### 1998-99 CULTURAL EDUCATION GRANT RECOMMENDATIONS KING COUNTY ARTS COMMISSION

#### **PROCESS**

The Cultural Education Advisory Committee met on April 3<sup>rd</sup> and 5<sup>th</sup>, 1998 to review 87 applications to the 1998-99 Cultural Education Program (12 heritage applications, 8 joint heritage and arts applications, and 67 arts applications). The total amount of funding available in this year's cultural education fund was \$455,171. The total amount of funding requested was \$820,801; the total of project budgets leveraged by these requests was \$2,077,628.

The number of projects increased slightly from last year, up from 83. Committee members reviewed and ranked each request for funding based upon the following criteria: project quality, feasibility, strength of partnership between applicant and school(s), and curriculum impact.

The review panel included the following members of the Cultural Education Advisory Committee:

Participating Cultural Resources staff members included Charlie Rathbun, Arts Program Coordinator; Holly Taylor, Heritage Education Coordinator; and Lillian Folk, Program Assistant.

#### The following summarizes the panel's recommendations for 1998-99:

- The Committee has recommended a set aside of \$10,000 in program funds from the total program budget of \$455,171 for the development of an updated on-line Cultural Education Resource Guide.
- The Committee recommended to support a total of 58 Cultural Education projects, with a total of \$ 445,171.
- Of that total recommended allocation, \$98,916 was allocated as heritage funding, and \$346,255 was allocated as arts funding.
- 4 projects which combined arts and heritage elements, with a total of \$ 21,968 in heritage funding and \$14,455 in arts funding were recommended.
- 44 arts projects with a total of \$331,800 were recommended.

#### ARTS PROJECTS

1. **Applicant:** Issaquah Arts Commission Issaquah School District

**Project:** "Artists In Issaquah Schools" First time applicant, the Issaquah Arts Commission, will develop a partnership with the Issaquah School District. Two artist residencies by visual artists Roger Fernandes and Peter Donaldson will expand the curriculum to incorporate art. Roger Fernandes will present Northwest Native American art and art traditions to 3<sup>rd</sup> grade students through story telling and hands-on arts activities. Artist Peter Donaldson will expand on Issaquah's 5<sup>th</sup> grade curriculum with history, drama and arts presentations focused on United States history. Videotapes of the residency program will be used to build a library resource for teachers. Additionally, all 3<sup>rd</sup> and 5<sup>th</sup> grade teachers will take part in an arts education in-service workshop.

2. **Applicant:** Nordic Heritage Museum Olympic Hills Elementary

**Project:** "A World of Dance – Multi-cultural dance instruction for the classroom" The Nordic Heritage Museum will work with the entire staff and every classroom at Olympic Hills Elementary to investigate traditional folk dances from six different cultures. Lessons will incorporate researching particular dance cultures, working with six different folk artists who will teach the various dance forms, and will end with the entire school performing and sharing the six forms of dance in an all-school cultural event attended by the children's families.

3. Applicant: African American Heritage Museum Sharples Alternative School

**Project:** "Youth Multi-Cultural Historical Mural Project" Visual artist Samuel Pierce will work with students grades 6-12 to introduce them to historical research that will be utilized to develop a community mural. Samuel will collaborate with teachers to develop lesson plans that will integrate current academic subject matter. Lessons will incorporate instructions in drawing, painting, design, and composition. The students will research and select honored historical figures from their culture to feature in the mural. The public presentation of the mural will showcase the student's work to the student body and community.

4. Applicant: Pratt Fine Arts Center
Cleveland, Franklin, and Rainier Beach High Schools

**Project:** "Fired Up About Glass!" This is the fifth year of Pratt's award winning glass arts program. Following three successful years at Cleveland, Pratt launched the program at Rainier Beach High School last year. This year Pratt will introduce "Fired Up About Glass!" to Franklin High School. This program utilizes a well-developed curriculum that incorporates classroom instruction, demonstrations by distinguished guest artists and field trips to working glass studios.

