MOTION NO. 9047

A MOTION authorizing applications for funding King County Local Projects from the Regional Conservation Futures 1993 Bond Acquisition Program.

WHEREAS, the Council has adopted Ordinance 10750, which establishes a Regional Conservation Futures Acquisition Program to acquire land for a system of public open spaces necessary for the health, welfare, benefit, and safety of the residents of King County, and

WHEREAS, \$15 million has been earmarked from the Regional Conservation Futures Acquisition Program for King County local projects, and

WHEREAS, the following described properties are deemed to be high priority acquisitions of King County and will be included in the King County Comprehensive Parks, Recreation, and Open Space Plan when adopted, and

WHEREAS, the following described properties are believed to represent acquisitions that best meet the criteria for allocating funds for local projects as established in Attachment B of Ordinance 10750, and

WHEREAS, the deadline for submitting applications for funding consideration is June 25, 1993;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT MOVED by the Council of King County:

The county executive is hereby authorized to apply for acquisition of the following properties:

Waterways 2000 \$5.0 Million

Funding to implement a model riparian corridor system protection program to include purchase and less-than-fee protection of habitat systems along King County stream corridors. Systems to be considered shall include but not be limited to: Issaquah Creek, lower Soos Creek and their tributaries, Newaukum Creek, lower May Creek, Crisp Creek, the

- 1 main stem of the Green River, and the Snoqualmie System and
2 their tributaries.
- 3 Cedar River Greenway Systems \$2.0 Million
4 Acquisition of selected properties and other habitat
5 protection along the Cedar River Greenway and Trail System,
6 between Renton and Landsburg.
- 7 Cougar Mountain Regional Wildland Park Addition \$2.0 Million
8 Acquisition of the Section 30 East Village property
9 adjacent to an northeast of Cougar Mountain.
- 10 Marymoor Park/Sammamish River Addition \$2.5 Million
11 Acquisition of approximately 60 acres adjacent to Marymoor
12 Park and the Sammamish River.
- 13 Section 36 \$2.0 Million
14 Acquisition of 633 acres of DNR-owned property on the East
15 Sammamish Plateau.
- 16 Reserve M/Innis Arden \$1.5 Million
17 Wooded 23 acre parcel with approximately 2000 feet of
18 shoreline along Puget Sound in northeast King County.
- 19 Bear Creek/Paradise Lake \$1.0 Million
20 Purchase and less-than-fee acquisition of properties along
21 the Upper Bear Creek in Northern King County.
- 22 Spring Lake Addition \$1.0 Million
23 Acquisition of the final key piece of the original 1989
24 Spring Lake/Lake Desire Bond Project. Property is 80 acres,
25 and contains sensitive wetlands and key trail linkages.
- 26 Snoqualmie River Property/Stillwater \$300,000
27 Combination of fee and less-than-fee acquisitions of
28 approximately 3/4 mile of riverfront property along the
29 Snoqualmie River and Regional Trail.
- 30 Jenkins Creek Park Addition \$500,000
31 Acquisition of an 8 acre partial inholding adjacent to the
32 existing Jenkins Creek Park.

2	Strategic addition to provide public access to this	
3	existing 46 acre southwest Vashon Island park with 1/3 mile of	
4	saltwater shoreline.	
5	<u>Elk Preserves</u>	1.0 Million
6	Acquisition of property in rural King county to	
7	preserve/protect known elk habitat.	
8	<u>Three Forks Addition</u>	\$1.0 Million
9	Acquisition of riparian and riverine habitat and future	
10	trail corridor adjacent to Three Forks Park.	
11	<u>Green River/Big Soos Creek</u>	\$500,000
12	Approximately 54 acres at the confluence of the Green	
13	River and Soos Creek, and the Green River and Soos Creek	
14	Regional Trails.	
15	<u>Shadow Lake Property</u>	\$900,000
16	Acquisition of approximately 40 acres of lakefront	
17	property that would provide public access and passive	
18	recreational opportunities to this lake as well as protecting	
19	and enhancing waterfowl habitat.	
20	<u>Big Soos/Covington Creek Preserve</u>	\$1.3 Million
21	Purchase of approximately 129 acres to connect two open	
22	space parcels, creating a nearly mile long wildlife preserve at	
23	the junction of Big Soos and Covington Creeks.	
24	<u>Lake Sawyer</u>	\$500,000
25	Approximately 40 acres adjacent to the largest lake in	
26	south King County, the property would provide lake access,	
27	passive park use, a regional trailhead location, and wetland	
28	protection.	
29	<u>Maury Island Marine Park</u>	\$1.0 Million
30	Acquisition of approximately 300 acres and 3/4 of a mile	
31	of saltwater shoreline along the eastern shore of Maury Island.	
32	<u>Fall City Landing</u>	\$300,000
33	Acquisition of approximately 6 acres at the confluence of the	
34	Snoqualmie and Raging Rivers.	

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
Moss Lake
