4 A MOTION approving projects for the Arts and  
5 Cultural Tourism and Enrichment Program and the  
6 Opportunity Grant Program from additional funds  
7 in hotel/motel tax revenues appropriated to the  
8 Cultural Development Fund

9 WHEREAS, the King County Arts Commission and the King County Landmarks  
10 Commission request an additional appropriation of \$459,908 in hotel/motel tax  
11 revenues to the Cultural Development Fund, and

12 WHEREAS, the recommendations for funding adhere to the guidelines  
13 approved the King County Council,

14 NOW THEREFORE, BE IT MOVED by the Council of King County:

15 The following recommendations from the King County Arts Commission and King  
16 County Landmarks Commission for Cultural Development Fund programs are hereby  
17 approved:

18 **Arts and Cultural Tourism and Enrichment Grants**

19 **1.A. Arts Projects (\$100,000)**

20 Seattle Children's Museum \$20,000 for outreach workshops and half-day  
21 events designed for community centers in low income and rural parts of King County.

22 Intiman Theatre Company \$20,000 for the world premiere of the epic nine part  
23 play, "The Kentucky Cycle" by Robert Schenkkan. The six hour production (performed  
24 in two parts on consecutive evenings) explores the themes of poverty, sexism and  
25 racism and was developed in workshops at the Mark Taper Forum in Los Angeles and  
26 the Robert Redford Sundance Playwright's Institute.

27 League of Fringe Theaters (L.O.F.T.) \$15,000 for "The Other Broadway:  
28 Seattle's 1st Annual Fringe Theatre Festival" which will present 27 performing groups  
29 and individuals in a variety of locations in the Capitol Hill region of Seattle.

30 Performance Support Services \$15,000 for the 6th annual Allegro! Dance  
31 Festival which includes 23 artists in 11 concerts/46 performances at Broadway  
32 Performance Hall, Meany Hall and Washington Hall.

1           Henry Art Gallery \$10,000 for "Waves and Plagues" Masami Teraoka"--a  
2 traveling national exhibition organized by the Contemporary Museum in Honolulu  
3 which includes 33 recent, large-scale paintings by noted Japanese American artist  
4 Teraoka and and features a lecture series and exhibition catalogue.

5           Seattle Men's Chorus \$10,000 for "Of Rage and Remembrance" by composer  
6 John Corigliano with text by William Hoffman for a world premiere of a work written by  
7 a composer of international stature. The Chorus will be accompanied by an 80-  
8 member ensemble from the Seattle Symphony with a performance at the Opera  
9 House.

10           Highline Community College \$5,000 for the Ethnic Artist Sunday Family Series  
11 which includes cultural diverse regional and national performances in music, dance,  
12 theatre and puppetry at the Artists-Lecture Center on campus.

13           Business Volunteers for the Arts \$5,000 for a winter arts festival feasibility  
14 study. In partnership with the visitor industry, the BVA/Marketing the Arts Task Force  
15 will package cultural activities during the 1992 winter season to attract visitors from the  
16 northwest region and county wide residents.

1                   **1.B. Facility related projects (\$194,151)**

2                   911 Arts Media Center \$41,000 for video production equipment and exhibition  
3 materials for King County media artists and renovation of the film and video  
4 exhibition/screening space, including 504 accessibility and fire code upgrades.

5                   Village Theatre \$40,000 for theatre district design in historical downtown  
6 Issaquah in cooperation with the Issaquah Historical Society, the City of Issaquah, and  
7 the downtown business community. Support is for professional services for  
8 architectural design, feasibility study and public opinion survey.

9                   Seattle Repertory Theatre \$30,000 for completion of the Bagley Wright Theatre  
10 Center, a smaller second theatre located adjacent to the south wall of the theatre,  
11 which will used for productions by the Tony award winning Seattle Repertory Theatre  
12 and King County performing groups and non-profit organizations.

13                   Seattle Art Museum \$28,791 for 504 implementation for the Volunteer Park and  
14 new downtown facilities. Equipment, publications and services will make exhibitions  
15 and programs accessible to a wide range of special needs audiences.

16                   Local Improvements for Enumclaw \$20,000 for design costs of the Enumclaw  
17 Community Center auditorium.