5. Applicant: Jim Robbins

Enumclaw Junior High

Black Diamond Elementary School

Westwood Elementary School

**Project:** "Curriculum of Hope" Jim Robbins will work with instructors in the Enumclaw School District to incorporate picture narratives as a bridge to integrating creative writing into the existing curriculum for 4<sup>th</sup> and 5<sup>th</sup> grade classes. Students will work in creative writing workshops before Jim begins six weeks of visual art workshops in which students incorporate personal stories into pictures. The project includes district wide teacher training, evaluation and video documentation.

6. Applicant: J. Paul Preseault

Summit K-12 School

**Project:** "My Community: The Poetry and Performance of Being US" Workshops led by J. Paul Preseault will contribute to the creation of original poetry about the student's concept of community. Selected poems will be expanded on by drama students and will be given visual form through improvisationally based movement interpretation. Musical interpretations will add to the multi-disciplinary artistic perspectives. There will be two special presentations, one for the writers, performers and staff; another at *Glimpses* that brings all summit students K-12 together in a winter celebration of the arts.

7. Applicant: Billy Seago

Tyee High School Chinook Middle School Bow Lake Elementary School

**Project:** "Theatre Arts Residency for Deaf and Hard of Hearing Students" Nationally renowned deaf theatre artist Billy Seago will teach basics of drama during three 12 week residencies. Working with teachers and students, Bill will conduct workshops on the basics of sign language and the deaf culture. Students will learn signs for their roles as well as stage direction and acting skills. The culminating public performance will showcase the work to the student body and community. Teacher goals for the project include increased awareness and understanding of the deaf student population in the participating schools.

8. Applicant: Arts 2000

International School

**Project:** "Fireworks: An interdisciplinary approach to the Fire Arts" Through a partnership between ARTS 2000 and the International School, professional artists will work with students and teachers as mentors. This project will provide the International School (IS) students interdisciplinary explorations in the fire arts of metal, glass, and clay. Activities will integrate art into the school's 1998-1999 curricular themes of the Americas and Europe (high schools) and Systems in Conflict (middle school theme). The project will provide opportunities within and beyond the school day, on and off campus. Professional artists in "fire arts" techniques will train teachers at the International School. This will establish "fire arts" as a continuing course of study in the school curriculum.

9. Applicant: Shoreline Arts Council

Shoreline School District

**Project:** "Dance 3!!! Creative movement in Elementary Schools" A continuation and expansion of the Shoreline Arts Council's dance education program into seven Shoreline School District schools. Utilizing three of Washington State's most respected dance educators, the program will provide comprehensive and sequential dance training for elementary school students. The discipline of dance has been recognized as the most overlooked art form taught in public school education today. This project will address teacher training, exposure to dance for all students, intensive training for advanced students and curriculum design critical to the state's Essential Learning Requirements. The project will also implement a new partnership between the Shoreline School District and the Creative Dance Center.

10. Applicant: D. Fatimah Gordon

Marshall Alternative High School Sharples Alternative High School

**Project:** "Rhythms and Rituals" Working with two alternative high schools for high risk youth referred by the Seattle School District, African American artist Fatimah Gordon will teach authentic African music and dance as a way of fostering pride in African heritage through performance art. Students will create their own dances, connecting with their specific curriculum. A culminating event will unite the project results of the entire school's student population, teachers and parents.

11. Applicant: Vashon Allied Arts

Vashon Island School District

Project: "Vashon Artists in Schools: Ten Years Later" In 1999, Vashon Allied Arts (VAA) and Vashon Island School District will be celebrating 10 years of Vashon Artists in Schools partnership. This program brings community artists into classrooms, K-12, to provide curriculum-based residencies in visual, performing, literary and media arts. Teachers apply to the program in the fall by selecting a partner artist from VAA's Artist Roster of over 45 professional local and regional artists. Together they design a project which must address specific program purposes: enhancement of existing curricula; integrated use of the arts; alignment of residency goals with Essential Learning Requirements in the Arts; fostering creative collaborations among artist teacher teams; enrichment and promotion of multi-cultural education; and linking artist residencies with curriculum focusing on Vashon's natural environment or cultural heritage.

