ORDINANCE NO. 3872

AN ORDINANCE relating to the protection and retention of farm and open space lands in King County and authorizing the King County Executive, with the approval of the Council, to acquire development rights for the purpose of permanently retaining such land.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF KING COUNTY:

SECTION 1. Findings and Declaration of Purpose.

The Council affirms and adopts findings and declaration of purpose set forth in section 1 of Ordinance 3064, KCC section 20.54.010. In addition the Council finds that:

- (1) King County is a desirable place to live and visit because of the quantity, variety and natural beauty of its open space which contributes a vital ingredient to the quality of life in the County. The open space resources of King County presently include over fifty-thousand acres of land suitable for farming. Such land is an important resource which provides aesthetic, economic and educational benefits to the citizens of King County and is a significant part of our heritage.
- (2) Land suitable for agricultural uses is a unique and irreplaceable environment with soil and topographic characteristics which have been developed over generations of agricultural use. When such land is converted to uses which do not require those special fertility and landscape characteristics, an important natural resource and the farmer's investment in its development are lost to the citizens of King County.
- (3) The viability of the agricultural industry in King County is threatened by uncertainty regarding potential changes in values and in the land use classification of land suitable for agricultural uses.

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(4) Agricultural land uses are affected by the activities permitted and carried out on adjacent properties. Incompatible uses on adjacent properties will, where nuisance conflicts are created, negatively impact the continued use of agricultural land for productive farming purposes.

- (5) The agricultural industry in King County provides the citizens of the County with the opportunity to purchase locallyproduced food and dairy products through the Pike Place Market, farmers markets and other local outlets.
- (6) A significant portion of the land in King County suitable for agricultural uses is located in river valleys which are subject to periodic flooding. Development of such land for nonagricultural uses aggravates flooding, replaces water retentive with impervious surfaces, and creates pressure for construction of publicly-funded flood control projects.
- (7) A significant portion of the land in King County suitable for agricultural uses is not currently served by urban services such as sewer, water and public road systems. The pressure for development of such land for more intensive uses creates a concomitant pressure for publicly-financed urban services the cost of which may exceed the revenue generated by the nonagricultural development they serve. The extension of urban services into areas now comprised primarily of agricultural land encourages increased urban sprawl in violation of the policies of the King County Comprehensive Plan and discourages conservation of limited energy resources.
- (8) While traditional land use regulations will continue to be an important tool in land use planning in King County, such regulations alone do not provide stable, long-term protection for lands suitable for agricultural uses.

- (9) While current use taxation for agricultural uses such as that authorized by RCW Ch. 84.34 and KCC Ch. 20.36 will continue to be available for farm and open space land, the current use taxation program has proven insufficient to halt the trend toward rapid conversion of King County's agricultural lands to nonagricultural uses.
- (10) The acquisition by King County of a fee simple or some lesser interest in eligible agricultural land is authorized by the Washington State Constitution and statutes and by the King County Charter and ordinances.

The Council concludes that:

- (1) King County should afford permanent protection to open space land suitable for agricultural uses by acquiring interests in such land and in adjacent properties sufficient to encourage the use of those lands for agricultural and open space purposes and to prevent the development of such land for other purposes.
- (2) Acquisition by King County of a fee simple or some lesser interest in agricultural land and open space land suitable for agricultural uses will ensure the protection of such lands in perpetuity. Acquisition by the County from their owners of the right to use such lands for non-agricultural purposes will permit the County to restrict the future use of such lands and encourage the continued viability of agriculture and farming in King County.
- (3) The Council declares that by authorizing acquisition of a fee simple or some lesser interest in certain lands suitable for agricultural uses, it is the purpose of this ordinance to:
- (a) Maintain the open and undeveloped character of lands suitable for agricultural uses;

- (b) Maintain the aesthetic, scenic and educational qualities of agricultural land for the citizens of King County;
- (c) Alleviate the demand for the publicly-financed urban services and flood control projects which are often necessary for more intensive development of agricultural land;
- (d) Facilitate the continuation of productive agriculture as a viable industry in King County;
- (e) Reduce the pressure for conversion of agricultural land to nonagricultural uses; and
- (f) Provide for the citizens of King County the opportunity to continue purchasing fresh, locally-grown food products.

SECTION 2. Definitions.

- 1. "Eligible agricultural land" means land designated in section 6 of Ord. 3064, KCC 20.54.060, as it may be hereafter amended, as agricultural lands of county significance and which also constitutes "open space land", "farm and agricultural land", or both, as defined in RCW 84.34.020(1) and (2).
- 2. "Agricultural rights" means a fee interest in real property and the right to use eligible agricultural land for purposes and activities related to horticultural, livestock, dairy and other agricultural and open space uses, all as specified in the instruments described in regulations promulgated pursuant to this ordinance.
- 3. "Development rights" means an interest in real property and the right to use eligible agricultural land for any and all residential, commercial and industrial purposes and activities of a non-agricultural nature, all as specified in the instruments described in regulations promulgated pursuant to this ordinance.

