MOTION NO. 5403

A MOTION relating to the current Subject-in-Process (SIP) Management Information System and future data and management information requirements for planned expanded jail facilities; authorizing the expenditure of budgeted funds; stating the Council's intentions regarding the content of quarterly reports to be submitted to the Council as required in Ordinance 5757, Section 36B.

WHEREAS, the Division of Systems Services with input from the Department of Rehabilitative Services and in conjunction with the Data Processing Program Review Committee (the Administration) has conducted a study relating to the data and the management information of the present and planned jail facilities; and

WHEREAS, the Administration, in pursuit of operational efficiency and inter-agency consolidation of support functions recommends that any SIP replacement system also resolve the administrative and operational shortcomings of SIP with respect to present and future data processing needs of the Prosecutor's office as described in the January 7, 1982 Prosecutor's Supplement to the Subject in Process (SIP) Replacement Report, and

WHEREAS, the Administration has stated its findings and recommendations in a study entitled Subject-in-Process (SIP)

System Replacement Report, dated September 28, 1981; and

WHEREAS, the Administration has concluded in the SIP Report that the current information system, developed in 1974 and implemented in 1976, is obsolete and inadequate to efficiently meet legal and operational requirements of the jail, and that the planned expansion of jail facilties scheduled for completion in 1984 will further exacerbate the deficiences; and

WHEREAS, certain functions performed by the Corrections

Division have been interpreted as being mandated by statute or regulation; and therefore, if not incorporated into an automated data processing system, must be performed manually at considerable

 cost in additional manpower; and

WHEREAS, the cost of additional manpower needed to perform the manual functions in the planned facility estimated to be \$1.2 million annually, will exceed that estimated for the development, implementation and operation of a rewritten automated system estimated at cost of \$4.8 million over a five year period; and

WHEREAS, the Administration has examined four alternatives to resolve the data processing issue; retain the current system with minimal modification; or, modify it to both accommodate additional physical facilities and accomplish certain functions now required to be performed manually; or, acquire an already automated jail management system being used by other local government agencies; or, redesign and develop a new Subject-in-Process system, using "state-of-the-art" technology; and

WHEREAS, the Administration recommends the development of a new SIP system as the most efficient alternative, and

WHEREAS, the Council, while allocating funds in the 1982 budget for the general design and development of a new SIP system, inserted a proviso in Ordinance 5757, Sec. 36B, requiring the executive to present total cost and benefits for a rewritten system for review and approval prior to the expenditure of budgeted funds; and

WHEREAS, the Administration presented the total cost and benefits of a rewritten system in the SIP System Replacement Report to the Council; and

WHEREAS, the Council historically has been critical of the current Subject-in-Process system, it having been designed and developed to meet the management information needs of the jail as part of a comprehensive criminal justice information system, the system now having been deemed inadequate in meeting its

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original and present objectives; and

WHEREAS, the present Subject-in-Process system does not detect accurately the daily jail population or provide an adequate source of information to assess the operations of the jail or certain principal aspects of management efficiency, and

WHEREAS, the present system's inherent lack of planned flexibility has resulted in substantial additional staff and fiscal costs to perform related manual processes, and

WHEREAS, there was inadequate user involvement and commitment during the planning stages in 1974 through 1976 in the present program which thus became impractical upon implementation in meeting planned objectives, and

WHEREAS, it is the Council's intent to insure that the estimated costs for the design, development, implementation and operation of the proposed rewritten system are not exceeded, since most costs associated with the planned jail facility have substantially increased compared to original estimates, and

WHEREAS, the Council is determined to assure that the investment of county funds in the design and development of a new Subject-in-Process system will result in the implementation of a system which is cost effective and sufficiently flexible meet present and anticipated future information management needs, and

WHEREAS, while the SIP System Replacement Report makes clear that proposed costs are preliminary estimates subject to revision, it is the Council's intent that cost estimates in excess of those stated in the Report will be strenuously examined by the Council and that they will not be accepted without Council review, and

