5 A MOTION approving projects for the Arts and
6 Cultural Tourism and Enrichment Program and
7 the Opportunity Grants Program from funds
8 appropriated to the Cultural Development Fund

9 WHEREAS, the King County arts commission is authorized by Ordinance
10 9279 to administer projects in the cultural development fund, and

11 WHEREAS, the King County cultural resources division received 155
12 applications requesting \$3,316,282 for the second round of funding in 1991, and

13 WHEREAS, three peer panels of arts and heritage professionals and
14 community representatives reviewed the applications and made recommendations
15 to the cultural resources division, and

16 WHEREAS, the King County arts commission and landmarks commission
17 recommend funding 51 projects in the total amount of \$636,067, and

18 WHEREAS, the recommendations for project funding adhere to the guidelines
19 approved by the King County council in Motion 7955;

20 NOW, THEREFORE IT BE MOVED by the Council of King County:

21 The following recommendations from the King County cultural resources
22 division for funding cultural development fund projects as described below are
23 hereby approved:

24 **Arts and Cultural Tourism and Enrichment Grants**

25 **1. A. Arts Projects \$340,932**

26 Langston Hughes Cultural Arts Center \$12,378 1992 February Festival
27 celebrating African-American History month featuring Madrona Youth Theatre's
28 production of *Young Dr. Martin Luther King* which will tour to King County schools
29 and music, dance, theatre, literary and visual arts events at the Langston Hughes
30 Arts Center.

31 Vashon Allied Arts \$22,000 Interior renovation of Blue Heron Center to
32 upgrade gallery, classroom space and theatre performance area including purchase
33 of lighting and sound systems.

City of Issaquah Arts Commission \$25,000 Creation and installation of
outdoor sculpture located in downtown core to celebrate Issaquah's centennial.

1 City of SeaTac \$20,000 Construction of art display areas within lobby,
2 storage space for artistic craft works and development of wet craft areas within the
3 North SeaTac Community Center.

4 United Indians of All Tribes Foundation \$20,000 Research, documentation
5 and publication of Daybreak Star Arts Center's permanent visual arts collection.

6 Bellevue Art Museum \$15,000 Presentation, promotion and educational
7 programs for the exhibit, "Of Magic, Power and Memory: Contemporary International
8 Jewelry."

9 Seattle Art Museum \$25,000 Promotion and presentation of the opening
10 exhibition in the new downtown facility, "Caribbean Festival Arts," including lectures,
11 films, storytelling, music and dance performances, children's workshops and gallery
12 talks.

13 Cinema Seattle \$9,617 The 18th Seattle International Film Festival, a 25 day
14 film festival with approximately 150 feature films 40 short films from over 35
15 countries.

16 Earshot Jazz \$10,000 Annual jazz festival, "Earshot Celebrates the Cultural
17 and Ethnic Diversity of Jazz," in several venues in King County and Seattle.

18 Marzena Performance Ensemble \$20,000 5th annual Seattle Spring Festival
19 of Contemporary Music featuring the works and residency programs of Japan's
20 greatest living composer, Toru Takemitsu for "The Imagery of Sound--The Music and
21 World of Toru Takemitsu."

22 Seattle Symphony \$20,000 "Musically Speaking," a series of six Sunday
23 afternoon concerts at the Opera House featuring talks by Maestro Gerard Schwarz.

24 Performance Support Services \$20,000 The 8th season of Allegro! Dance
25 Festival featuring 26 choreographers in 11 concerts with 48 performances at
26 Broadway Performance Hall.

27 Seattle Children's Theatre \$20,000 Production of Mildred Taylor's *Roll of*
28 *Thunder, Hear My Cry*, adapted by Ed Shockley which deals with the issue of racism
29 in this country.

30 Northwest Asian American Theatre \$5,000 WinterFest '92, the third annual
31 festival with three weeks of performances by local and national Asian American
32 artists at the Theatre Off Jackson.

33 Pilgrim Center for the Arts \$4,437 Facility upgrade for 504 handicap access,
electrical improvements and purchase of light board.

1 Northwest Folklife \$17,500 "Guardian Spirits: Songs, Musical Instruments
2 and Dance Regalia of Washington's Native Americans," showcasing the music and
3 dance regalia of 34 tribes east and west of the Cascades with multiple performances,
4 a museum exhibit and related activities for one month at Seattle Center, including
5 the annual Northwest Folklife Festival.

6 Seattle International Children's Festival \$25,000 The 6th annual festival
7 which presents more than 110 school and public performances by 14 companies
8 from China, Zimbabwe, South Africa, Italy, France, New Zealand, Australia,
9 Columbia, Honduras, Bulgaria, Canada and U.S.

10 Business Volunteers for the Arts \$30,000 "Destination Seattle" 1992 Winter
11 Arts Promotion," an extensive marketing and promotion campaign, toll free ticketing
12 and information line to promote ticket sales for King County arts organizations that
13 will have performances during the first three months of the year and to stimulate
14 attendance at art museums, galleries and historical museums.

15 On the Boards \$20,000 1992 Northwest New Works Festival and two regional
16 events featuring Jane Smith Productions and Stark Raving Theater for the New
17 Performance Series.

18 **1. B. Heritage projects \$85,233**

19 Neely Mansion Association \$4,250 Replication, installation and
20 staining/painting of missing historic wood trim throughout the interior of the Neely
21 Mansion, a designated King County landmark.

