff to prepare proposed transit and water quality program objectives and a six-year capital improvement program for both Transit and Water Quality prior to the review and adotion of the 1983 METRO Budget.
