ordinance no. 8300

AN ORDINANCE reestablishing the King County Arts Commission, describing its mission and purpose, providing guidelines for its powers, duties, operations, and membership, repealing Ordinance 1991, Sections 2 through 8, Ordinance 3018, Sections 1 and 2, Ordinance 3851, Section 1, and K.C.C. 2.48.020 through 2.48.080, and adding new sections to K.C.C. 2.48.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF KING COUNTY:

SECTION 1. Ordinance 1991, Sections 2 through 8, Ordinance 3018, Sections 1 and 2, Ordinance 3851, Section 1, and K.C.C. 2.48.020 through 2.48.080 are each repealed.

NEW SECTION. SECTION 2. Definitions.

- A. "Arts Selection Panels" or "Juries" means a group of individuals, including independent arts professionals and non-artists citizen representatives established by the arts commission to select literary, media, performing, or visual artists for the purchase of services.
- B. "Arts Gift Trust Account" means the fund established in Section 6 of this ordinance.
- C. "Arts Programs" means the community, literary, performing, visual, and other arts programs of the commission, the component parts of which are specified by the commission.
 - D. "Commission" means the King County Arts Commission.
- E. "Commissioner" means an individual appointed to serve on the commission, as described in Section 4 of this ordinance.
 - F. "Council" means the King County council.
 - G. "County" means King County.
 - H. "Director" means the director of the county parks,

arts commission who is the manager of the cultural resources division of the county parks, planning and resources department.

- L. "Exempt Employee" means an employee who is exempt from the provisions of the county career service plan.
- M. "Fiscal Year" means the year beginning January 1 or any other fiscal year duly adopted by the county.
- N. "Individual Artist" means an artist acting individually and independently without affiliation to or with another individual, group, or organization.
 - O. "Law" means federal, state, and/or county law.
- P. "Local Arts Commission" means any of the arts commissions and/or councils which are established by, and function under aegis of, any local government body within the county.
- Q. "Manager" means the manager of the cultural resources division of the county parks, planning, and resources department, who also serves as executive director of the commission.
- R. "Officers of the Commission" means the commissioners duly elected by the commission from time to time to serve as its officers.
- S. "One percent for Art" means the program authorized in Ordinance 6111 and K.C.C. 4.40.010 through 4.40.090 which allocates one percent of construction budgets of certain public works of the county to be set aside for works of art.
- T. "Public Site" is any location within the county which is open to the general public for its use or which is in public view.

NEW SECTION. SECTION 3. It is the policy of King County to foster the excellence, vitality, and diversity of the arts in the county, to make available to all citizens of the county greater opportunities through which to develop understanding and appreciation of the wide range of the arts, and to make arts a

facilitator for local arts commission and other arts organizations within the county.

NEW SECTION. SECTION 4. King County Arts Commission.

- A. Composition and Membership.
- 1. The commission shall be composed of eighteen residents of King County who shall be appointed by the executive subject to confirmation by the council. The executive shall elicit and consider recommendations for membership from the King County Arts Commission, other local arts commissions, and artistic, professional, and civic organizations. The process shall apply to full-term appointments and to the filling of vacancies.
- 2. No more than eight commissioners shall reside within any one city within the county.
- 3. Individuals appointed to the commission should have, among other qualifications making them suitable for commission membership, a demonstrated dedication to the arts and to the arts policy of the county set forth in Section 3 of this ordinance. The executive should also seek representation on the commission of individuals having in-depth knowledge and/or experience with one or more of the following: an artistic discipline, large and small arts institutions, educational institutions, individual artists, principles of art administration, experimental and traditional forms of arts, urban design, and/or public administration. Executive appointments to the commission should seek to reflect county ethnic and community diversity, and an ability to evaluate the needs of arts constituencies in a county as a whole.
 - 4. The council may annually appoint one of its

members to serve for a period of one year as an ex-officio member of the commission.

- The commission shall, in coordination with the executive director, develop and adopt a job description for members of the commission, which shall be kept on file in the office of the commission and furnished to all prospective commission members upon their nomination for appointment to the commission.
- Commissioners shall serve without compensation. Commissioners may be reimbursed for out-of-pocket expenses associated with commission meetings and programs subject to county quidelines.
- 7. All new appointees to the commission shall receive an orientation and training manual. The contents of this manual shall be described in the commission's rules as specified in Section 4.D.2., below. All commissioners shall be eligible for training opportunities.
 - B. Term of Service.
- Appointments to the commission shall be for three-year terms, the term commencing on January 1 of the first calendar year and ending on December 31 of the third calendar year thereafter; provided, that any appointment to fill a vacancy pursuant to Section 4.B.2., below, may commence on any date after the vacancy occurs and shall continue for the remaining portion of the term vacated.
- In the event of the resignation, termination, loss of county residency, death, or disability of a member of the commission prior to the expiration of that member's term, the

