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KING COUNTY ARTS COMMISSION 1995 Special Projects Program Arts Program Recommendations



PROGRAM

The Special Projects program provides special funding to arts organizations, independent artists and community agencies to develop new, innovative and/or collaborative projects which advance the field of artistic expression and increase arts opportunities for King County citizens. The King County Arts Commission recognizes this program as the primary source for encouraging new work of independent artists, setting aside at least 25% of the program for that purpose. In addition, the Special Projects program allows social service and community service agencies to apply for arts programs that increase their effectiveness in addressing social concerns.

PROCESS

The peer review panel for the Special Projects Program met July 5, 6, and 7 to review 197 applications from community organizations, arts organizations and individual artists in all arts disciplines requesting more than \$1.46 million. The multi-disciplinary review panel was composed of the following individuals:

John Affolter: Visual artist; Arts educator specializing in youth at risk

Ros Bird: Founding President, Shoreline Arts Council; Educator

Charles D'Ambrosio: Fiction writer; Novelist

Dayna Hanson: Choreographer; Performance artist; Founder, Dooryard Dance Project Tamara Madison Shaw: Writer; Actress; Theatre performance artist

Anne Oncken: Musician; Former Program Coordinator, Los Angeles County Music & Arts Commission; Consultant specializing in music

Steven Shiviro: Critical writer specializing in film and media; Faculty, University of Washington

Doug Tenney and **Grace Hiranaka**, King County Arts Commissioners, also attended the panel meeting. Charlie Rathbun, Arts Program Coordinator, Riza Gueco, Angela Gengler, and Diane Testa, Program Assistants, provided staff support.

In their review of applications the panel considered the following criteria:

- Project quality- artistic quality, innovation, feasibility
- Public benefit audience served, community participation, community impact
- Diversity of ethnicity, geography, discipline and type of projects

The panel focused on those proposals which not only met the criteria for the program but seemed in their opinion to be "special", projects which significantly enhance the activities of an organization or strengthen its impact in the community, proposals which pilot important new initiatives, and new work by independent artists and arts organizations.

Applications were funded as fully as possible to ensure that the scope and quality of the project would be met. The panel recognized that it was unable to fund many deserving applications. A total of \$256,279 was allocated to 58 artists and organizations.

KING COUNTY LANDMARKS AND HERITAGE COMMISSION 1995 Special Projects Program Heritage Program Recommendations

PROGRAM

The Special Projects Program provides special funding to heritage organizations, independent heritage specialists and public agencies to develop projects which address the need for innovative heritage projects, especially those which address threatened resources or neglected aspects of King County history and heritage such as those defined by theme, ethnicity or geography. The King County Landmarks and Heritage Commission recognizes this program as a primary source for encouraging the efforts of heritage organizations and specialists and the only public funding program of its type dedicated to heritage activities.

PROCESS

The King County Landmarks and Heritage Commission's 1995 Special Projects Grant Program Panel met on July 11, 1995 to review applications submitted for funding. Serving on the Panel were:

Leonard Forsman, Archaeologist and Suquamish Tribal Council Member Marianne Forssblad, Director, Nordic Heritage Museum Julie O'Neil, Membership Director, Museum of Flight Mary Ellen Ryan, Archivist and Museum Consultant and Past President of AKCHO

Kay Reinartz, King County Landmarks and Heritage Commission Member, also attended the panel meeting. Julie Koler, Historic Preservation Officer; Charles Payton, Community Museum Advisor; and Riza Gueco, Program Assistant, provided staff support.

A total of 33 projects were reviewed. Requests totalled \$266,477; a total of \$70,360 was available for allocation. In addition to the specific heritage criteria outlined in the "Special Projects Program 1995-96 Guidelines", the following general criteria were considered:

- **Project quality** heritage significance, innovation, feasibility
- Public benefit audience served, community participation, community impact
- Diversity ethnic and geographic distribution

Applications were funded as fully as possible to ensure that the scope and quality of the project would be met. The Panel recognized that it was unable to fund many deserving applications. A total of \$70,360 was allocated to 13 heritage specialists, agencies and organizations. The recommended grants ranged from \$1,695 to \$10,000. Project locations included countywide projects as well as a broad geographic spread of County Council districts.