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- 4. "Value of development rights" means the difference between the fair market value of property and the fair market value of the agricultural rights to that property.
- 5. "Executive" means the King County Executive or the Director of the Office of Agriculture for functions delegated to the Director by regulation or Executive Order.
- 6. "Owner" means the party or parties having the fee interest, a real estate contract vendor's or vendee's interest, or a mortgator's or grantor of a deed of trust's interest in land.
- 7. "Food-producing horticultural land" means land used for the commercial, soil-dependent cultivation of plants for food, including vegetables, small fruits, large fruits, cereal grains and silage corn.
- 8. "Food-producing livestock land" means open land used for the growing, keeping and feeding of animals for the commercial production of food for human consumption, and includes the cultivation of pasture, grass and other field crops for consumption by such animals.

SECTION 3. Authorization to Acquire; Options; Method of Payment.

1. The Executive is hereby authorized, pursuant to the provisions of this ordinance, to acquire and offer to acquire by purchase, gift, grant, bequest, devise, lease, covenant, contract or otherwise the fee simple or any lesser interest, development right, easement, covenant or other contractual right in eligible agricultural lands in incorporated and unincorporated King County in order to carry out the purposes of this ordinance.

- 2. The Executive is also authorized to obtain options to acquire a fee simple or any lesser interest in eligible agricultural lands in incorporated and unincorporated King County. The value of the interest to be acquired through the option shall be determined in accordance with section 4 of this ordinance.
- 3. To the greatest extent practicable, the Executive shall acquire only the development rights or some less than fee interest in eligible agricultural lands. Acquisition of the fee simple interest is authorized in any case determined appropriate by the Executive because of one of the following factors: (a) the value of the development rights is nearly equivalent to the fair market value of the property; (b) fee simple acquisition is deemed necessary to maintain agricultural uses of the property through reconveyance or lease of the agricultural rights by the County; (c) fee simple acquisition is necessary in order to acquire any interest in the subject property.
- 4. The Executive is authorized to pay the purchase price in a lump sum single payment at time of closing or to enter into executory conditional sales contracts for the making of installment payments against the purchase price. When installment purchases are made, the Executive is authorized to pay interest on the declining unpaid principal balance at a legal rate of interest consistent with prevailing market conditions at the time of execution of the installment contract and adjusted for the tax exempt status of such interest.

SECTION 4. Determination of Value.

1. The Executive shall conduct two appraisals of eligible agricultural land in order to determine the fair market value of the property and the fair market value of the agricultural rights only. The Executive may utilize county appraisers and, as determined necessary, private MAI or SREA appraisers. The offering

 owner of agricultural land may also, at his or her own expense, submit to King County one or more appraisals conducted by the owner or by an appraiser selected by the owner.

2. All appraisals for the property, whether conducted by the County or a private appraiser, shall be reviewed by the Real Property Division and the Office of Agriculture. Based upon said appraisals, the Real Property Division and the Office of Agriculture shall recommend to the Executive a value for the interest to be acquired by King County. The Executive shall then determine the value of the interest to be acquired by King County.

 $\underline{\textbf{SECTION 5.}} \quad \textbf{Process for Approval and Consummation of } \\ \textbf{Acquisition.}$

- 1. The Executive may approve, subject also to the approval of the Council, the acquisition of agricultural land or of an interest in agricultural land only upon making the following determinations:
 - (a) The land is eligible agricultural land;
- (b) The ownership of the property has been verified by a title search;
- (c) The acquisition price is consistent with the Executive's determination of the value of the interest being purchased;
- (d) Adequate funds have been appropriated to pay the acquisition price;
- (e) The acquisition is consistent with all other applicable provisions of the ordinance and any rules or regulations promulgated by the Executive.
- 2. The Executive may determine that a portion of the land offered by a single owner is suitable for acquisition by the county while the remainder of the offered land is unsuitable.

 In such cases the Executive shall reject the offer and may offer to acquire only that portion deemed suitable for acquisition by the County. The Executive may reject any and all offers for the sale to the County of development rights or other interests in eligible agricultural land.

- 3. Acquisition by King County of interests in eligible agricultural land shall be accomplished by the owner's execution of an instrument of conveyance or by King County and the owner's execution of a covenant or executory conditional sales contract to purchase in a form approved by the Executive and after the approval by the King County Council.
- 4. Upon closing of the acquisition transaction, the Executive shall cause the instrument of conveyance, covenant or contract to be recorded with the King County Records and Elections Division.

SECTION 6. Purchase of Remaining Agricultural Rights.

