MOTION NO. 9426

A MOTION establishing policy and identifying policy issues for consideration by the county council in 1995 relating to the budget and possible future rate increases for the Solid Waste Division.

WHEREAS, the county council does not support the executive's proposed increases in rates charged for solid waste disposal for 1995 through 1998, and

WHEREAS, prompted in part by concerns over this rate proposal, the council wishes to reconsider some of the policies contained within the 1992 Comprehensive Solid Waste Management Plan, adopted by Ordinance 11171 in December 1993, and

WHEREAS, the solid waste division has sufficient reserves to continue operating through 1995 without any rate increase by making only relatively minor reductions in proposed expenditures, but some rate increase may be necessary in 1996 to avoid major reductions in current programs and services, and

WHEREAS, prior to approving any long-term increase in rates or major reductions in programs and services for the division, the council wishes to conclude its reconsideration of key policies in the solid waste management plan, and

WHEREAS, a formally updated plan is not expected to be transmitted to the council until late 1996, after a rate increase or major cuts in programs will probably have already become necessary, and

WHEREAS, some of the policies to be reconsidered affect not only potential rates but also anticipated 1995 expenditures, and

WHEREAS, it therefore is desirable that the council declare any changes in policy it wishes to make now and identify those policies it wishes to reconsider in collaboration with the executive and affected cities, along with a timetable for that reconsideration;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT MOVED by the Council of King County:

A. All spending by the solid waste division in preparation for possible new transfer stations in south King County and the Northeast Lake Washington area should be deferred through at least June 1995, to provide for council reconsideration of the need for such transfer stations, their size, the services they would offer, whether or not they could be built and operated more cost-effectively under contract to a private company and other related issues.

B. The executive is requested to transmit to the council by June 30, 1995, a recommended policy for the potential future export of mixed municipal solid waste out of King County, including a discussion of the relationship of such a policy to the current and future county transfer system, the continued role and useful life of Cedar Hills landfill, rates charged for solid waste disposal, and the potential uses of financial reserves in the landfill replacement account of the solid waste division.

C. Financial policy for the Capital Equipment
Replacement Fund of the division should be conservative but
the current policy is unnecessarily so and should be revised
prior to adoption of a 1996 budget for the division. The
entire transfer to the fund proposed in the 1995 budget of
the solid waste division should be eliminated and the

transfer in 1996 should be determined consistent with new financial policies to support the fund.

D. The executive is requested to transmit to the council by June 30, 1995, a plan identifying the strategies he believes are necessary prior to 2000 to meet the county's adopted waste reduction and recycling goals, together with his estimate of their costs and their likelihood of success, so that the council may determine if the county's adopted goals for waste reduction and recycling are realistic or should be modified in any way.

E. The executive is requested to transmit to the council by June 30, 1995, his recommendation for a possible reorganization of programs within the solid waste division that promote recycling and programs overseen by the King County commission for marketing recyclable materials. could include putting both sets of programs under one management; creation of a non-profit corporation funded by businesses that might expand successful programs to market recyclable materials; targeting recycling efforts to materials that offer attractive economic development opportunities; and ways in which the two sets of programs could improve their coordination to serve overall county goals.

F. The executive is requested to assign staff to work with the Budget and Fiscal Management Committee, the Utilities and Natural Resources Committee, the Regional Policy Committee and their staffs to analyze these and other policy issues during the first half of 1995 in preparation for council consideration of adjustments in solid waste programs and rates that could go into effect in 1996.
