

The Cultural Education Advisory Committee met on March 13, 15 and 17, 1996 to review 99 applications to the 1996-97 Cultural Education Program (80 arts and 19 heritage applications). The number of requests this year increased almost 80% over 1995.

- 9 heritage projects with a total of \$79,107 were recommended. This amount includes 3 arts projects which received a total of \$7,185 in heritage funding. Heritage allocations included \$22,309 in carryover funds from unrealized past projects.
