4 of King County's allocation of funds from
5 the King Conservation District

8 WHEREAS, by Motion 9272, King County approved a work
9 plan for use of the county's 1994 allocation of funds from
10 the King Conservation District assessment, and

11 WHEREAS, this work plan includes \$15,000 for a pilot
12 curbside horse waste collection program in the Bear Creek
13 area, and

14 WHEREAS, this program has not been able to be
15 implemented because of difficulties in obtaining a permit
16 from the Seattle-King County Department of Public Health
17 encountered by the composting agency anticipated to receive
18 the horse waste, and

19 WHEREAS, it is uncertain whether these difficulties can
20 be resolved in the foreseeable future, and

21 WHEREAS, King County may use a portion of its 1995
22 allocation from the King Conservation District assessment to
23 fund a public-private partnership dedicated to environmental
24 restoration, global cooperation and youth service,
25 tentatively named the King County World Conservation Corps,
26 which would seek out additional sources of funding but which
27 would not receive funding from assessment revenues of the
28 Conservation District that support base district programs,
29 and

1 WHEREAS, the success of this effort in 1995 would be
2 greatly assisted by the ability to hire staff to initiate
3 planning and fundraising activities in 1994;

4 NOW, THEREFORE BE IT MOVED by the Council of King
5 County:

6 The work plan for King County's allocation of funds from
7 the 1994 King Conservation District assessment is hereby
8 revised, cancelling the pilot curbside horse waste collection
9 program planned for the Bear Creek area and approving initial
10 tasks to establish the King County World Conservation Corps,
11 as described in Attachment A, to be funded by the \$15,000
12 originally allocated to the pilot horse waste collection
13 program.

THE KING COUNTY WORLD CONSERVATION CORPS PLANNING AND PRELIMINARY IMPLEMENTATION PHASE OCTOBER - DECEMBER 1994

Cascadia Quest intends to undertake a thorough planning process and to carry out initial implementation of the King County World Conservation Corps during the last three months of 1994, in order to begin the six-month pilot program by April 1, 1995.

A Planning Committee comprised of Cascadia Quest Board members and volunteers from past projects has developed ten goals for this planning phase. Cascadia Quest will hire a program planning consultant to work closely with the Planning Committee and with King County staff to:

- 1) Determine program parameters (e.g., size and scope).
- 2) Clarify roles and responsibilities of sponsoring organizations.
- 3) Secure commitments from sponsoring organizations.
- 4) Develop timelines and implementation schedules.
- 5) Recruit program co-directors (to begin work by February 1, 1995) and begin recruitment of corpsmembers and work crew supervisors.
- 6) Set the budget and fundraising plan and secure substantial percentage of funds.
- 7) Establish Work Projects Plan and obtain commitments from work project partners.
- 8) Establish Training and Education Plan.
- 9) Undertake local community and international outreach, including:
 - Advisory Committee development.
 - Volunteer and community group involvement.
 - International organizations' involvement and commitment.
- 10) Develop and begin implementation of Evaluation Plan, including: front-end review of prior projects and assessment of community needs; on-going evaluative activity; and summative evaluations developed with key participating groups.

Cascadia Quest has set a \$15,000 budget to carry out the planning and preliminary implementation phase. The results of this phase will be summarized in a final report submitted to the Metropolitan King County Council by January 20, 1995.
