## MOTION NO. 8190

MOTION requesting the King C cutive to complete a housing County Α to complete a executive levv proposal in cooperation with the City of Seattle, suburban city and King County Council representatives and submit the proposal for Council consideration by May 1, 1991.

WHEREAS, the cost of housing has grown twice as fast as income over the past decade, significantly increasing the number of households unable to afford adequate housing, and

WHEREAS, federal support for housing assistance programs for 12 low income individuals and families has declined 80% over the 13 same period, greatly reducing the production of low income 14 15 housing, and

WHEREAS, the private sector cannot provide housing which is 16 affordable to low income people without substantial assistance 17 from the public sector, and 18

WHEREAS, there are now 85,000 households in King County who 19 cannot afford adequate housing without assistance, and 20

WHEREAS, low income households are projected to increase by an additional 30,000 during the next decade, with three quarters of this increase occurring outside of the city of Seattle, and WHEREAS, there are about 28,000 existing low income housing units in King County, three quarters of which are in Seattle, and

WHEREAS, by the year 2000 it is projected that half of the households needing housing assistance will live in the county outside of Seattle, and

WHEREAS, existing low and moderate income housing continues 30 to be lost due to commercial development and conversion to higher 31 32 income use not only adding further to the gap in low income housing but also separating low income service workers from the

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communities in which they work and placing increasing numbers of people at risk for homelessness, and

WHEREAS, over 6,000 households are at risk of displacement over the next few years due to expiring use restrictions on federally subsidized rental projects and conversion of mobile home parks, and

WHEREAS, the demand for emergency shelter for homeless individuals and families continues to increase throughout the county, and

WHEREAS, King county has accepted responsibility for 10 providing treatment and support services for a number of special 11 needs groups including persons with mental illness, developmental 12 disabilities and alcoholism and substance abuse and runaway 13 14 youth, and

15 WHEREAS, persons with special needs are most at-risk for homelessness due to their disabling conditions and very low 16 17 income, and existing service funding is neither sufficient nor appropriate to apply to the capital cost of housing, and 18

WHEREAS, the King County Affordable Housing Policy Plan was 19 adopted in 1987 as part of carrying out the goals of the King 20 21 County Comprehensive Plan, and

WHEREAS, the first policy in the Affordable Housing Policy 22 Plan is to increase the supply of housing affordable to very low income households, and the accompanying strategy and work program give priority to development of a bond issue or levy proposal for 25 26 that purpose, and

27 WHEREAS, the development of a plan for financing low income 28 housing has, therefore, been in the executive work program for several years, and 29

30 WHEREAS, the county council adopted Motion No. 7910 in April 31 of 1990 approving the work program for the Regional Affordable Housing Finance Plan to be developed with the oversight of an 32 appointed Regional Working Group, and 33

WHEREAS, the Regional Working Group has completed the 34 35 proposed plan, which recommends asking King County voters to

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approve а nine-year \$147.5 million levy to finance the acquisition, rehabilitation and construction of at least 2,200 affordable housing units for low-income and homeless individuals and families and for persons with special needs, as well as the necessary housing-related services, and

WHEREAS, the Regional Working Group submitted the proposed plan to the county executive in September 1990, and

WHEREAS, the Human Services Roundtable, including representatives of King County, the City of Seattle, suburban cities and United Way, reviewed the proposed plan prior to its submission to the county executive and voted to support the recommended housing and related services levy proposal, and

WHEREAS, the County executive has solicited comments on the 13 14 proposed plan from the City of Seattle, suburban cities and other interested parties and intends to develop a final housing levy 1.5 proposal for Council consideration based on those comments, and 16

WHEREAS, the county council finds there is a need to 17 expedite the final review and refinement of the housing levy 18 proposal by all of the affected parties in order to be able to 19 give due consideration to placing a levy proposal on the ballot 20 21 in the fall of 1991;

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NOW, THEREFORE BE IT MOVED by the Council of King County:

The county executive is hereby requested to complete 1. development of a specific housing levy proposal and submit it to the council together with an implementing ordinance by May 1, 25 1991.

The county executive is further requested to refine and 27 2. 28 finalize the levy proposal in a cooperative process with county council, City of Seattle and Suburban Cities Association 29 representatives. The process should also provide for discussion 30 31 with the key interest groups involved in the development and provision of housing and related support services for low income 32 33 households.

3. The King County council acknowledges that the Regional 34 Affordable Housing Finance Plan was developed with extensive 35

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involvement of local elected officials and staff, experts in low income housing financing, development and operations, and housing and human services advocates. Accordingly, the Council expects refinement of the program and implementation proposals as opposed The Council requests refinement on the to major revisions. following specific areas: 1) the linkage between the housing levy program and the county's categorical human service programs to take advantage of the opportunities to improve results by combining efforts and to prevent problems due to lack of support; 2) the composition, selection, and duties of the oversight board in light of the regional governance summit particularly discussions, and 3) the relationship to the state Housing Trust Fund and to federal housing programs newly combined under the Cranston/Gonzales National Affordable Housing Act of 1990.
