MOTION NO

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A MOTION adopting the Farm and Forest Report and approving the allocation of funds for expenditure of Farmland and Forest Preservation and Incentive Programs under the Arts and Natural Resources Initiative in accordance with Ordinance 11914.

WHEREAS, the King County Council adopted Ordinance 11914 on July 31, 1995 authorizing appropriation of \$10.5 million in general obligation bond funds for the Arts and Natural Resources Initiative, and

WHEREAS, the initiative included six funding categories for arts, cultural resources and natural resource programs, and

WHEREAS, two of the categories included in the initiative are farmland preservation and working forest program, and

WHEREAS, the King County Council adopted Motion 9514 on March 27, 1995 approving program goals and guidelines for the development of the Arts & Natural Resources Initiative, and

WHEREAS, the Farm and Forest Initiative Study was funded by proceeds of the Arts and Natural Resources Initiative and was intended to explore the barriers to agriculture and forestry in King County and identify potential incentives to overcome those barriers, and

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WHEREAS, the King County Agriculture Commission, the Farmland Advisory Committee, and the Forestry Advisory Committee participated in the Farm and Forest Initiative Study, and

WHEREAS, the Agriculture Commission, the Farmland Advisory Committee, and the Forestry Advisory Committee have discussed the various acquisition, zoning and incentive programs identified in that study and made recommendations on those programs felt to be most effective in preserving and promoting local agriculture and working forests, and

WHEREAS, it is the council's intention that the Arts and Natural Resources Initiative funds be distributed in a manner to most effectively preserve and promote local agriculture and working forests;

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT MOVED by the Council of King County:

The report entitled "Farm and Forest: A Strategy for Preserving the Working Landscapes of Rural King County", and the recommendations contained therein, are hereby adopted, and the Arts and Natural Resources Initiative funds dedicated to farmland preservation and working forests shall be distributed pursuant to the amended program recommendations and work program analysis contained herein and attached to this motion, provided however, that \$400,000 of the funds for the Working Forest Preservation Incentive Programs shall be placed in a reserve account, pending the submission no later than February 1, 1997 and the adoption by the Council of a detailed implementation plan outlining the proposed use of those funds. Of the remaining \$100,000 Working Forest Preservation Incentive Program funds, \$50,000 shall be

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allocated for the Friend of the Forest program, and \$50,000 shall be allocated and used in conjunction with a state grant, for development of the Transfer of Development Rights Program.

The funds for the farmland preservation acquisition

program, including the allocation of the remaining funds from

the Farmlands Preservation Program, shall be allocated

pursuant to the priority acquisition list outlined in

Attachment D. The funds for the forest preservation

acquisition program shall be allocated for rural forest

property acquisition pursuant to the following priority:

- 322.85 acre Ring Hill Estates, located between NE
 148th Street and NE 162nd Street in the Redmond/Bear
 Creek area
- 2. 1710 acre Carey Creek Headwaters property located near the intersection of Issaquah-Hobart Road SE and SR 18.

The acquisition programs should concentrate resources, where feasible, on the purchase of development rights rather than the fee simple acquisition of farm and forest lands. In order to expedite the acquisition program, the County is encouraged to work together or partner with 501(c)(3) non-profit organizations.

The Council may reallocate any of the funds for the farm and forest initiative not expended or firmly committed by December 31, 1997, consistent with the goals and objectives of this program. The Natural Resources Department staff shall submit a progress report to Council no later than December 31, 1997 detailing the status of all components of this initiative.

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The council agrees to fund the proposed farmland
preservation and working forest elements of the Arts and
Natural Resources Initiative with councilmatic bonds up to a
maximum of six million dollars and intends to reimburse
expenditures for the initiative from future bond proceeds.

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
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Farmland Preservation and Incentive Program Recommendations, Goals and Administrative Guidelines

Acquisition Program: \$1,600,000

Goal: Acquire additional development rights to key, unprotected farmlands to make land more affordable to new farmers, protect additional acres of high quality farm soil from irreversible conversion to non-farm uses and to augment the "critical mass" of producing lands necessary to support the long term viability of the local agriculture industry.

