MOTION NO. 8175

A MOTION adopting King County's 1991 State Legislative Program.

WHEREAS, the 1989 and 1990 sessions of the Washington State Legislature provided King County with new regulatory tools and/or funding sources to meet the needs of its citizens, especially in the areas of growth management, criminal justice and mental health, and

WHEREAS, King County has used its new authorities to enact implementing measures that carry out the Legislature's intent, including, but not limited to: (1) Imposition of a motor vehicle excise tax and impact fees to fund roads; (2) Augmentation of the sales tax and motor vehicle excise tax to support criminal justice activities; and (3) Reorganization of the local system for delivering mental health services, and

WHEREAS, King County has used existing authorities to respond to other critical needs, including, but not limited to: (1) Adoption of an ordinance protecting environmentally sensitive areas; and (2) Allocation of discretionary County moneys as stopgap responses to the crisis in housing and to the huge unmet need for services to children and their families, and

WHEREAS, King County, in its role as the only elected county-wide government, has convened a "summit" of local elected officials to develop a proposal for a new system of governance within the county, and

King County, in taking these actions, has demonstrated its willingness and capacity both to implement Legislative intent as it is expressed and to provide leadership as new issues emerge, and

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WHEREAS, King County, recognizing that all of these initiatives are "works in progress" which will require further cooperation between the State and the County, has developed a 1991 Legislative Program, and

WHEREAS, King County will continue to review legislative developments for possible revision of its 1991 Legislative Program;

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT MOVED by the Council of King County, the King County Executive concurring:

The specific objectives set forth in this Motion are King County's highest priorities for passage during the 1991 Session of the Washington State Legislature.

REGIONAL GOVERNANCE

o LOCAL DECISION-MAKING ON METRO GOVERNANCE ISSUES. Elected officials representing King County, the City of Seattle and the Suburban Cities Association should be allowed to continue the cooperative process they have established for addressing the governance issues raised by the recent Federal District Court decision that the composition of the METRO Council is unconstitutional.

GROWTH MANAGEMENT

- o REGIONAL DECISION-MAKING ON LAND USE AND TRANSPORTATION ISSUES. King County seeks legislation to allow Puget Sound Counties and Cities wide latitude in developing interlocal agreements governing regional land use and transportation planning.
- o CONSISTENCY OF LOCAL GOVERNMENT PLANS. King County seeks legislation which would require local governments within a county to develop a process for ensuring that their comprehensive plans are consistent with one another and meet the goals of SHB 2929.
- o STATE AND SPECIAL DISTRICT CONSISTENCY WITH COMPREHENSIVE PLANS. King County seeks legislation to require that plans and capital budgets developed by State agencies and special

districts be consistent with local and regional comprehensive plans and development regulations.

- o ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT IN UNDERSERVED REGIONS. King County seeks legislation to promote economic development in areas that lag behind statewide growth averages.
- o DISTRICT-WIDE IMPOSITION OF SCHOOL IMPACT FEES. King
 County seeks legislation to require that development impact
 fees for common school construction be imposed district-wide.
- o STABLE SOURCES OF REVENUES FOR COMMON SCHOOL CONSTRUCTION.

 King County seeks legislation which would lead to increased funding from more stable revenue sources for the Common School Construction Fund.

LAW AND JUSTICE

- O IMPROVED OPERATION OF THE KING COUNTY SUPERIOR COURT. Kind County seeks legislation which would: 1) Authorize the addition of twelve judges to be phased in by 1994; 2) Place a constitutional amendment on the ballot to remove the restriction on the number of court commissioners; 3) Eliminate statutory provisions as to the number of court reporters required; and 4) Provide concurrent jurisdiction to the district courts over anti-harassment cases.
- o IMPROVED OPERATION OF KING COUNTY DISTRICT COURTS. King County seeks legislation to increase the number of district court judges from 24 to 26 positions.
- o JAIL CONSTRUCTION. King County will continue to explore funding mechanisms to meet its jail construction and operational needs.

CHILDREN AND FAMILIES

o AN INTEGRATED SERVICE SYSTEM. King County is developing and implementing a program of integrated services for children and their families. The County urges the state to work with it in establishing funding requirements and implementation phases for state-supported components of the program, including child welfare, mental health and substance abuse.

o FUNDING TO REDUCE INFANT MORTALITY. King County seeks a state budget that provides funds for the Community Health Outreach Workers Program, the Women Infants and Children Program, and the High Priority Infant Tracking Project to reduce infant mortality.