- 1. After King County has acquired the development rights to eligible agricultural land, the Executive is authorized to purchase the remaining agricultural rights in such land subject to the provisions of this section if the Executive determines that such land cannot reasonably be used for its intended agricultural use.
- 2. Upon application by the owner for purchase of the remaining agricultural rights in the land, the Executive shall determine the value of such rights pursuant to the method described in section 4 of this ordinance. The Executive may, when appropriate, use the appraisal or appraisals previously prepared for the property to assist in determining the value of the agricultural rights.

- 3. Prior to approving the acquisition of the remaining agricultural rights, the Executive may also require the owner to offer the agricultural rights for sale or lease to private parties at the fair market value of the agricultural rights determined pursuant to section 4 of this ordinance. Such offers shall be made and advertised in accordance with rules and regulations adopted by the Executive.
- 4. Upon making the determinations set out in section 5 of this ordinance, the Executive may approve the acquisition of the agricultural rights in land to which the County has previously acquired the development rights. The Executive may reject any and all offers for the sale to the County of remaining agricultural rights.
- 5. The remaining agricultural rights shall be conveyed to King County by means of the owner's execution of an instrument of conveyance or by King County's and the owner's execution of an executory conditional sales contract to purchase in a form approved by the Executive.
- 6. Upon closing of the acquisition transaction, the Executive shall cause the instrument of conveyance or contract to be recorded with the King County Records and Elections Division.

 $\underline{\text{SECTION 7.}} \quad \text{Lease or Conveyance by King County of the} \\ \text{Agricultural Rights.}$

1. For the purpose of implementing the policies of this ordinance, the Executive is authorized to lease or convey the agricultural rights to which King County has acquired ownership pursuant to this ordinance: Provided that, no action to carry out the provisions of this section is authorized until a specific plan to manage these lands is prepared by the County executive and approved by the County Council. Said plan should include the formation of a farm advisory board to set standards for financial responsibility and farm production for prospective lessees.

- 2. The use of all properties leased or conveyed pursuant to this section shall be restricted to the agricultural rights uses permitted under the terms of the instrument, if any, by which the development rights in the land were originally conveyed to King County.
- 3. Each sale or lease of property shall be made pursuant to the procedures in KCC Chapter 4.56, as it may be hereafter amended. Where the express provisions of this ordinance conflict with KCC Ch. 4.56, this ordinance shall govern.

SECTION 8. Reconveyance of Development Rights Prohibited; Condemnation Proceeds.

The Executive shall not reconvey the development rights to eligible agricultural land acquired by King County pursuant to this ordinance. All development rights so acquired are to be held by King County for the benefit of its citizens in perpetuity. The proceeds received by King County from any award in condemnation of the County's interest in eligible agricultural land shall be used for the acquisition of other eligible lands.

SECTION 9. Rules and Regulations.

- 1. The Executive shall have the power in accordance with the provisions of KCC Chapter 2.98 to adopt, amend or repeal any rule or regulation deemed necessary to implement the provisions of this ordinance: Provided, That the Council shall approve such regulations by motion.
- 2. The Executive shall adopt rules or regulations concerning all matters necessary to implement this ordinance, including:
- (a) detailed criteria for the acquisition of eligible lands consistent with the following priorities:

 First Priority - food-producing horticultural lands threatened by urban development;

Second Priority - food-producing livestock lands threatened by urban development;

Third Priority - all other food-producing horticultural lands;

Fourth Priority - lands capable of horticultural food production and threatened by urban development;

Fifth Priority - then, if bond funds remain available after the Council determines that 60% of the lands eligible for acquisition by priorities 1, 2, 3 and 4 have been acquired or found impractical to acquire, all other food producing livestock lands and other eligible lands.

Criteria for selection of lands to be acquired within each priority level may include but not be limited to current use, pressure for development to nonagricultural uses, parcel size, topography, soil classification, type of agricultural products for which the property is suitable, current zoning classification, availability of urban services, proximity to other eligible agricultural lands, and such other criteria as the Executive deems appropriate.

- (b) the development of covenants, instruments of conveyance to King County and contracts for the purchase of the development rights, remaining agricultural rights, fee simple or other interests in eligible agricultural lands acquired pursuant to this ordinance.
- (c) allocation of selling costs, such as for title search, appraisals, recording, taxes and other items, between the owner and King County.

SECTION 10. Resubmission to Voters.

If the Council should find after retirement of any bond issued in furtherance of this program that the public purposes described in section 1 of this ordinance can no longer reasonably be fulfilled, the Council shall submit to the voters of King County a proposition to approve of the disposition of the interests acquired pursuant to this program.

SECTION 11. Severability.

Should any section, subsection, paragraph, sentence, clause or phrase of this ordinance be declared unconstitutional or invalid for any reason, that determination shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this ordinance.