Administration: The limited amount of funds available, even with inclusion of unappropriated Farmland Preservation Program Fund balance and federal grant funds, will require focusing on a limited number of key properties. Therefore, it is recommended that FFI funds be used to acquire unprotected lands within the Agriculture Production Districts of the Lower Green River Valley, the Enumclaw Plateau including the Upper Green River Valley, the Sammamish Valley, and the Snoqualmie Valley. Moreover, the initial acquisition effort should focus on the limited number of unprotected properties larger than 15 acres in size located in the lower and upper Green River Valleys.

Farm Link Program: \$250,000

<u>Goal:</u> To place new operators onto farm properties which now are, or soon could become, non-productive by developing and maintaining an inventory of farmable properties, both publicly and privately owned, that are available for lease or purchase and assisting in the transference of such properties between the outgoing owner/operator and a new operator.

Administration: The Natural Resources Department (NRD) proposes to establish a three phase pilot program to accomplish this goal. In the initial phase, and in compliance with Council Motion #9652, the NRD will propose the Council grant \$50,000 to a consortium of the King County Organizing Project, the Institute for Washington's Future and the Cascadia Revolving Fund to organize and operate a farm cooperative on the five acre Mara property in South Park.

In the second phase of the program, the NRD would inventory other County-owned lands of farmable quality and assess their potential for operation under similar "start-up farmer" programs.

In the final phase of the Farm Link program, the NRD would seek to identify and provide initial funding for a non-profit entity to develop and maintain an inventory of available farm properties and assist in matching outgoing operators with potential new operators. Staff will prepare an RFP to solicit potential farmer associations or other umbrella groups capable of the following tasks: organize and manage programs similar to the Mara

property project, develop and maintain an inventory of available farm properties and assist in matching outgoing operators with potential new operators. Creation and administration of this awards program could be done through Natural Resource Department staff. The Agriculture Commission or a special review panel convened by the Commission would review all proposals and make recommendations to the Council on those to be awarded a contract.

Research and Education Grant Program: \$400,000

Goal: To provide grants for specific research projects and educational programs that aid local farmers to more efficiently operate their farms, market their produce or meet local, state and federal regulations. These projects and programs may be conducted through an existing government agency such as the WSU Cooperative Extension, the King Conservation District, or the Department of Development and Environmental Services or through a private, non-profit agency.

Administration: The initial phase of this program will be administered by the NRD. NRD will propose the Council grant up to \$50,000 to a consortium of 1000 Friends of Washington and the Institute for Washington's Future, or a similar umbrella group to develop base-line data on agriculture in King County. This data will focus on who is farming, where, what they are producing and what organizations they belong to or can be contacted through. Development of this data is prerequisite to soliciting ideas on the research and education programs that are needed by local agriculturists, and determining who could best provide them and how they might best be delivered.

NRD also proposes using \$10,000 of this allotment to promote the new basic health care legislation in rural areas. An award to Seattle-King County Health Department would most likely be the most appropriate vehicle for carrying out this task.

NRD proposes an additional minimum amount of \$56,000 to fund the Farmbudsman position within the county for a period of one year. This will give time for NRD to propose the position in the permanent CX budget.

An RFP would be prepared to solicit organizations to continue and/ or expand education programs and develop new research and education programs to reach additional agriculture operators. Funds remaining after the initial expenditures for the baseline data project, the "farmbudsman" and the rural health promotion would be used to fund the awards program (approximately \$284,000). Creation and administration of this awards program could be done through Natural Resource Department staff. The Agriculture Commission or a special review panel convened by the Commission would review all proposals and make recommendations to the Council on those to be awarded a contract.



Agriculture Marketing and Promotion Program: \$400,000

Goal: This program is intended to assist all facets of local agriculture to more successfully market not only their products but also their industry as a valuable and viable element of the local community through operator-education programs, consumer-education programs and general product marketing programs.

Administration: The NRD, with assistance from the WSU Cooperative Extension, will work with the Agriculture Commission to identify existing farmer associations who may be assisted through either training or assistance in developing programs to market both their products, their association and their industry. The NRD, WSU Cooperative Extension and Agriculture Commission will also analyze the need for and means to establish new associations to better represent various producer groups and develop effective marketing programs for their products.

The NRD and Agriculture Commission will then develop guidelines for soliciting grant requests from such organizations consistent with the intention of funding the initial development and administration of such farmer associations and promotion programs.

