A MOTION adopting funding policies and a 1988-1990 expenditure plan for the Health and Human Services Fund.

WHEREAS, the population in the balance of King County is growing, with significant concentrations of low and moderate income individuals who rely on public support to meet their health care and human services needs, and

WHEREAS, in May 1987 the King County council held five public meetings throughout the county and conducted a survey of elected officials, government staff and community opinion leaders to assess health and human service needs, and

WHEREAS, common themes emerged from the meetings and surveys with regard to the need for additional health and human services and for the county to take a more active role in health and human services by providing leadership, and

WHEREAS, additional services most frequently mentioned include child care for low income parents, services for pregnant teenagers, primary medical care for the low income and transition services for women coming from abuse situations, and

WHEREAS, in response, in adopting the 1988 budget the council created a health and human services fund and earmarked new revenue to develop services for unincorporated area residents and encourage the development of regional systems of services funded by a variety of sources, and

WHEREAS, the amount of revenue in the new health and human services fund is estimated to be \$1.4 million in 1988, \$2.59 million in 1989 and \$2.7 million in 1990, and

WHEREAS, the council deferred spending such funds until the development and council approval of funding policies and an expenditure plan, and

WHEREAS, in January 1988 the council hired staff support and created a staff team for the purpose of preparing the policies and plan, and

WHEREAS, the council's health, housing and human services committee subsequently approved a five-month work program for the development of the policies and plan, and

WHEREAS, the committee has reviewed significant amounts of material to identify problems, to assess intervention strategies and decide how best to allocate the new funds and has provided ongoing direction to the staff, and

WHEREAS, in developing information for the committee, staff met with and obtained input from a variety of human service councils and coalitions and health and human service provider groups throughout the county, as well as county management and staff from the department of human resources and the department of public health, and

WHEREAS, during the course of its work, the committee decided to focus the new funds on prevention and early intervention services for children and their families, and

WHEREAS, based on committee direction, staff prepared proposed funding policies and a 1988-1989 expenditure plan, and

WHEREAS, in May 1988 the council held four public meetings throughout the county to hear testimony on the proposed policies and plan, and

WHEREAS, in light of the public testimony, on May 31 the council's health, housing and human services committee approved the proposed policies and plan, and

WHEREAS, the committee identified additional needs and findings, which fell outside the proposed policies and priority funding areas, but which merit further consideration or action, and WHEREAS, the committee identified projects appropriate for one-time funding with 1988 health and human services fund revenues not expended in 1988 due to timing of program startup; NOW, THEREFORE BE IT MOVED by the Council of King County: A. The attached funding policies for the health and human services fund are hereby adopted (Attachment A). B. The attached 1988-1990 expenditure plan for the health and human services fund is hereby adopted (Attachment B). C. The attached findings and recommendations developed by the committee are hereby adopted (Attachment C). ## FUNDING POLICIES FOR THE HEALTH & HUMAN SERVICES FUND

- Beginning in 1988 and every year thereafter, 23 percent of the additional two-tenths percent sales tax imposed in 1988 shall be used to provide health and human services to the residents of unincorporated King County. The estimated dollar amounts are \$1.43 million in 1988, \$2.57 million in 1989, and \$2.7 million in 1990.
- Health and Human Services Fund revenues shall support development of new or significantly enhanced services for unincorporated area residents but priority shall be given to:
  - a. the development of regional service systems for which local government and other appropriate funding sources are already identified; and
  - b. the development of new health and human service programs. The County shall take the lead in initiating the programs, but shall encourage over time participation from other appropriate funding sources.
- Funding shall be focused on services to children and families which prevent or solve a problem in its early stages and leads to selfsufficiency for the persons served.
  - a. First priority for funding shall be given to services which help to prevent problems for young children and their families.
  - b. Second priority shall be given to early intervention services for all children and families
- 4. Unless specifically directed by the Council, Health and Human Service Fund revenues shall not be used to supplant federal, state or local revenues. The revenues, however, may be used to leverage additional funds from those sources.
- 5. Health and Human Services Fund revenues shall not be used to fund Statemandated programs administered by the County, such as alcohol and substance abuse, mental health, developmental disabilities and involuntary treatment, unless:
  - a. the particular service falls outside the scope of the State mandate;
  - .b. is a high County priority; and
  - c. cannot realistically be obtained through increased advocacy at the State level.
- 6. Special efforts shall be made to reach and serve at-risk children and families who face additional barriers to meeting their needs due to cultural and linguistic differences, geographic isolation, concentration in low income communities or public housing projects or handicapping conditions.

## ADDITIONAL FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

 Community Development Block Grant projects that are losing funding in 1989 and are consistent with Health and Human Services Fund funding policies should be funded in 1989 by growth in Current Expense Fund revenues. They are:

0	Puget Sound Neighborhood Health Clinics	\$25,000
0	Eastside Services for Sexually Abused Children	\$30,000
0	R-House Youth Shelter (Issaquah)	\$50,000
0	Child Abuse Prevention Training for Childcare Providers (Childhaven)	\$45,664
0	Domestic Violence Victims Services	\$34,070

- The need for increased dental services for adults is critical, yet this need falls outside the Health and Human Services Fund funding policies. Adult dental services should be expanded in 1989 with growth in Current Expense Fund revenues.
- The County's senior population is growing, particularly outside of Seattle and in the older, increasingly frail age categories. The County should respond to this growth by:
  - o Increasing County advocacy for improvements in state and federal support for independent living services for the frail elderly as an alternative to or delay of long-term nursing home care, particularly during the 1989 state biennial session.
  - o Including from growth in Current Expense in the 1989 budget:
    - A pilot project for coordinating and bringing existing services to county housing authority senior projects where the majority of residents are now over 75 years old and in need of greater assistance.
    - Limited expansion of senior center activities at centers where increases in senior population and use justify additional support in accord with the existing senior center funding policy.
- 4. The County should continue support for the youth service bureau system in accord with the existing youth service bureau funding policy.

- 5. During 1990, the County should evaluate the performance of Health and Human Services Fund programs to determine whether priorities and funding levels should be adjusted in 1991 and beyond.
- 6. The County should advocate at the State level for:
  - Significant increases in funding for treatment of abused and disturbed children.
  - o Expansion of state medicaid coverage for pregnant women up to 185% of the poverty level.
  - expansion of state support for services necessitated by the Domestic Violence Act of 1984.
- The County should support federal child care legislation designed to assist low income and working poor families and improve the quality of child care.
- 8. The County should continue to work with METRO, other local jurisdictions, funding sources and service providers to better address the transportation problems of low income, elderly and disabled residents particularly in growing suburban and isolated rural areas.
- The County should enhance its capability to access, analyze and provide to county departments and other interested parties 1990 census data reflecting health and human service needs.
- 10. The County should recognize the need for increased legal advocacy service to prevent individual and family crises due to denial or loss of basic supports such as income and medical assistance and housing.
