8215 MOTION NO.

A MOTION related to mass mailings at county expense by councilmembers; defining mass mailing, and restricting mass mailings by individual councilmembers during certain periods of years in which their terms expire.

WHEREAS, because communication by elected representatives with their constituents is a vital part of the democratic process, councilmembers have the privilege and the responsibility of providing information to the public regarding the issues facing them and the activities of county government, and

WHEREAS, the use of mail as a means to foster that communication has grown in recent years along with the development of sophisticated information retrieval and mass mailing technologies, and

WHEREAS, there exists a potential for the abuse of the privilege of publicly funded constituent correspondence if it is used for the purpose of targeting voters rather than communicating with the public, and

WHEREAS, this motion is necessary to reduce the risk that public funds will be used in an inappropriate manner while ensuring that effective communication between the public and its elected representatives continues;

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT MOVED by the Council of King County: 27 A. No councilmember shall send any mass mailing in any 28 year in which an election is to be held to fill such -29 30 councilmember's office which is deposited in the mail between 31 June 30 and election day. For purposes of this motion, "mass mailing" means any mailing of more than two hundred pieces 32 which contain essentially identical messages and which is 33 prepared or sent by or on behalf of an individual councilmember 34 35 at county expense.

B. The purpose of this motion is to regulate mass mailings by councilmembers to reduce the risk of abuses of the process of constituent correspondence. Since such abuses could occur as the result of mailing by other elected officials, the council requests that other county elected officials adopt rules to regulate their own conduct consistent with this motion. The council will review the adequacy of such rules during 1992 to consider whether to adopt an ordinance which would establish a mass mailing standard which would apply to county elected officials generally, including the executive branch.

C. The council administrator shall enforce the provisions of this motion through supervision of mass mailings.