12. Applicant: Peter Donaldson

Cascade Elementary School

**Project:** "The Story of the Harlem Renaissance" Peter Donaldson will provide a menu of history, drama and arts presentations coordinated with Cascade Elementary school, creating a dramatic learning experience built around the Harlem Renaissance. Acting exercises, depicting the lives of participants in African American history, followed by teacher facilitated student work will lead to performances and the development of a mural. Lessons incorporate creative writing exercises, researching primary source documents, visual and performing arts techniques. Public performance and exhibition of artwork produced during the class will showcase the student's work.

13. Applicant: Meredith Berlin

New Options Middle School Pine Lake Middle School

Project: "Getting the Story Across: Integrated Dramatic/Visual Language Arts" This program integrates drama and visual arts into established language arts curricula at New Options Middle School (N.O.M.S.) and Pine Lake Middle School. Meredith Berlin, former conflict resolution skills and theatre arts instructor at N.O.M.S will work with instructors at both schools to create an exchange of writing, video and art with students in different communities. Lessons are designed to provide students with intensive training in dramatic and visual arts, to connect experiences with artists to the language arts curriculum as a whole, and to create a meaningful exchange of ideas and artwork between a suburban and urban school, so that students discover common experiences and new perspectives.

14. Applicant: 911 Media Arts

Sartori School Re-entry Program Indian Heritage High School Madison Middle School

**Project:** "The Reel World: Video Art by Youth" Video artist Mallory Graham in collaboration with 911 will provide an intensive immersion into the field of video art production for three different schools. The program will include an examination of media literacy and critical viewing skills, acquisition of the technical skills necessary to become a video artist, and will culminate in the production of a student created video piece. A public presentation will showcase the work to the community.

15. Applicant: Northwest Folklife

Juanita High School

**Project:** "Celebrating the Cycles of Life" Northwest Folklife and Ocheami, an African American music and dance ensemble, will provide a lively examination of Ga culture (from southern Ghana) including songs in the Ga language; the dances associated with those songs; characteristic drumming patterns and a host of cultural details connected to the life-cycle ceremony, including proverbs and stories. The 10<sup>th</sup> grade world studies class will work with established curricula, members of Ocheami, and education specialists at Northwest Folklife to learn how different cultures address human needs.

New Options Middle School (N.O.M.S.)

**Project:** "Movement & Ideas: Finding New Ways to Tell a Story" On the Boards (OTB) facilitates the involvement of their internationally and nationally acclaimed artists in this new and innovative classroom design. Dance as an art form is a very direct expression of complex literary concepts, such as symbolism, metaphor, allegory and motif, and integrates successfully N.O.M.S.' interdisciplinary curriculum of language arts, social studies and art. This program moves beyond the common use of dance as physical education to a multiple use of dance as a method to explore, analyze and communicate complex ideas.

17. Applicant: Peter Gross

Sunny Hills Elementary School Gregory Heights Elementary School

**Project:** "First Edition!" Funded in 1997-98, First Edition is a curriculum-based program in printmaking and book arts for fourth and fifth graders piloted at Sunny Hills Elementary School. Expanding upon the pilot program, fifth graders who have participated in the program will become "master printers" and will act as mentors to in-coming fourth graders. This program will focus on transforming student-written texts into images. Work from this program will be displayed on a dedicated wall in the activity room of Sunny Hills. In 1998-1999 the project will be expanded to the writing classes at Gregory Heights Elementary School in the Highline School District.

