MOTION NO. 6450

A MOTION establishing and defining the composition and functions of the committees of the King County Council and rescinding Motion No. 6185.

WHEREAS, the interests of the citizens of King County and the efficiency of the operations of the county council are best served by apportioning the duties and responsibilities of the council among several committees;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT MOVED by the Council of King County:

- A. Motion No. 6185 is hereby rescinded.
- B. The council may go into committee-of-the-whole at any time. The committee-of-the-whole shall consider issues of interest to the entire council that may include decisions on projects included in the 1986 Work Program; appointments to the state legislature, the executive branch and numerous boards and commissions; review of countywide budget and program policy matters; and review of agendas for council meetings.
- C. The chair of the council shall appoint the chair, vice-chair and the membership of the standing committees, and any special ad hoc committees with consent of a majority of the councilmembers.

The standing committees are established as follows:

1. County Processes -- Function

To review and make recommendations on matters relating to annexations; land development permits; building, fire, and plumbing codes; fire flow and water pressure standards; and on site waste disposal regulations. Also to consider permit process changes relating to public works department, building and land development division and the health department; and to

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oversee other major county internal operations. Also to consider sewer and water comprehensive plans and franchises. Special projects include oversight of improvements to, including potential consolidation of, the permit process; and review of Community Development Block Grant proposals and revisions to annexation procedures.

2. Economic Development -- Function

To consider public policies related to the promotion and financing of economic growth, publicly and/or privately sponsored employment and training programs. To coordinate with public and private organizations intended to enhance economic growth, including the Port of Seattle, the Private Industry Council, the Economic Development District, state Departments of Commerce and Community Development, and the Economic Development Council. Special projects include council involvement in the economic development plan and vacant land inventory projects, the King County economic development atlas and business revitalization program.

3. Finance -- Function

To review and make recommendations on the executive proposed budget, financial plan, revenue estimates, and Capital Improvement Program; to consider and make recommendations on all proposed supplemental appropriations, bond and investment proposals, and tax levies. Also to receive and examine reports of the county and/or state auditors and prepare appropriate recommendations to the county council. Special projects include monitoring of the 1986 adopted budget, and review of bond proposals, bond refunding recommendations, Zoo bond program implementation, budget policy revisions and capital project financing and budgeting issues.

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4. Health and Environment -- Function

To review and make recommendations on county health-related programs and facilities, and on environmental matters such as solid waste and water quality. Special projects include consideration of health department program, personnel and organizational policies, Harborview admissions policy and master plan; solid waste planning and operating issues including hazardous materials, energy resource recovery, and Cedar Hills landfill matters; and county water quality concerns such as regional water supply and resource planning, and secondary sewage treatment.

5. Operations, Justice and Human Services -- Function

To consider and make recommendations on matters relating to King County personnel policies; records and elections; cable television; criminal justice system policies including police operations; and human service issues such as mental illness, youth/children, and women's programs. Also to oversee and receive reports from the office of citizen complaints and the board of equalization. Special projects include oversight of the new county jail; implementation of police patrol improvements; monitoring the comparable worth study and affirmative action plan; consideration of new cable television recommendations, public defender contracts, business license code revisions, and human services and youth/children program plan and policy proposals (including the Youth Services Facility and Mental Health Plans).

6. <u>Planning, Housing and Community Development --</u> Function

To consider and make recommendations on community plans; zoning code revisions; shoreline management, and on housing policies and plans. Also to consider and make recommendations

on matters related to county-wide comprehensive land use policies and long-range planning for open space, resource lands, and rural and urban areas. Special projects include review of recommendations to implement the 1985 Comprehensive Plan such as the Open Space Plan, Road Adequacy Standards, wetlands and short plat regulations, and agriculture, forestry and rural zones ordinances. Also to examine the Affordable Housing Policy Plan.

7. Public Works and Parks -- Function

To review and make recommendations on policies related to public works and parks operations, the county airport, and the Municipality of Metropolitan Seattle (METRO) transportation issues. Also to review and make recommendations on matters relating to the establishment and vacation of county streets and roads; property retention and transfer; surface water management programs and other public works related fees and policies. Special projects include review of surface water utility proposal; oversight of computer systems long-range plan and the County Fair policies; and assessment of parks maintenance operating plan, parks rehabilitation program and parks rental/use procedures.

D. The date and time of standing committee meetings shall be determined by the chair of each such committee. At least one day prior to the meeting, an agenda shall be posted outside the council chambers and shall include the time and place of the committee meeting. Any member of the council present at a meeting of any standing committee, though not a member thereof, shall be entitled to participate in the deliberations of such

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committee, but shall not be entitled to vote therein unless designated a member pro tem by the committee chair.

E. In order for a proposed ordinance or motion to be reported out by a standing committee, a majority of the membership of that committee must sign a majority recommendation. The majority recommendation of the committee may be "do pass," "do pass as amended," "do pass attached substitute," "do not pass," "no recommendation," or "postpone indefinitely." Minority reports may also be submitted by one or more members of the committee.

F. In the absence of the chair and vice-chair of a committee, a committee member, designated by the committee chair, may serve as chair of the meeting.