- o HOUSING FOR AT RISK YOUTH. King County seeks legislation to provide additional residential options for homeless and runaway youth.
- o IMPROVEMENTS TO THE CHILD CARE PROGRAM. King County seeks legislation that would: 1) Increase the availability of child care; and 2) Improve the state's monitoring of child care facilities by expanding its inspection and licensing services.

MENTAL HEALTH

o CONTINUED COMMITMENT TO MENTAL HEALTH REFORM. King County seeks legislation that would continue the State's commitment to reform the mental health system by funding: 1) Expansion of community based services provided to the chronically mentally ill by regional support networks; 2) Expansion of local capacity to meet the state-mandated goal of serving 85% of short-term involuntary commitments within King County by 1993; 3) Increases in hospital reimbursement rates to retain in the system facilities that serve short term involuntary and voluntary hospitalizations; 4) Permanent housing with community support services for the mentally ill; and 5) Salary increases and other incentives needed to hire and retain qualified mental health professionals.

ADEQUATE SERVICES FOR MENTALLY DISTURBED CHILDREN. King 1 County seeks a state budget which: 1) Expands capacity within 2 the system to meet the needs of mentally disturbed children 3 currently unable to obtain service; and 2) Expands the service 4 options tailored to children, including early intervention, 5 crisis response, intensive case management, day treatment and 6 7 outpatient counseling. SUBSTANCE ABUSE 8 RESTORATION OF SERVICES. King County seeks a state budget 9 that restores the grant-in-aid program for substance abusers to 10 11

- the level funded by the Legislature in the 1987-89 biennium.
- EXPANSION OF INPATIENT SERVICES. King County seeks a state budget that provides additional treatment beds for alcohol and chemically dependent low income youth and families.
- RESTRICTIONS ON FORTIFIED WINE. King County seeks legislation that would place restrictions on the sale of fortified wine.

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DISCOURAGING ALCOHOL ABUSE. King County seeks legislation that would ban the promotion of alcoholic beverages and discourage the consumption of alcohol.

PUBLIC HEALTH

- MAINTENANCE OF FUNDING LEVELS. King County seeks a state budget that maintains at least the current level of funding for public health services.
- INCREASED AIDS EFFORTS. King County seeks a state budget that increases funding levels for Regional AIDS Service Networks.

DEVELOPMENTAL DISABILITIES

FUNDS FOR AN ADEQUATE LEVEL OF SERVICES. King County seeks a state budget that contains adequate funding to provide: 1) Transition services for developmentally disabled students leaving school; 2) Comprehensive services for infants 0 to 3 years of age who are currently unserved; 3) Services which enable families to maintain developmentally disabled children

in their homes; and 4) Vendor rate increases for community based day program providers.

- o SERVICES FOR THE UNSERVED. King County seeks legislation that would require development of a plan to provide services to the approximately 3,300 individuals in the state who are on waiting lists and receiving no services.
- o LOCAL ADMINISTRATION OF COMMUNITY RESIDENTIAL SERVICES.

 King County opposes any efforts to displace the County as the administrator of the community based residential services program for the developmentally disabled.

HOUSING

- o STABLE FUNDING FOR HOUSING PROGRAMS. King County seeks legislation to provide a permanent, stable funding source for the Housing Trust Fund.
- o ASSISTANCE TO RELOCATING MOBILE HOME PARK TENANTS. King County seeks legislation to assist mobile home park tenants threatened by displacement because of park closures by: 1) Conferring upon housing authorities, tenant groups and nonprofit agencies a first right of refusal on the purchase of parks that are being sold for redevelopment; and 2) Providing funds for emergency relocation assistance to tenants evicted during the period the Mobile Home Relocation Assistance Act is under appeal.

TAXATION

o AN EQUITABLE APPROACH TO PROPERTY TAX RELIEF. King County urges that any legislation to reform the property tax system be founded upon sound public policy which: 1) Does not erode local government's ability to provide service; 2) Does not have the effect of shifting the tax burden to people least able to pay; 3) Is equitable to all taxing districts; 4) May be implemented without undermining the assessment process; and 5) Reimburses the County for any lost revenues or any costs associated with implementation.

1	o REFORM OF THE SENIOR AND DISABLED EXEMPTION. King County
2	seeks legislation which: 1) Increases the maximum income
3	level at which senior citizens and disabled persons may qualify
4	for deferral of and/or exemption from the payment of property
5	taxes; and 2) Excludes expenditures for home health care and
6	prescription medicines from the definition of eligible income
7	levels.
