AN ORDINANCE to establish a process to allocate the proceeds of the Conservation Futures fund in order to advance the acquisition of green spaces, greenbelts and trail rights-of-way in King County.

PREAMBLE:

King County is expected to gain an additional 300,000 residents by the year 2000. To sustain such growth while maintaining the quality of life now enjoyed by the residents of King County, a system of green spaces, greenbelts and trail corridors must be preserved. Therefore, the King County council hereby commits its Conservation Futures funds to the acquisition of green spaces, greenbelts and trail corridors throughout the county, both within its cities and unincorporated areas.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF KING COUNTY:

SECTION 1. A process is hereby established for the biennial allocation commencing in 1990 of the Conservation Futures fund to acquire green spaces, greenbelts, and trail rights-of-ways proposed for preservation for public use by either the county or the cities within the county. King County government, incorporated city governments within King County, citizen groups and citizens may make application for funds in this allocation process.

A. At least one month prior to a submission date determined by the county council, all cities within the county shall be provided notice of the opportunity to apply to the county for a share of the biennial allocation of the Conservation Futures funds. Notice also shall be provided in a daily newspaper of general county circulation.

- B. By a date certain established by the county council during a biennial allocation, the executive shall report to the council on the compliance of all applications submitted for funding with the county open space selection criteria, Ordinance No. 8657, and any additional relevant criteria of the jurisdiction in which the potential acquisition is located. The report also shall be accompanied by a proposed appropriation ordinance setting forth the applications recommended for funding by the Citizen Selection Committee identified in Section 1.C, infra.
- C. The citizen selection committee shall include an individual from each King County council district. It shall be composed of nine members appointed by the executive and confirmed by the council. The committee shall elect a chair from its members. The executive shall solicit nominations from the City of Seattle and nominations from the Suburban Cities Association. Once established, the terms of the members and chair shall be rotated such that three of the seats become available for appointment every year.
- D. Prior to final council action on the biennial allocation of the Conservation Futures fund, a public hearing will be held on the applications submitted by the county and the cities.
- E. Any application funded by this process shall be supported by the jurisdiction in which the project is located with a matching contribution no less than the amount of Conservation Futures funds awarded to the project. This contribution may consist of cash, land trades with a valuation verified by an appraisal by a MAI certified appraiser, or credits for other qualifying open space acquired on or after January 1, 1989. When a project nominated by a citizen or citizen group is located within a city jurisdiction and is recommended for acquisition by the citizen selection committee, the subject city shall be required to demonstrate a commitment to contribute within two

years of application the required share for the project prior to said application's final consideration by the King County council. Otherwise, the conservation funding will be available for reallocation to other current applications. In such instances the subject city shall have 60 days to demonstrate its commitment to contribute to the project.

- F. For the purpose of this ordinance, all cities in excess of 20,000 population shall have promulgated a open space plan or its equivalent prior to submitting applications to this process.
- G. A \$500,000 balance will be reserved at the beginning of each biennium of this process to be used at the discretion of the council to fund options on parcels sponsored by either the county or a city that would otherwise satisfy Section 1(D) through (F), supra, but have become threatened prior to the next biennial allocation by conversion to uses incompatible with their open space characteristics. Prior to approving the purchase of an option, the council must find that the subject parcel satisfies both the county open space selection criteria and any additional relevant criteria promulgated by the jurisdiction in which the parcel is located.

SECTION 2. It shall be a goal of the council and the Citizen Selection Committee to achieve an equitable geographical allocation of funds from conservation futures over the long term.

SECTION 3. For the purpose of this ordinance, an open space plan should define the term "open space" and its critical attributes as applied to the specific natural environment of a city. The plan should also establish the goals of the city regarding the conservation and management of open space, policies designed to achieve these goals and all necessary implementing measures. Specific open space conservation opportunities should also be identified.

SECTION 4. On or before April 15, 1989, the executive shall transmit to the King County council the refined open space site evaluation system and resource rating criteria and administrative guidelines as required by Ordinance No. 8657, Addendum I, Additional Amendments - Draft Open Space Plan, (A) and Motion No. 7301. · SECTION 5. Conservation Futures funds may be allocated by the county council in 1989 for parcels which otherwise comply with Section 1 (C) through (E), supra, and for which there exists a demonstrable threat of conversion to non open space uses prior to June 1, 1990.
