A MOTION rescinding Motion No. 5892, and establishing and defining the composition and functions of the committees of the King County Council.

WHEREAS, the interests of the citizens of King County and the efficiency of the operations of the county council are best served by apportioning the duties and responsibilities of the council among several committees;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT MOVED by the Council of King County:

- Motion No. 5892 is hereby rescinded.
- В. The council may go into committee-of-the-whole at any Committee functions shall be to consider subjects of general interest including council personnel; budget review; appointments to boards and commissions; and reports from the executive branch.
- The chairman of the council shall appoint the chairman, vice-chairman and the membership of the standing committees. with consent of a majority of the councilmembers.

The standing committees are established as follows:

Economic Development -- Function

To consider policies related to the promotion of economic growth, publicly and/or privately sponsored employment and training programs. To act as liaison with public and private organizations intended to enhance economic growth, including the Port of Seattle, the Private Industry Council, the Economic Development District, state Department of Commerce, and the Economic Development Council. Special projects include council involvement in the business survey and the economic development plan and vacant land inventory projects.

2. Intergovernmental Relations -- Function

To review and make recommendations on the county
legislative work program and matters of joint interest between
King County and all other municipalities, the state of
Washington, the Puget Sound Council of Governments,
Municipality of Metropolitan Seattle (METRO) and the federal
government. Special projects include oversight of the county
1985 legislative work program, coordination of
interjurisdictional issues, and a review of the impacts of
proposed changes in state and federal programming and funding.

3. Finance -- Function

To review and make recommendations on the executive proposed budget, financial plan, revenue estimates, and Capital Improvement Program; to consider and make recommendations on all proposed supplemental appropriations, bond and investment proposals, and tax levies. Also to receive and examine reports of the county and/or state auditors and submit appropriate recommendations to the county council. Special projects include monitoring of the 1985 adopted budget, approval of public defender contracts, review of concilmanic bond proposal, and consideration of proposed county investment and financing policy changes.

4. Health, Housing and Human Services -- Function

To consider and make recommendations on matters relating to health, housing, welfare and human resource programs of King County. This includes all human resource policy planning and programming as it relates to the King County Housing Authority, Block Grant Program plan, Housing Assistance Program and Housing Rehabilitation policies. Special projects include review of the Comprehensive Health Policy planning efforts, Emergency Medical Services (EMS) levy proposal, and an assessment of the county's children's policies and programs.

5. Operations, Police and Judiciary -- Function

To consider and make recommendations on matters relating to King County personnel policies, Records and Elections, King County Charter amendments, criminal justice system policies and to oversee and receive reports from the Office of Citizen Complaints, and the Board of Equalization. Special projects include oversight of the new county jail and implementation of a new police patrol scheduling and allocation system, and enactment of a fair employment practices ordinance.

6. Planning and Community Development -- Function

To consider and make recommendations on land use policies which implement community plans, zoning code revisions and shoreline management. Also to consider and make recommendations on land use matters related to county-wide comprehensive land use policies and long-range planning for open space, resource lands, and rural and urban areas. Special projects include developing a committee recommendation for council adoption of the General Development Guide (GDG), and reviewing implementation strategies for the GDG.

7. Transportation and Facilities -- Function

To review and make recommendations on policies related to public works plans and operations, solid waste plans and operations, the county airport, the Kingdome, the Municipality of Metropolitan Seattle (METRO) transportation and facilities issues, and county space and facility requirements. Also to review and make recommendations on all matters relating to the establishment and vacation of county streets and roads; property sales; fire flow and water pressure standards; energy resource recovery and surface water utility facilities and other public works related fees and policies. Special projects include monitoring of county-wide space plans, assessing energy

resource recovery plans and options; oversight of computer systems long-range plan; and review of transportation plan updates, and solid waste system and Cedar Hills Site development plans.

8. County Processes -- Function

To review and make recommendations on matters relating to building permits and codes, permit process changes, CIP project management, and other major county internal operations. Also to consider cable television regulations and sewer and water comprehensive plans and franchises. Special projects include oversight of improvements to and potential reorganization of the permit process, consideration of new cable television regulations, and monitoring of major CIP project actions.

9. Committee-of-the-Whole -- Function

To consider issues of interest to the entire council that may include decisions on projects included in the 1985 Work Program; appointments to the state legislature, the executive branch and numerous boards and commissions.

- D. The date and time of standing committee meetings shall be determined by the chairman of each such committee. At least one day prior to the meeting, an agenda shall be posted outside the council chambers and shall include the time and place of the committee meeting. Any member of the council present at a meeting of any standing committee, though not a member thereof, shall be entitled to participate in the deliberations of such committee, but shall not be entitled to vote therein unless designated a member pro tem by the committee chairman.
- E. In order for a proposed ordinance or motion to be reported out by a standing committee, a majority of the membership of that committee must sign a majority recommendation. The majority recommendation of the committee may be "do pass," "do pass as amended," "do pass attached

substitute," "do not pass," "no recommendation," or "postpone indefinitely." Minority reports may also be submitted by one or more members of the committee. In the absence of the chairman and vice-chairman of a committee, a committee member, designated by the committee chairman, may serve as chairman of the meeting.