22 Easter Seal Society of Washington \$9,100 Exterior restoration of the
23 Thomsen House, a designated King County landmark, to include masonry, carpentry
24 and electrical work on steps, gate posts, veranda and above back door.

25 Fall City Hop Shed Foundation \$15,950 Restoration and
26 maintenance/stabilization of the Fall City Hop Shed, a designated King County
27 landmark, to include raising the building and replacing unsound and missing
28 timbers.

29 Steamer Virginia V Foundation \$7,924 Restoration of the engine room of the
30 SS Virginia V, a national register landmark steam ship.

31 Snoqualmie Valley Historical Society/Museum \$5,000 Preliminary feasibility
32 study for the use of the historic machine shop at Snoqualmie Falls as an exhibit
33 facility for the SVHM, to include a draft building use agreement with Puget Power.

1 Small Tribes Organization of Western Washington \$10,000 Toward the
2 construction of a Duwamish Indian Longhouse in Fort Dent Park.

3 Wing Luke Asian Museum \$16,820 Production of photographs and photostats
4 for the exhibit, "Executive Order 9066: 50 Years Before and 50 Years After,"
5 scheduled to open in February, 1992 and remain, in part, on permanent display.

6 Mildred Andrews \$10,945 Publication and distribution of an illustrated
7 guidebook to women's historic sites and buildings in King County entitled: "Pocket
8 Guide to King County Women's History."

9 Historical Society of Federal Way \$3,900 Design, publication and distribution
10 of an historical tour brochure, map and markers of Federal Way area.

11 Marymoor Museum \$1,344 Design, printing and distribution of an "Historic
12 Tour Guide of Redmond."

13 **Opportunity Grants**

14 **2. A. Arts Projects \$167,922**

15 Shoreline Arts Council \$8,000 "Arts in Culture"--a multigenerational and
16 multicultural performance series.

17 Langston Hughes Cultural Arts Center \$8,000 "Chipupugwendere"--the
18 African Harvest Festival featuring artists from Senegal.

19 Elizabeth Conner \$10,000 "Cascade"--60 minute video documentary on
20 Seattle's Cascade neighborhood.

21 Kirkland Arts Center \$10,000 *Ceramics!* CRASH & BURN, a national
22 symposium, exhibits, workshops and discussions on contemporary artwork in clay
23 featuring regional, national and international artists, in collaboration with Pottery
24 Northwest, University of Washington Ceramic Arts Department., and Seward Park Art
25 Studio.

26 Oscar Productions \$6,750 "Take a Second Look--The Dark is Light Enough"--
27 an African-American Film Festival in collaboration with Performance Support
28 Services at Broadway Performance Hall.

29 Ragamala \$1,700 Hindustani music performance by Ustad Imrat Khan (Sitar
30 and Surbahar) and his son Wajahat Khan (Sarod) at Kane Hall.

31 Jack Straw Productions \$15,000 Research, production and distribution for
32 radio programs "Voices of the First People" focusing on Native American traditional
33 singers and storytellers of Washington.

1 Sandy Bradley \$10,000 Live radio shows of "Sandy Bradley's Potluck"
2 broadcast on KUOW-FM and 35 National Public Radio stations nationwide.

3 Homenaje/Sara de Luis \$16,422 Performance of *Homenaje*: preserving and
4 honoring the work of great artists of 20th Century Spanish Dance.

5 Unidentified Moving Objects \$2,500 Purchase of van for touring to schools
6 and other public venues for Vashon based movement theatre company.

7 Alice B. Theatre \$20,000 Mainstage and touring musical production of
8 *Contents Under Pressure* to county schools and community centers.

9 Xelfer for Reflex Magazine \$8,950 Computer system purchase for production
10 of Reflex Magazine.

11 Raven Chronicles \$7,100 Production and distribution of The Raven
12 Chronicles multicultural magazine.

13 Northwest Playwrights Guild \$1,500 Playwriting workshops with nationally
14 recognized playwrights, culminating in public presentation of developed work by
15 participants.

16 Seattle Mime Theatre \$7,000 "The Incredible One Day Theatre Adventure
17 Camp"--a multidisciplinary arts project in collaboration with sponsors including King
18 County Parks serving south King County, community libraries of Algona, Boulevard
19 Park, Burien, Des Moines, literacy camps in Fairwood, Maple Valley, Shoreline, and
20 Renton Park, Lake Wilderness areas.

21 Artist Trust \$15,000 GAP Program (Grants for Artist Projects) to support the
22 creation and presentation of new works by King County artists.

23 On the Boards \$20,000 Technical upgrade/purchase of theatrical equipment
24 including sound and lighting equipment.

25 **2. B. Heritage Projects \$41,980**

26 Demonstration Project for Asian Americans \$9,200 Research, design, printing
27 and distribution of a poster series for schools: "Asian/Pacific Island Americans in Our
28 Midst."

29 Kirkland Arts Center \$7,900 "History with a View: Photographic
30 Documentation of Kirkland's Historic Structures," an exhibit of photographs by
31 Eduardo Calderon.


32 Florence Lentz \$12,233 Phase I of a two-year study of "Evolution of Dairy
33 Barns in the Snoqualmie Valley: 1890-1990" to include data collection, field
sketches and photographs, and development of a "work in progress" slide show.

1 Lushootseed Research \$5,647 To purchase equipment for the transfer of
2 archival materials from magnetic to digital media (compact disk).

3 Southwest Seattle Historical Society \$7,000 Phase II of video documentary
4 project to complete, promote and distribute broadcast-ready half-hour video
5 program, "Earl Robinson: Ballad of an American."
