A MOTION authorizing the Executive to negotiate agreements with cities for the transfer of certain park and recreation facilities.

WHEREAS, King County's multi-year financial plan in the 1990 adopted budget assumes county-owned neighborhood parks, community parks, athletic fields, activity centers, swimming pools, and recreation programs inside city boundaries will be transferred to the cities, and

WHEREAS, recent incorporation and annexations reduced county revenues needed to pay for discretionary services like parks and recreation, and

WHEREAS, cities have greater taxing authority to raise revenues for discretionary services like parks and recreation, and

WHEREAS, with the exception of certain regional facilities that serve a county-wide constituency, park and recreation facilities and programs serve local communities, and

WHEREAS, King County's obligations for new community park facilities in unincorporated King County have expanded and the county desires to ensure that park and recreation facilities are acquired and improved concurrent with other development, and these will require additional resources, and

WHEREAS, King County's obligations for regional services, particularly the major criminal justice services of courts, prosecution, public defense and jail, will require additional resources;

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT MOVED by the Council of King County:

A. The executive is hereby authorized to negotiate agreements with cities in King County to transfer in an orderly manner certain county-owned park and recreation facilities and prtrans4.mot

programs to the cities in which they are located. The agreements should conform, as closely as possible, to the following policies and priorities:

- 1. King County will retain ownership of and operational responsibility for regional parks and recreational facilities it currently owns inside cities except that, under special conditions in which cities guarantee through an executed agreement they will operate them as regional facilities, ownership of such parks or recreation facilities may be transferred to cities. For purposes of this motion, regional means the park or facility's service area is county-wide or greater. A preliminary list of existing and proposed parks, recreation facilities and trails in King County which have been determined to meet the definition of regional is provided in Attachment A.
- 2. King County will transfer to cities ownership of and operating/financial responsibility for all neighborhood parks, community parks and athletic field complexes, community swimming pools, and community centers. Alternatively, on an interim basis, cities may pay King County the net cost of operations and maintenance for the county to continue operating and maintaining the park or facility on behalf of the city.
- 3. Transfer of ownership will be without financial compensation but instead for mutual public benefit in the form of the following conditions to transfer as covenants to title: the property must be developed, maintained, and operated in perpetuity for park and recreation purposes; the city, its successors and assigns, may not limit access to the park so as to restrict usage by non-city residents and may never impose any fees or charges that are different for non-city residents than for city residents; and for athletic fields and activity centers, the city must provide for county organized activities, time and space as mutually agreed by the county and city. The transfer covenants for particular parks and recreation facilities shall reflect applicable policies of any adopted

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33 34 county parks and open space plan. In the event the city violates any one of these conditions, the title shall, with the county's consent, revert to the county.

- 4. First priority should be negotiation of agreements with the new cities of Federal Way and SeaTac, which together have the greater number of county-owned parks and activity centers inside city boundaries. The agreement should result in transfer of financial responsibility for operations and maintenance by January 1, 1993 and full transfer of title no later than January 1, 1994.
- 5. Second priority should be initiation of negotiations with the twelve cities containing county-owned and operated swimming pools with the objective of transferring full financial responsibility for the pools to the cities by January 1, 1994 and gradually reducing the county's financial obligations each year until that date.
- 6. Third priority should be completion of negotiations of an agreement with the City of Tukwila to transfer Fort Dent Park as authorized by King County Ordinance Number 8861 but only if the terms of the agreement ensure the city will continue to operate the park as a regional facility serving regional users.
- 7. Fourth priority should be negotiation of agreements with the cities of Kirkland, Des Moines, and North Bend for the transfer of the community parks and activity centers inside the cities boundaries.
- 8. Fifth priority should be the few remaining countyowned small parks in Bellevue, Redmond, and Kent.
- B. In the event and to the extent cities are unwilling to assume responsibility for the county-owned community park and recreation facilities within their boundaries, the King County council requests the executive to prepare and present a contingency plan to reduce the costs of operating and maintaining those facilities or to close some facilities, if
