A MOTION revising the work plan for use of King County's allocation of funds from the King Conservation District assessment.

WHEREAS, by Motion 9272, King County approved a work plan for use of the county's 1994 allocation of funds from the King Conservation District assessment, and

WHEREAS, this work plan includes \$15,000 for a pilot curbside horse waste collection program in the Bear Creek area, and

WHEREAS, this program has not been able to be implemented because of difficulties in obtaining a permit from the Seattle-King County Department of Public Health encountered by the composting agency anticipated to receive the horse waste, and

WHEREAS, it is uncertain whether these difficulties can be resolved in the foreseeable future, and

WHEREAS, King County may use a portion of its 1995 allocation from the King Conservation District assessment to fund a public-private partnership dedicated to environmental restoration, global cooperation and youth service, tentatively named the King County World Conservation Corps, which would seek out additional sources of funding but which would not receive funding from assessment revenues of the Conservation District that support base district programs, and

WHEREAS, the success of this effort in 1995 would be 2 greatly assisted by the ability to hire staff to initiate planning and fundraising activities in 1994; 3 NOW, THEREFORE BE IT MOVED by the Council of King 4 5 County: 6 The work plan for King County's allocation of funds from 7 the 1994 King Conservation District assessment is hereby revised, cancelling the pilot curbside horse waste collection 8 9 program planned for the Bear Creek area and approving initial tasks to establish the King County World Conservation Corps, 10 as described in Attachment A, to be funded by the \$15,000 11 12 originally allocated to the pilot horse waste collection 13 program.