18. Applicant: Intiman Theatre

Renton High School

**Project:** "Living History" In close partnership with the teachers of Renton High School, the Intiman will conduct its nationally acclaimed arts in education program designed to meet the specific curriculum themes and issues of the students and staff. Professional artists present a school wide performance and then work within specific classrooms reenacting scenes and engaging students in dialogue with the characters about the issues involved. Play selection and characterizations are tailored to the individual school and curriculum and classroom teachers and students become participants in the dramatic reenactment and dynamic tensions of the characters.

19. Applicant: Teen Arts Collaborative

Seattle School District

**Project:** "Art for Talented, Art for Novice, Art for Teachers" Artist John Affolter will continue to provide his integrated and highly successful visual art program at the King County Youth Detention Center for incarcerated youth, now in its fifth year. In an effort to expand the impact of his program, John will work with teachers and staff to train and inform them of goals, methods and success of his work with youth in the facility. Teachers will work with John to plan, implement and evaluate visual art curriculum in their classes. This is a response to growing interest from the other teachers in the facility and appreciation from students, security personnel and administration.

20. Applicant: Seattle Art Museum

Seattle School District

**Project:** "Growing up with Art Middle School Partnerships" This is the third year of this successful program using arts education to improve students' vocabulary and writing, critical thinking skills, creativity, imagination and cooperative thinking. Through classroom residencies by artists, museum professionals, teacher training, and field trips to the museum, students will learn about contrasting cultures as reflected through their cultural artifacts, create their own artwork based upon their perceptions, and learn to express their ideas and reactions to various works of art including that of their peers.

SCT artists and classroom teachers will employ the Mantle of the Expert, a technique that requires the children to assume the roles of experts in a given field to examine a theme or topic. Lessons incorporate interdisciplinary academic coursework with kinesthetic, expressive, and creative experiences designed by Seattle Children's Theatre (SCT) artists.

22. Applicant: Young Shakespeare Workshop
Roosevelt High School

Project: "Young Shakespeare Workshop's Residency at Roosevelt High School" Young Shakespeare Workshop (YSW) brings an intensive, language based introduction to the works of Shakespeare to intermediate/advanced acting class. The workshops culminate in three performances. In addition to memorization and analysis of short texts, students will learn to work from original texts, delving into Elizabethan orthography and punctuation that reflects the speaker. ## 1998-99 CULTURAL EDUCATION PROGRAM RECOMMENDATIONS KING COUNTY LANDMARKS AND HERITAGE COMMISSION

#### **PROCESS**

The Cultural Education Advisory Committee met on April 3<sup>rd</sup> and 5<sup>th</sup>, 1998 to review 87 applications to the 1998-99 Cultural Education Program (12 heritage applications, 8 joint heritage and arts applications, and 67 arts applications). The total amount of funding available in this year's cultural education fund was \$455,171. The total amount of funding requested was \$820,801; the total of project budgets leveraged by these requests was \$2,077,628.

The number of projects eligible for heritage funding increased from last year, and the overall number of requests increased slightly from last year, up from 83. Committee members reviewed and ranked each request for funding based upon the following criteria: project quality, feasibility, strength of partnership between applicant and school(s), and curriculum impact.

Participating Office of Cultural Resources staff members included Charlie Rathbun, Arts Program Coordinator; Holly Taylor, Heritage Education Coordinator; and Lillian Folk, Program Assistant.

#### The following summarizes the panel's recommendations for 1998-99:

- The Committee has recommended a set aside of \$10,000 in program funds from the total program budget of \$455,171 for the development of an updated on-line Cultural Education Resource Guide.
- The panel recommended to support a total of 58 Cultural Education projects, with a total of \$445,171.
- Of that total recommended allocation, \$98,916 was allocated as heritage funding, and \$346,255 was allocated as arts funding.
- 10 heritage projects with a total of \$76,948 were recommended.
- 4 projects which combined arts and heritage elements, with a total of \$21,968 from heritage and \$14,455 from arts and were recommended. Of these four combined projects, three were identified by the applicants as heritage projects, and one was identified by the applicant as a joint arts and heritage projects.
- 44 arts projects with a total of \$331,800 were recommended.
