ORDINANCE NO. 3732

AN ORDINANCE relating to animal control, establishing a process for the consideration of establishing dog control zones; adding a new section to Ordinance 1896, Article III, and KCC 11.04.200; adding a new section to Ordinance 3548 and KCC 11.08; repealing Ordinance 3548, Section 7 and KCC 11.08.050; and amending Ordinance 3548, Section 2 and KCC 11.08.020.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF KING COUNTY:

<u>NEW SECTION</u>. <u>SECTION 1</u>. There is added to KCC 11.08 a new section to read as follows:

Petitions to create dog control zones. 1. Petitions requesting the King County Council to create a dog control zone shall be submitted to the Office of the Clerk of the Council. The Clerk of the Council shall forward copies of the petitions and other materials to:

- a. The office of the councilmember in whose district the proposed zone is requested; and
- b. The Animal Control Section of the General Services
 Division; and
 - c. The Records and Elections Division.
- 2. Petitions shall be accompanied by a map and should include a legal description of the proposed zone. In addition, the petitions should contain:
- a. The signatures (written and printed legibly) of at least ten per cent of the registered voters within the proposed zone; and
 - b. The popular addresses of the petitioners.
- 3. Upon receipt of the copy of the filed petition, the Animal Control Section shall conduct a comprehensive review of the enforceability of the proposed boundaries and if necessary recommend alternative boundaries to the County Administrative Officer and the affected councilmember.
 - 4. The Records and Elections Division shall:
 - a. Determine the approximate number of registered voters

within the proposed zone;

- b. Determine the number of signatures of registered voters contained in the petition; and
- c. Forward the conclusions regarding the number of signatures of registered voters and total number of registered voters residing within the proposed zone to the office of the affected councilmember and the County Administrative Officer.
- 5. The Executive may recommend a proposed dog control zone to the Council based on the recommendation of the County Administrative Officer. An ordinance to create a dog control zone may be introduced by a member or members of the Council.
- 6. In addition to other statutory requirements, the Council may cause to occur such public meetings or notification through the local media as deemed necessary to insure that affected citizens are aware of the proposed ordinance to create a dog control zone.
- 7. If the King County Council finds the formation of the petitioned area to be beneficial to the public health, safety and general welfare, it shall establish such a dog control zone by ordinance. The Council shall consider, but is not limited to, the location, terrain and surrounding land use of the petitioned area.
- SECTION 2. Ordinance 3548, Section 7 and KCC 11.08.050 are hereby repealed.
- SECTION 3. Ordinance 3548, Section 2, and KCC 11.08.020 are hereby amended as follows:
- <u>Definitions</u>. In construing the provisions of this chapter, except where otherwise plainly declared or clearly apparent from the context, words used in this chapter shall be given their common and ordinary meaning; in addition, the following definitions shall apply:
- (a) "At large" means to be off the premises of the owner and not under the control of the owner by leash; provided,

that an animal within an automobile or other vehicle of its owner shall be deemed to be upon the owner's premises.

- (b) "Lawful training" means to be engaged in training on the premises of the owner or on the land of another person by permission, or on public land that is set aside for training or is open for hunting or trapping; provided, that the dog is accompanied afield by the owner or trainer. A "no-shooting" area shall not be interpreted to mean a "no-training" area.
- (c) "Leash" includes a cord, thong or chain not more than fifteen feet in length by which an animal is physically controlled by the person accompanying it.
- (d) "Restraint" An animal is considered to be under restraint if it is ((eonfined)) maintained and remains within the property limits of its owner or keeper ((by-a-suitable-fence,-or securely-restrained-within-the-premises-by-a-leash-affixed-to-a post-or-other-securely-fixed-object)).

SECTION 4. Notwithstanding the provisions of this ordinance, any councilmember may introduce legislation to enact a dog control zone.
