MOTION NO. 9826

A MOTION related to Kingdome concessions and directing the executive to improve health code violation notification procedures and to correct deficiencies in Kingdome food handling practices.

WHEREAS, Ogden Entertainment Services, Inc., operates approximately 100 fixed and portable food stands in the Kingdome under the terms and conditions of a concessions contract that was effective on January 2, 1987, and

WHEREAS, Seattle-King County Department of Public Health inspectors have cited Ogden food stands at the Kingdome for recurring food code violations 158 times in the past three years, and

WHEREAS, such food code violations could present a threat to the health, safety, and welfare of the public, and

WHEREAS, high quality concessions are critical to the financial health of the Kingdome and its tenants who, by contract, share a percentage of the Kingdome's concession revenues, and

WHEREAS, Article 26 of the concessions contract contains a list of operating conditions with which Ogden must comply, including the provision of the highest quality concessions, and

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WHEREAS, the concessions contract will expire on January 2, 1997, unless the county and Ogden agree by July 2, 1996 to exercise an option to extend the contract for a five-year term;

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT MOVED by the Council of King County:

- A. The executive is directed to take immediate actions to correct the recurring food code violations at the Kingdome. At a minimum, such actions shall include increasing the number of inspections at food stands and improving the training and supervision of concessionaire employees. These and any other actions shall be in place by March 31, 1996, the opening day of the 1996 professional baseball season.
- B. The executive is directed to initiate a competitive bidding process to select one or more concessionaires to operate Kingdome concessions beginning January 2, 1997. By April 30, 1996, the executive shall submit for council review and approval a proposed plan for conducting the competitive bidding process and for achieving and maintaining the highest standards of food preparation and quality at the Kingdome. At a minimum, the proposed plan shall contain:
- 1. A detailed work program and schedule for conducting the competitive bidding process.
- 2. A proposal for redirecting Kingdome capital improvement program resources, if necessary, to improve sanitation for food stands in the Kingdome.
- 3. A recommendation regarding the criteria that should be considered in deciding whether to invoke Article 26 of the current concessionaire contract, which allows the county to

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declare a breach of contract for repeated violations of the operating conditions contained therein.

- The executive is directed to develop and implement C. procedures for notifying the executive and facility management of health code violations identified within any county-owned or occupied facility. By April 30, 1996, the executive shall report to the council on the status of the development and implementation of these notification procedures.
- The executive is directed to study the feasibility of implementing similar notification procedures for all other regulatory code violations in county-owned and occupied facilities and present a report of the results of that study to the council by June 30, 1996.
- Beginning on June 30, 1996, the executive shall report quarterly, for four quarters and annually thereafter, on the all regulatory code violation notices received by the executive or facility management. At a minimum, the report shall identify the number and nature of the regulatory code violation notices received and the executive's response to the notices.
- It is the policy of the Metropolitan King County Council that health department inspectors shall apply the same inspection and enforcement standards to county-owned and occupied facilities that are applied to all other facilities.
- It is the policy of the Metropolitan King County G. Council that individuals attending spectator events at the
