1	A MOTION related to: petroleum transport by rail through
2	King County; an updated emergency management plan to
3	specifically address the risk from increased transport of
4	Bakken formation petroleum transport by rail; and railroad
5	company partnership to identify and mitigate risks, and to
6	jointly plan and train for an emergency response.
7	WHEREAS, the region's railway network is fundamental to King County's
8	manufacturing and shipping economy, and is an environmentally responsible method of
9	moving passengers and freight, and
10	WHEREAS, new technologies have resulted in the production of historic amount
11	of domestic and foreign petroleum, which will significantly increase the volume of
12	petroleum and petroleum products moving by rail through Washington, and
13	WHEREAS, the state of Washington is a destination for petroleum produced in
14	western states, due to its refining capacity and proximity to shipping infrastructure, and
15	WHEREAS, the volume of petroleum-by-rail moving through King County to
16	petroleum refineries in northwestern Washington is expected to triple to over one million
17	barrels per week, and
18	WHEREAS, the primary source of the petroleum anticipated to be transported by
19	rail through King County is from the Bakken formation, which the U.S. Department of

Transportation Pipeline and Hazardous Materials Safety Administration has warned is 20 21 more explosive than traditional crude oil, and WHEREAS, rail companies operating in Washington state are committed to the 22 safe transport of commodities and freight, and according to the Federal Railroad 23 Administration in 2013 had one of their safest operating years in history despite growing 24 volume of cargo, and 25 WHEREAS, the rail lines that carry petroleum run through King County's rural 26 and urban cities, our neighborhoods and parks, business and industrial areas, near 27 schools, sporting arenas and stadiums, through our mountain passes, atop our watersheds 28 29 and along our waterfront, rivers and other natural areas, and WHEREAS, rail traffic also moves beneath downtown Seattle in an underground 30 tunnel with no fire protection systems and limited emergency egress or ventilation, and 31 WHEREAS, as illustrated by the 2013 derailment of an oil carrying train in 32 Quebec and other communities, derailments, spills and fires can have catastrophic 33 impacts on communities, their residents and the environment, and 34 WHEREAS, rail companies operating in Washington state have demonstrated a 35 36 willingness and desire to partner with local governments and emergency response agencies to prepare for any possible emergency, and 37 WHEREAS, King County is concerned about the threat to life, safety, our 38 regional economy and the environment from potential spills and fires resulting from the 39 40 transport of petroleum by rail and the need to plan and prepare for a potential emergency, and 41

42 WHEREAS, the current Comprehensive Emergency Management Plan does not specifically address the unique risks associated with rail transport of petroleum products, 43 including Bakken formation crude; 44 NOW THEREFORE, BE IT MOVED by the Council of King County: 45 A. The council requests that the office of emergency management, in 46 47 consultation with local governments, emergency response entities and rail companies operating in the state of Washington, review and update the county's Comprehensive 48 Emergency Management Plan to specifically address the risk from increased transport of 49 50 petroleum by rail, as soon as is practicable, but in no event, later than March 1, 2015. The update shall be named the Annex to the Comprehensive Emergency Management 51 Plan. The development of the annex shall include a needs assessment report, which shall 52 be transmitted to the council by October 31, 2014. The needs assessment report shall 53 assess the county's capability and resources available to respond to an oil train fire. Both 54 the needs assessment and Annex to the Comprehensive Emergency Management Plan 55 shall be filed in the form of a paper original and an electronic copy with the clerk of the 56 council, who shall retain the original and provide an electronic copy to all 57 58 councilmembers, the council chief of staff, and the lead staff for the transportation, 59 economy, and environment committee or its successor. 60 B. The council further requests that the office of emergency management explore 61 coordinating and conducting multijurisdiction emergency preparedness training activities in conjunction with the Washington state Department of Ecology, the Washington 62 Military Department Emergency Management Division, the Washington Department of 63

- Fish and Wildlife, the United States Coast Guard, local governments, emergency response entities and rail companies operating in the state of Washington.
- C. The council strongly urges rail companies operating in the state of Washington to share with emergency management agencies and first responders the following, so that the state and local communities can be fully informed of and plan for the risks posed by the transport of petroleum by rail: types of petroleum, petroleum products and petroleum

- derivatives; transportation routes; the frequency and duration of transfers of petroleum;
- and efforts and actions to ensure the safe transport of such commodities.
