A MOTION calling for a conference, *Moving King County* 2000, of local elected officials to discuss opportunities for local option transportation revenue sources and ways to target local option revenues to specific projects and programs.

WHEREAS, current levels of funding are not sufficient to respond to the need for maintenance and capital improvements to transportation facilities in King County and its cities, and

WHEREAS, the Metropolitan Transportation Plan projects a shortfall for needed transportation projects through 2020, and

WHEREAS, the King County Transportation Needs Report projects a shortfall of more than \$250 million for county road needs alone, and

WHEREAS, major storms in 1996 and 1997 caused more than \$30 million in damages to the county road system which were funded in part by deferring needed road construction and maintenance projects, and

WHEREAS, the City of Seattle has identified a \$176 million shortfall of funds needed just for maintenance of transportation facilities, and

WHEREAS, the Eastside Transportation Partnership has identified \$1.13 billion in critical transportation needs for projects on the Eastside, for which there is no funding, and

WHEREAS, cities need county assistance to initiate certain local option transportation taxes, and

WHEREAS, the City of Seattle adopted Resolution 29672 on November 24, 1997 requesting the King County council to submit a local option motor fuel tax to the voters of King County, and

WHEREAS, incorporation of new cities within King County has greatly increased the role of funding partnerships in accomplishing major transportation projects, and

WHEREAS, local option transportation taxes are specifically intended for funding joint transportation projects while county road funds are directed for use on roads in the unincorporated area, and

WHEREAS, the King County Comprehensive Plan recognizes that many city and state transportation projects aid in the implementation of county policies, and

WHEREAS, the 1990 Washington State Legislature provided authority to counties to enact local option transportation taxes, and

WHEREAS, adequate transportation facilities are critical to the region's economic well-being and to maintaining a high quality of life in King County;

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT MOVED by the Council of King County:

The King County executive and the chair of the metropolitan King County council are hereby requested to convene a conference of elected officials. Members could include: the King County executive, chair of the metropolitan King County council and members of the metropolitan King County council Transportation Committee, the Mayor of the City of

Seattle, the President of the Seattle City Council and members of the city of Seattle

Transportation Committee, the mayors of King County cities, the chair of the Suburban

Cities Association, the city of Seattle and Suburban city representation on the Central

Puget Sound Regional Transit Authority and the metropolitan King County council

Regional Transit Committee, and other members of the Eastside Transportation

Partnership, the SeaShore Transportation Forum, and the South County Area

Transportation Board (SCATBoard), for the purpose of discussing the enactment and appropriate use of local option transportation revenues.

The agenda, Moving King County 2000, shall include the identification of options for targeting the revenues to specific types of transportation improvements in order to maximize the effective use of resources.
