1	A MOTION expressing support for measures that amend
2	the Children's Safe Products Act by banning certain toxic
3	flame retardants in products designed for children, and
4	requiring assessment of alternatives to other chemicals of
5	concern, being considered by the Washington state
6	Legislature.
7	WHEREAS, parents and caregivers of young children acknowledge the special
8	responsibility they have for assuring children's physical wellbeing, including the duty to
9	protect them from exposure to harmful products and toxic substances, and
10	WHEREAS, in carrying out such responsibility, parents and caregivers place trust
11	in product manufacturers for consideration of safety and health concerns in the
12	production of consumer products widely available through major retail outlets,
13	particularly those intended for use in service to children, and
14	WHEREAS, a recent assessment of children's products purchased from major
15	retailers, such as car seats, bassinette pads, changing pads and nursing pillows, has found
16	that, of the twenty items tested, seventeen showed evidence of the presence of toxic flame
17	retardants, and
18	WHEREAS, the most frequently detected chemical among these flame retardants
19	is a chemical known as "chlorinated TRIS," which has been declared a carcinogen by the

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20	state of California, and was removed from children's pajamas several decades ago after
21	laboratory studies found it could cause mutations, and
22	WHEREAS, this assessment was reported on by the Washington Toxics Coalition
23	and Safe States in a report entitled Hidden Hazards in the Nursery, January 2012, and
24	WHEREAS, the report indicated further that these toxic flame retardants are used
25	to treat polyurethane foam that was present in all of the products tested, and that the toxic
26	flame retardants are not chemically bound to the foam, and therefore can escape into the
27	home environment and settle on surfaces, and
28	WHEREAS the report described young children's heightened vulnerability to the
29	effects of household toxics exposure, because their biological systems are still in early
30	development, and because they spend more time near floors where household dust can
31	gather and be ingested through the frequent hand-to-mouth contact that is characteristic
32	of young children, and
33	WHEREAS, the report notes that some manufacturers currently employ
34	alternatives to the use of toxic fire retardants for children's products, demonstrating that
35	there are viable nontoxic options available, and
36	WHEREAS, the report also describes the potential of toxic chemicals from
37	consumer products to make their way into the region's natural environment and
38	accumulate in waterways and in the tissue of local species of fish and wildlife, and
39	WHEREAS, state governments are at the forefront of efforts to protect children
40	from the effects of such toxics by requiring manufacturers to limit or eliminate their use
41	in children's products, including a ban by the state of New York of a TRIS flame

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42	retardant called TCEP, and consideration by several state legislatures of measures to ban
43	toxic flame retardants in children's products, and
44	WHEREAS the Washington state Legislature is considering measures in its 2012
45	legislative session, Senate Bill 6120 and House Bill 2266, each amending the Children's
46	Safe Products Act, which would: prohibit the manufacture, sale or distribution of
47	children's products containing TRIS; require manufacturers of children's products
48	containing specified toxic chemicals to identify alternatives; and authorize the
49	Washington state Department of Ecology to require manufactures of children's products
50	containing chemicals of high concern to conduct alternatives assessments of two such
51	chemicals per year, and
52	WHEREAS, the legislation that was introduced this legislative session has been
53	amended in a way that substantially weakens the intent of the original, and
54	WHEREAS, parents in King County, and residents of the region generally, have
55	great interest in the legislature's action on the amendment to the Children's Safe Products
56	Act as a tool to ensure the safety of products for children,
57	NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT MOVED by the Council of King County:
58	The council strongly supports passage of the original version of either House Bill
59	2266 or Senate Bill 6120 introduced in the 2012 regular session of Washington state

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- 60 legislature. These measures call for reasonable amendments to the Children's Safe
- 61 Products Act.