18                   City of Kent Parks and Recreation/Kent Arts Commission/City of Kent  
19 Performing Arts Center Task Force \$15,000 for a comprehensive cultural plan and  
20 feasibility study of a cultural arts center in Kent.

21                   City of Redmond Arts Commission \$15,000 for a Redmond arts facility needs  
22 assessment.

23                   Valley Community Players \$4,360 to purchase lighting equipment for the Carco  
24 Theatre in Renton.

1                   **2. Heritage projects (\$81,880)**

2                   Vashon Allied Arts \$30,000 toward the historically accurate exterior renovation  
3 of the Oddfellows Hall, a registered King County Landmark also known as the Blue  
4 Heron Center for the Arts.

5                   Puget Sound Railway Historical Association \$20,000 toward a feasibility study  
6 for the Puget Sound Railway Museum.

7                   Seattle Architectural Foundation \$13,800 to develop *Viewpoints*, a  
8 comprehensive program of local walking and driving tours of Seattle and environs to  
9 be developed on a regularly scheduled basis throughout the year.

10                  Museum of History and Industry \$6,500 toward the development and  
11 production of a new living history play commemorating the 1890's. *Living at the Turn*  
12 *of the Century* will be written by Nikki Nojima Louis, performed at MOHAI, adapted for  
13 county wide touring, and augmented by teacher training materials.

14                  Black Diamond Historical Society \$6,000 to construct a new audio-visual room  
15 and purchase equipment for on-going museum slide shows and videos on mining and  
16 cultural life in the Green River coal fields area.

17                  Shoreline Historical Museum \$3,080 for the publication of 5,000 maps of  
18 historic sites and features of the Shoreline area for wide distribution.

19                  Neely Mansion Association \$2,500 to construct an historically appropriate  
20 exterior emergency staircase on the Neely Mansion, a registered King County  
21 Landmark located in Kent.

1 **Opportunity Grant Program**

2 **1. Arts projects (\$71,485)**

3 Rakumi Arts \$20,000 for "Perspectives on South African Arts and Culture"  
4 which will bring prominent South African artists in film, music, theatre, literature and  
5 visual arts to King County and to assist local arts organizations to plan for a larger  
6 festival in conjunction with Black History Month.

7 Intiman Theatre Company \$20,000 for Intiman Off-Center: a research and  
8 development initiative for northwest theatre artists. Two labs combining four weeks of  
9 rehearsals and performances open to the public will be produced in a rented space  
10 off-site from the Intiman Playhouse.

11 Pratt Fine Arts Center \$7,000 for a Martin Puryear residency: advanced  
12 sculpture workshop and open lecture. Mr. Puryear was the winner of the prestigious  
13 1989 20th Sao Paulo Bienal, where he was the first African American to represent the  
14 U.S. at a major international art exhibition.

15 Seattle Mime Theatre \$6,300 for a multi-disciplinary arts camp and  
16 performances for communities and youth in under-served areas of King County. Local  
17 sponsors include: Black Diamond Library, Algona-Pacific Library, White Center  
18 Library, Enter Act Theatre in North Bend and Redmond Parks.

19 South East Effective Development (S.E.E.D.) \$6,000 for the Columbia City  
20 monument project to acquire and install a major public artwork by Native American  
21 sculptor, Marvin Oliver at the Columbia Library Park.

22 Reflex Magazine \$4,685 for the Reflex Broadsides Project to develop and  
23 produce a series of inter-disciplinary collaborative artist projects on social or political  
24 themes to appear in Reflex magazine and be posted publicly throughout King County  
25 and in Portland, Oregon.

26 Raven Chronicles/Philip H. Red-Eagle \$4,500 for the Raven Chronicles--a  
27 quarterly multicultural magazine promoting art, literature and the spoken word.

28 Seattle Youth Symphony Orchestra \$3,000 for "Saving Our Orchestras" which  
29 includes instruction on four instruments (the oboe, bassoon, French horn and string  
30 bass) in several King County middle schools.

2. Heritage projects (\$12,392)

Wing Luke Memorial Foundation \$7,392 to augment the original allocation and bring the project to full funding of the requested amount which supports the ethnic history exhibit *East Meets Northwest* at the Wing Luke Museum.

Southwest Seattle Historical Society \$5,000 to support the development of a rough edit of the video "Chords of Change: The Life and Music of Earl Robinson" to be directed and produced by Bette Jean Bullert.