- 4. If any commission member shall be absent, without prior approval of the chair, for more than three consecutive regular meetings of the commission, such member's appointment may be terminated by majority vote of the commission.
 - C. Meeting Procedures Election of Officers
- 1. A simple majority of the total number of commissioners shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of commission business. All official actions of the commission require a simple majority vote of the quorum, unless a greater plurality is otherwise specified in the rules of the commission adopted pursuant to this ordinance. The commission shall elect officers annually, during the fourth quarter of the calendar year, to serve from January 1 to Deceber 31 of the subsequent calendar year. The commission shall elect a chair, a vice-chair, secretary-treasurer, and such other officers as it deems necessary.
 - D. Public Meetings Adoption of Rules Record Keeping.
- l. The commission shall hold regular meetings at least monthly. All meetings of the commission shall be advertised and conducted in the manner set forth in Chapter 42.30 R.C.W., Washington State Open Public Meeting Act, as such may be amended from time to time.
- 2. Within six months of the effective date of this ordinance, the commission shall adopt rules for the transaction of its business in accordance K.C.C. 2.98. The commission shall keep minutes of its regular public meetings and records of all official actions. Such rules, minutes, and records of official actions shall be filed in the office of the commission and shall be open to the public to the extent required by state and county law, including Chapter 42.17 R.C.W., relating to public records, as

any person wishing such a record. If subject to disclosure, a copy of the recording of any meeting or any part thereof shall be furnished to any person upon written request and payment of the reasonable expense thereof.

- 4. Commissioners, commission staff, art selection panels, and juries established by the commission shall be subject to and comply with the county's conflict of interest policy stated in $K.C.C.\ 3.04.$
- 5. The commission shall adopt criteria for the allocation of arts program funds and may adopt a jury process adopted by the commission shall be included in the rules adopted pursuant to Section 4.D.2., above.
 - E. Committees.
- 1. The commission may from time to time establish one or more committees to further the policies of the commission, each with such powers as may be lawfully delegated it by the commission.
 - F. Executive Director Section and Evaluation.
- 1. The executive director shall be an exempt position within the county parks, planning and resources department, and shall be appointed and periodically evaluated in the manner described in this section.
- 2. The executive director shall be selected and appointed in the following manner:
- a. The director shall consult with the officers of the commission for the purpose of establishing the qualifications for the executive director and the method of recruitment for the position.
- b. The officers of the commission and the director shall jointly review all applications for the position. The officers of

- c. The director shall interview the candidates, and after consideration of the recommendations of the officers of the commission, make the final selection of the executive director.
- 3. The director shall periodically evaluate the manager on performance of all job duties and responsibilities, including that of executive director of the arts commission, as required by county personnel procedures.
- 4. The executive director shall be evaluated annually by both the director and by the officers of the commission.
- a. The director shall complete a standard county personnel evaluation form.
- b. The officers of the commission shall jointly complete a standard county personnel evaluation form after receiving instructions in evaluation methods from the personnel division.
- c. If the evaluation of the executive director by either the director or the officers of the commission produces an average score of less than "satisfactory" (or the equivalent thereof in any subsequently adopted evaluation system), the director and the officers of the commission shall confer to determine the actions necessary to improve the performance of the executive director or, if necessary, to consider other appropriate actions.
 - G. Executive Director Responsibilities.

The executive director shall be the chief staff person for the commission who shall have, at the direction of the commission, the responsibility of assisting the commission in the development of county arts policies and programs and the implementation of such policies and programs after their adoption by the commission. The executive director shall provide, within the limitations of annual commission budgets and the policies and procedures of the county,

NEW SECTION. SECTION 5. Commission - Powers and Duties.

The commission shall advise the executive and council regarding arts policy for the county, and, to enable it to carry out is responsibilities, shall have the following powers and duties:

A. Meetings of the commission with the executive and the director.

The executive and the director shall meet with the chair of the commission at lease semiannually to discuss policy affecting the arts in the county and other matters of concern to the commission, the executive, or the director.

B. Furthering Public Awareness and Interest in the Arts.

The commission may, alone or in cooperation with any local arts commission, or any other public agency, or any private organization or individual, promote, encourage, initiate, sponsor or conduct programs to further the development, artistic growth, creativity, public awareness of and interest in all forms of artistic expression within the county.