WHEREAS, if reductions in the project's scope are necessary to adhere to the Council's intent, it is the responsibility of

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the Administration to fairly present alternatives which will maintain the system's design within present cost estimates to accomplish prioritized purposes, and maintain system flexibility to adapt to changing informational purposes in so far as it is practical, and

WHEREAS, the Council must be assured that the new SIP system includes user agency accountability, and it is therefore the Council's intent that a user committee be formed to ensure that management considers assessments of design elements affecting areas of processing which the users perform; and

WHEREAS, the SIP Report is based on Administration interpretation that the system will be designed to meet statutory and regulatory, as well as practical management requirements; and

WHEREAS, it is the Council's intent that the Subject-in-Process system, as finally implemented, will be dedicated to performing functions and producing reports directly relevent to efficient operation of the jail and meeting legally required reporting requirements;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT MOVED by the Council of King County:

- A. The expenditure of budget funds by the County Executive, allocated by Ordinance No. 5757, Section 36B, for the general design and development of a new Subject-in-Process management information system, is hereby approved.
- B. It is the Council's intention that later approval of funds beyond the general design and development phase, is subject to determination by the Council based upon a review of quarterly reports on the progress of the development of the SIP system, including changes in the project's scope, schedule, costs and benefits as furtherprovided for in Ordinance 5757.
- C. The required quarterly reports will be submitted to the Council not later than 10 working days following the end of each quarter.

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D. The following general format will be followed in the preparation of each quarterly report. The topics indicated in the format will be considered the minimum information desired by the Council and will not be construed as limiting information needed to properly assess project progress.

- 1. Overview. Central statement relating to
 - a. Development and design progress.
 - b. Changes to scope of project.
 - c. Meeting estimated cost objectives.
- d. Problems encountered or anticipated in meeting project objectives.

2. Cost Accountability

a. Revised cost estimates by user category (Jail, Prosecutors Office, etc.); and by key functional components within the user's category.

Seven key functional components involving the jail process of the proposed system have been identified and estimated costs for each function, as determined by preliminary study, are listed.

They will not be exceeded without prior Council approval.

The report will address each functional component of the jail process and Prosecutor's Office estimates with regard to adherence to or reducing the projected costs herein displayed:

- b. Alternatives, if any, to reduce or restrain costs, and
- c. Impact of alternatives in meeting project objectives and benefits to be achieved.

3. Planning Progress

- a. Update of work plan.
- b. Summary of progress in each phase of the work plan.
 - (1) Project Definition
 - (2) General Design
 - (3) Detailed Design and Development
 - (4) Implementation and Training.

4. User Participation

a. Status of implementing a SIP User Committee. In the first quarterly report, action taken to create and implement a user committee will be described. The purpose of this committee will be to ensure user participation in the planning and development of the revised SIP system by reviewing the proposed design

of the revised system from the standpoint of practicality and impact on user functions, criticizing proposals and offering alternatives to ensure that developing concepts take into consideration requirements of users. To carryout this function, committee members should canvass, and request comments and recommendation from other users within the units or offices they represent.

- b. Narrative report or minutes of committee meetings.
- c. Issues raised by the committee and progress of action to resolve issues with impact, if any, on scope, costs, or planning schedule.
- 5. Inter-Agency Consolidation or Interconnection
 The Administration will explore the feasibility of combining or interconnecting, the proposed SIP program with existing or planned management/data information systems of other law and justice agencies or units of governments. Progress of this study shall be addressed in the quarterly reports to the Council and will include the following elements:
 - a. What systems are being considered.
- b. Whether consolidation of the system or interface with the system is being considered.
- c. Impacts, if any, that consolidation or interface will have on the outcome of the SIP system design and implementation.
- E. In the design and development of the SIP system, a distinction will be made, for the sake of prioritization, between

1	functions performed or reports generated based on statutory or
2	regulatory requirements versus those meeting other administrative
3	requirements considered desirable but not required.
