A MOTION approving the projects for the Arts and Cultural Tourism and Enrichment Program and the Opportunity Grant Program for the Cultural Development Fund of King County.

WHEREAS, the King County arts commission and the King County landmarks commission are authorized by Ordinance 9279 to administer the Cultural Development Fund, and

WHEREAS, the King County arts commission and the King County landmarks commission received 175 applications requesting \$3,002,684 for the August 1, 1990 deadline of the Cultural Development Fund, and

WHEREAS, the recommendations for funding adhere to the guidelines approved by the King County Council in Motion 7955,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT MOVED by the Council of King County:

The following recommendations from the King County arts commission and King County landmarks commission for Cultural Development Fund programs are hereby approved:

Arts and Cultural Tourism and Enrichment Grants

A. Arts Projects

International Children's Festival \$10,000 for the 5th annual festival at Seattle Center which presents more than 100 performances by 12 companies from Japan, Sweden, China, England, Australia, Canada, the U.S. and South Africa, sponsored by the African National Congress.

Center on Contemporary Arts (COCA) \$13,732 for major exhibitions by local, national and international artists and the COCA Cabana Performances Series to take place at the downtown facility and an outdoor location in the Pioneer Square district.

The Empty Space Theatre and Alice B. Theatre \$20,000 for "Unkle Tomm's Kabin: A Deconstruction of the novel by Harriet Beecher Stowe" which examines 140 years of race relations in America. Performances are at the Empty Space Pioneer Square theatre facility and include post-performance discussions with invited guest speakers selected by African-American writer, J.T. Stewart.

Earshot Jazz Society \$20,000 for the Earshot Jazz Festival with performances at the Moore Theatre, Museum of History and Industry and the Theatre Off Jackson.

The Festival includes a two-day Asian Pacific mini-festival; seven major national acts; 10 Northwest acts; two student workshops; a "Jackson Street After Hours" roots-of-jazz

local show; and a free picnic concert at the Good Shepherd Center.

On the Boards and Pat Graney \$20,000 for "Faith"--a collaboration between choreographer Pat Graney, On the Boards, Jacob's Pillow Dance Festival in Lee, Massachusetts and the Helena Film Society of Helena, Montana. (The performance will premiere in Seattle and go on a national tour adding New York, Atlanta, San Diego and other cities.)

Seattle Opera \$20,000 for marketing "The Ring" to be performed in the summer

of 1991 at the Opera House. (Special ticket offers for tourists will be coordinated with

B. Heritage Projects

Bellevue Historical Society \$500 to publish 2,000 brochures highlighting historic landmarks and historic points of interest in Bellevue.

Snoqualmie Tribal Non-Profit Organization \$5,000 to support the first annual "Snoqualmie Indian Days"--a new, three day festival to feature Indian dance performances, a craft and food market, storytelling, demonstrations and workshops on Northwest Indian singing, dance, costume and instrument making, at one of two traditional Snoqualmie sites (Marymoor Park or McDonald Park).

<u>Deborah and George Green</u> \$6,000 toward a historically accurate exterior restoration of the Beall Family Home in Vashon, a registered King County Landmark.

<u>Northwest Seaport</u> \$7,000 toward the production and county wide distribution of 20,000 brochures on *Maritime Heritage Resources*, highlighting maritime heritage organizations, facilities, events, tours and resources throughout King County.

Esther Hall Mumford \$7,482 to support research, writing and publication of 10,000 guidebooks on geographic sites associated with African Americans in King County including historical, architectural and artistic references, for county wide distribution.

Opportunity Grant Program

A. Arts Projects

Northwest Asian American Theatre \$4,000 for Winter Fest '91 with Asian American and multi-ethnic performing artists from the West Coast at the Theatre Off Jackson. The Los Angeles improvisational group, Cold Tofu, will also conduct a workshop with local Asian American actors.

<u>Artists Unlimited</u> \$2,128 for the community integration of artists with disabilities at Pratt Fine Arts Center which will result in a public exhibition of their visual art works.

Echo Glen Children's Center \$1,250 for artistic and cultural programs that promote the value of cultural diversity within Native American, African-American and Latino cultures conducted by Echo Glen youth, teachers, community members and participating artists.

B. Heritage projects

United Indians of All Tribes Foundation \$750 for post-production costs of a 30 minute video of the 1990 Seafair Indian Days Pow-wow at Discovery Park which will be permanently installed at the Sacred Circle Gallery of Native American Art, featured at cultural festivals, made available to school districts throughout King County and shown on local television stations.

Marymoor Museum \$2,100 to produce a new one-act play based upon the lives of selected women in the Eastside's history (drawn from materials collected in the Eastside Women's Oral History Project) to open at the "Women Making History Conference" at the Marymoor Museum and tour to the Issaquah Senior Center and Bothell Senior Center.

Wing Luke Memorial Foundation \$3,608 to support research, interpretation and installation at the Wing Luke Museum of the ethnic history exhibit, *East Meets*Northwest, which will focus on Asian and Pacific Islander Americans.

Ron Chew \$6,450 to support the development and production of the *Chinese Oral History Project.*, which will document the history of the early Chinese community in Seattle-King County by interviewing and photographing up to 100 Chinese pioneers, creating a community archive of collected materials, developing a book manuscript and preliminary exhibit storyline to be used in Phase II of this project.