- C. Commission Budget.
- 1. The executive director shall prepare annually an operating budget request for the next fiscal year which encompasses all activities and operations of the commission. This annual operating budget request shall be subject to review and approval by the commission. The executive director shall prepare the annual operating budget request pursuant to the target budget and procedures established by the budget office. The proposed operating budget approved by the commission shall be submitted annually, through the director to the executive and council for approval in the manner provided by law for the preparation and submission of budgets by appointive county officials.

expense fund, the amount duly appropriated by the council, together with any other funds received by the county for purposes of furthering the arts.

D. Grants.

The commission is authorized to seek grants for the support of arts programs within the county. Application for grants shall be made through the county's regular grant application review and approval procedure.

E. Purchase/Acquisition and Display of Works of Art by the County.

The commission shall act for the county in the evaluation and selection of works of art to be acquired by the county. The place and manner of display of particular works of art shall be jointly established with the agency having jurisdiction of the lands and/or buildings proposed for the placement and display of such work.

F. Collection Management.

The commission shall manage and maintain the county art collection.

G. Public Information Resources for the Arts.

In order to perform its public information/education mission, the commission may from time to time prepare, publish, and distribute informational/educational materials dealing with various forms of artistic expression.

H. Annual Report.

The commission shall include in each annual operating budget request an annual report summarizing its activities during the previous year and setting forth such recommendations (concerning county encouragement and support of the arts) as it considers

determining county arts policy and shall provide to federal, state, and local agencies on their arts-related legislative, policy, and program activities. In the development of such policy advice, the commission shall consider the recommendation of the county's local arts commissions and other artistic, professional, and civic organizations. The commission shall provide advice and assistance to the county in connection with such other artistic activities as it deems appropriate and as may be referred to it by the county.

J. Leases and Contracts.

The commission may from time to time propose to enter into any contract and/or lease with any agency or individual that the commission deems appropriate for the purpose of carrying out its responsibilities under this ordinance. Approval of any lease or contract proposed by the commission shall be subject to all applicable provisions and procedures of federal, state, and county law.

NEW SECTION. SECTION 6. Arts Gift Trust Account.

- A. The commission may seek and accept gifts, bequests, and donations from any source to promote, encourage, and foster the arts within the county.
- B. All monetary gifts, bequests, or donations received by the commission, including those given for specified purposes and those given for general usage by the commission, shall be deposited by the commission into the arts gift trust account, as hereafter created by the office of finance. No general operating funds, grant monies, or funds received from any source other than those specified in this section shall be deposited into the arts gift trust account.

D. Subject to all applicable federal, state, county or commission laws, rules, or policies, and guidelines, the commission is authorized to expend, at its discretion, all monies deposited in the arts gift trust account for the arts purposes and programs specified by the donor of said funds.

NEW SECTION. SECTION 7. Allocation of Commission Funds.

A. Procedures.

- 1. The commission is authorized to award funds received by it from public and private sources to purchase art, arts programs, and/or arts services from organizations, individual artists, arts service and liaison organizations, as well as arts programs within other types of organizations.
- 2. The commission shall establish rules and regulations governing procedures whereby a person or organizations may apply for money pursuant to this section. Such rules shall be filed as part of the rules of the commission, adopted pursuant to Section 4.D.2., above, within six months of its effective date. Distribution of awards shall be made in accordance with funding criteria developed by the commission and filed as part of their rules under Section 4.D.2., above.
 - B. Sources of Funds.

Funds which are subject to allocation by the commission pursuant to this ordinance shall include the amounts appropriated to the commission for arts programs within the county annual budget, grants from public and private sources, the county's one percent for the arts program pursuant to K.C.C. 4.04.010 through 4.04.090, and financial gifts, bequests, and/or donations to the arts commission deposited in the arts gift trust account.

C. Appeals.

The commission shall specify in the rules adopted nursuant to

NEW SECTION. SECTION 8. Gifts of Personal or Real Property. 1 The commission is hereby authorized to accept, at its 2 discretion, gifts of money and/or personal property up to amounts 3 of \$10,000 for the purposes of furthering the arts programs of the commission. Any gift of real property or any gift of money or 5 personal property of greater value than \$10,000 shall be subject 6 to provisions of K.C.C. 2.80.010. This authority shall expire 7 unless otherwise extended on December 31, 1989. 8 NEW SECTION. SECTION 9. Severability. 9 If any provision of this chapter or the operation of such 10 provision should be invalid, such invalidity shall not affect 11 other provisions of this chapter or their operation unless 12 dependent for their effect or operation upon the provision held 13 invalid and then only to the extent of such dependency and for 14 such purpose the provisions of this chapter are declared to be 15 16 severable.
