CULTURAL FACILITIES PROGRAM EMERGENCY/URGENT NEEDS REQUEST

Shoreline Historical Museum

November 8, 1995

The Landmarks and Heritage Commission's Policy and Planning Committee met at 9:00am on Monday, October 23, 1995 to review an Emergency/Urgent Needs application submitted by Shoreline Historical Museum (SHM). The Committee recommended awarding \$3,250 to SHM to split the cost of re-tubing its boiler.

Organization: Shoreline Historical Museum was incorporated in 1975 to preserve, record, and interpret the history of the Shoreline area and its relationship to the Northwest in general. SHM is open 5 days a week and provides docent tours, slide shows, programs for school children and hands-on heritage kits for use in local classrooms. Over the last three years, SHM has implemented a number of ADA compliance projects that have made the 1912 school facility accessible to all.

Project: While undergoing a routine boiler inspection during the summer, Shoreline Historical Museum learned that its boiler tubes were leaking and would have to be replaced. In fact, the inspector informed staff at SHM that it would not be able to operate the boiler until the required repairs were made. While SHM had noted that water bills were unusually high, it was not until the inspection that the cause was determined. Since it cannot function without heat, SHM went ahead and replaced its boiler tubes at a cost of \$6,492. It was imperative to complete the work during the summer when the boiler was not in use. The unanticipated expense has consumed about half of the organization's cash reserves, which seriously imperils its ability to present its annual programs and events.

Nature of the Emergency: The Cultural Facilities Program guidelines define emergencies and/or urgent needs to include "a pressing situation that would cause an organization in the very near term to suffer severe economic consequences due to conditions outside its control." Until the summer inspection, SHM was unaware of boiler problems. When informed of the severity of the problem, it took action immediately in order to avoid a winter without heat.

Recommendation: While the Policy and Planning Committee supports the organization and its request, it also felt that Shoreline Historical Museum should share the expense of replacing its boiler tubes. To an extent the Committee felt that such major repairs could be avoided with a more pro-active maintenance program. Also, the very function of a cash reserve is to cover unexpected expenses. However, SHM is a significant contributor to the life of a new community and is a well managed organization that offers valuable programs on a minimal budget.

Action: The King County Landmarks and Heritage Commission recommends approval of an Emergency Cultural Facilities Program award of \$3,250 to Shoreline Historical Museum to partially cover unanticipated cost of re-tubing its boiler.