During 1997 it is proposed that approximately \$400,000 be awarded to an umbrella organization which can carry out the marketing and promotion program including at a minimum the following items: (1) Preparation of a brochure on the existence and purpose of the Agriculture Commission and the programs in which it is involved; (2) A study to identify existing entities currently involved in the promotion of local agriculture; (3) Sponsorship, in conjunction with WSU Cooperative Extension and King Conservation District, of at least one conference on the how and why of local agriculture; and (4) Development of an initial local harvest promotion campaign for fall of 1997.

Farming Grant Program: \$225,000

Goal: This program is intended to develop a source of small, opportunity awards, similar to grants, for projects of public benefit to assist both new and established farmers in starting and/or operating an agriculture enterprise.

Administration: The Farm and Forest Initiative identified the need for small, short term loans as a major requirement to getting new operators started in agriculture. Because the County cannot loan its credit to private individuals, this program would explore the potential for assisting small farmers through an awards program administered by the NRD. It is proposed that \$225,000 be awarded in small amounts to be determined by the Agriculture Commission for new public benefit project ideas which would assist new farmers to enter farming or existing farmers to begin new agricultural enterprises. Examples of public benefit projects may include, but not be limited to those, that provide a measurable environmental improvement, those that contain elements of public access to agricultural operations or those that would distribute food or other agricultural products to the economically disadvantaged. Other examples of public benefit projects include public outreach and education on King County agriculture and its importance to King County.

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Either the Agriculture Commission or a special panel convened by the Commission would review all grant applications and make recommendations to the Council on which applications should be funded.

Program Administration:

NRD proposes that of 2% of all totals for programmatic funds not related to acquisition be used to supplement the administration budget for bookkeeping, developing contracts, and other office support. This would be the equivalent of .2 FTE to assist program staff over a three year period from the time of allocation.

Attachment B (revised 10/7/96)

Working Forest Preservation and Incentive Program Recommendations

Acquisition Program \$2,375,000

Goal: To create a pilot program to preserve forest lands through acquisition, land exchanges, and the biosolids program.

Administration: The limited amount of funds available for a pilot project and the effort to implement forest preservation quickly will require focusing on a limited number of key properties. Several key properties were identified through the Open Space Bond issue.

Incentive Program Implementation: \$500,000

<u>Goal</u>: To develop programs which implement the incentive programs for forestry which are recommended in the Farm and Forest Report.

Administration: These funds will pay for pilot projects and general development of a wide range of incentives. In 1996, NRD will develop legislation to protect the "Right to Forest" and work to inform and educate the affected property owners, foresters and the rural community concerning the impact of this legislation. Also in 1996 staff will propose ordinance changes to streamline implementation of local and state forest practices legislation. In 1996 and 1997, NRD will develop programs and educational materials to expand the effectiveness and outreach for current use taxation programs. Implementation of an expanded current use taxation program will require additional staff which are not funded by this initiative. Finally, NRD will initiate a work effort to develop a Forest Conservation Incentive Program based on a Transfer of Development Rights Program and promotion of cluster development in the rural area. The Transfer of Development Rights Program will be a major work effort beginning in 1996, partially funded by a grant from the Washington Department of Community, Trade, and Economic Development.

In 1997, in coordination with the Rural Forest Commission, NRD will work to develop programs for technical assistance, research grants, training programs and outreach programs with program implementation to begin as programs are adopted.

Potential Farm & Forest Initiative Farmland Acquisitions

The following properties represent the highest priority parcels in each of the County's APDs. It is unknown at this time if the landowners of these parcels are interested in entering the Farmland Preservation Program. NRD recommends these parcels be given the highest consideration for their in-fee or less than fee purchase. If the County is unable to reach agreement with the owners of the following parcels, and/or has money remaining following the purchase of these parcels, NRD will, at the direction of the Agriculture Commission, solicit offers from interested property owners in the corresponding APD for inclusion into the program.

There is currently \$3.5 million dollars available from the Farm & Forest Initiative, from remaining Farmlands Preservation Program funds, and from federal grants to purchase properties in the following APDs. Staff proposes the funds be allocated to the County's APDs as follows:
