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A MOTION initiating the Quality Rural Environment Project

WHEREAS, the planning goals in the Washington State Growth
Management Act.(GMA)include: support of resource-based
industries which, in King County, include forestry, farming,
fisheries, and mining; retention of open space and wildlife
habitat and protection of air and water quality, and

WHEREAS, protection of rural areas is critical to achieving the goals of the GMA, and

WHEREAS, measures to protect a rural environment and character must address all of its elements including rural residential areas, fish and wildlife habitat, rural economy, resource-based industries, undisturbed open space, rural-scale infrastructure, and consideration of property values, and

WHEREAS, new approaches to development in rural areas being discussed or tested elsewhere may be more compatible with rural protection goals than are current development practices, and

WHEREAS, the King County Council, by Ordinance 11130, authorized expenditures by the King County Roads Division, Planning and Community Development Division and Surface Water Management Division for a Quality Rural Environment Project (QRE) in order to create a new prototype for rural residential development.

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 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT MOVED by the Council of King County:

A. Parks, Planning and Resources Department acting as lead agency; Roads, Surface Water Management Divisions, and the Department of Development and Environmental Services are hereby authorized to carry out a QRE Project. The QRE Project should target properties zoned AR-2.5, AR-5 or AR-10. Residual G-5 or F-R zoned properties within the Rural Area may be considered if the sites are adjacent to an urban growth area (per GMA), such that they will not create "urban islands" which would further fragment forestry and agricultural uses in the rural zone. The QRE project should be consistent with the rural area policies contained in the Countywide Planning Policies and should include the following elements:

- a review of the literature, current practice and future trends in the area of rural residential development;
- 2. an advisory group appointed by the Executive to be representative of the broad range of Rural area interests including but not limited to landowners, federal, state and local regulatory agencies, affected federally recognized Indian Tribes, and environmental groups convened to:
- a. recommend project guidelines to the Executive for Council approval;
- b. identify current regulatory obstacles to quality rural residential development;
  - c. identify developer incentives, and
- d. recommend to the Executive an ecologically well defined study area or areas with alternative sites for Council approval.

- 3. an advisory group report detailing guidelines for quality rural development which is both innovative and cost effective while advancing rural protection goals;
- 4. a process for selecting, subject to Council approval, a geographically well-defined demonstration site or sites of 100 acres or more from within the study area or areas, which considers basin boundaries and is nominated by a property owner or owners committed to implementing the advisory group's guidelines. The selection process should also consider an assessment of current conditions in the demostration site or sites that identifies forestry, farming, fisheries, and mining activities, wildlife habitat, sensitive areas (including riparian areas), water quality and quantity (including base flow maintenance), air quality, open space, and rural-scale infrastructure;
- 5. a map of sufficient detail to demonstrate the siting of all structures and the accommodation of all elements of the demostration site or sites to the new prototype rural residential development consistent with the advisory group's guidelines. These elements shall include, but not be limited to: parks, greenway, other open spaces, fish and wildlife habitat, surface water management, dwellings, resource based industries, roads and utilities.;
- 6. a written agreement with the property owner or owners to develop the site according to the site plan and reimburse the county for any expenditure paid by the county which would normally be paid by the developer. These reimbursed monies are contemplated to become part of a

continuing source of funds to be used to encourage quality rural development;

- 7. draft legislation to remove regulatory obstacles to quality rural residential development, and
- 8. a plan with sufficient resources to ensure that the site or sites has been developed accordingly and to monitor the impacts of the project to ensure adequate environmental protection.
- B. Participation in the QRE project shall be voluntary.

  All owners, public and private, within the area shall be invited to participate in this QRE project; however, nothing in this motion shall be construed to compromise any owner's property rights, present zoning, or any prerogative of land ownership that might be identified.
- C. The Executive should submit a detailed work plan, including an estimate of the budgetary impact over the life of the project, to the County Council by March 31, 1995 which could include the use of private or non-profit organizations capable of managing ongoing communications with owners and encouraging consensus among owners in creating a new prototype for rural residential development.
