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MOTION NO. 3344

A MOTION approving the proposed regional housing levy program, setting a target date for the levy election and requesting educational presentations to key community groups.

WHEREAS, the King County council recognized the need to take action to deal the with growing lack of affordable housing by adopting the affordable housing policy plan in 1987, and

WHEREAS, the first policy and accompanying work program in the affordable housing plan commits the county to work to increase the supply of housing affordable for low-income households at greatest risk for homelessness by completing a low-income housing financing plan, and

WHEREAS, housing needs assessments completed in 1989 and 1990 showed that the cost of housing had grown twice as fast as income over the previous decade resulting in an estimated 85,000 low-income households in King County unable to afford adequate housing without assistance and only 28,000 low-income housing units available, three quarters of which are in Seattle, and

WHEREAS, the same assessments projected an increase of 30,000 low-income households in the next decade, three quarters of which will live outside of Seattle, and

WHEREAS, in 1990, as called for in Motion No. 7910, an affordable housing finance plan was developed by the planning and community development division in conjunction with a regional working group and submitted to the executive, and

WHEREAS, the affordable housing finance plan recommended a nine-year, \$147.5 million levy to finance the acquisition, rehabilitation and/or construction of at least 2,200 affordable housing units for low-income families and individuals as well as necessary residential support services, and

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WHEREAS, the council requested in Motion No. 8190 and the executive agreed to a joint process for reviewing and finalizing the levy proposal in cooperation with elected officials from the city of Seattle, suburban cities and key groups interested in the issues of homelessness and affordable housing, and

WHEREAS, the staff and citizen advisory groups appointed by the county, Seattle and the suburban cities reached agreement on the specifics of a regional housing levy program and presented the final proposal to the representative group of regional elected officials on June 5, 1991, and

WHEREAS, the proposal is for an eight-year, \$150 million levy to develop a range of emergency, transitional and permanent housing and related residential support services available to people in need, where they live on the Eastside and in South County as well as Seattle, and able to leverage and mobilize to maximum effect all other available public and private resources, and

WHEREAS, the final proposal is designed to serve more people over the full length of the program than originally proposed without significantly increasing costs to the tax payers and to encourage cooperation between jurisdictions and subregions within the county through the oversight and direction of a regional policy board of representative elected officials and the advice of a citizen advisory board, and

WHEREAS, it was the consensus of elected officials meeting on June 5, 1991 that the proposal was now complete, and ready to be presented to the public and other interested groups with their backing and the backing of the citizens' advisory committee, and

WHEREAS, the citizens' advisory committee strongly recommended that time and effort be taken to properly inform and educate key community groups and the public at large about the issues of homelessness and affordable housing and how the proposed levy program addresses them;

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT MOVED by the Council of King County: 1 1. The attached description of the regional housing levy 2 program is accepted and approved as the basis for developing an 3 4 ordinance placing the proposed levy on the ballot no later than February 1992. To ensure maximum voter participation and ease 5 of balloting, it is requested that the director of elections 6 conduct the election by mail for any election date other than a 7 Я September primary or November general election. 2.
