ORDINANCE NO. **8891**

AN ORDINANCE updating the Solid Waste chapters governing definitions, litter, solid waste disposal and hauling on county roads, adding new chapters to Title 10 and repealing Resolution 8778 as amended, Ordinance No. 7708 § 1, Resolution 6894 as amended, Resolution 24553 as amended, Ordinance 8108 § 2, Ordinance 800 § 1 as amended, Ordinance 7764 § 1 as amended, Ordinance 7737 § 1 as amended, Ordinance 8771 § 2 and § 7, and K.C.C. Chapters 10.04.010-.140, 10.16.010-.060, 10.20.010-.060, K.C.C. 10.08.010, 10.08.100, 10.10.010, 10.12.010, 10.14.010, and 10.24.010, and amending Ordinance 7708 §1 as amended and K.C.C. 10.08.020, .030, .040, .050, and .060.

PREAMBLE:

King County finds it is necessary to update its solid waste code to eliminate duplication and outdated provisions and assure consistency.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF KING COUNTY:

Section 1. Resolution 8778 as amended, Ordinance 7708 § 1, Resolution 6894 as amended, Resolution 24553 as amended, Ordinance 8108 § 2, Ordinance 800 § 1 as amended, Ordinance 7764 § 1 as amended, Ordinance 7737 § 1 as amended, Ordinance 8771 § 2 and § 7, and K.C.C. 10.04.010 through .140, K.C.C. 10.16.010 through .060 and K.C.C. 10.20.010 through .060, K.C.C. 10.08.010, 10.08.100, K.C.C. 10.10.010, K.C.C. 10.12.010, K.C.C. 10.14.010 and K.C.C. 10.24.010 are hereby repealed.

NEW SECTION. SECTION 2. Title of Chapter. This chapter shall be known as the "King County Solid Waste Code," and is necessary for the preservation and protection of public health, welfare and safety. The terms, provisions, rules and regulations incorporated herein shall be liberally construed for the aforementioned purpose.

NEW SECTION. SECTON 3. Definitions. The following definitions shall apply in the interpretation and enforcement of this title:

1 A. "Agricultural wastes" means non-dangerous wastes on farms
2 resulting from the production of agricultural products including
3 but not limited to manures and carcasses of dead animals weighing
4 each or collectively in excess of fifteen pounds.

5 B. "Asbestos-containing waste material" means any waste that
6 contains asbestos. This term includes, but is not limited to,
7 asbestos waste from control devices, contaminated clothing,
8 asbestos waste material, materials used to enclose the work area
9 during an asbestos project, and bags or containers that previously
10 contained asbestos.

11 C. "Ashes" means the residue including any air pollution
12 control equipment flue dusts from combustion or incineration of
13 material including solid wastes.

14 D. "Bulky waste" means large items of refuse, such as
15 appliances, furniture, and other oversize wastes which would
16 typically not fit into reuseable solid waste containers.

17 E. "Certified hauler" means any person engaged in the
18 business of solid waste handling having a certificate granted by
19 the Washington Utilities and Transportation Commission for that
20 purpose.

21 F. "Clean soils and clean dredge spoils" means soils and
22 dredge spoils which are not dangerous wastes or problem wastes as
23 defined in this chapter.

24 G. "Commercial hauler" means any person, firm or corporation
25 including but not limited to "Certified hauler," as defined
26 herein, collecting or transporting solid waste for hire or
27 consideration.

28 H. "Compacted waste" means any solid waste whose volume is
29 less than in the loose condition as a result of compression.

30 I. "Controlled solid waste" means all solid waste generated,
31 collected or disposed within the unincorporated areas of King
32 County and all solid waste generated, collected or disposed within
33

1 any other jurisdiction with which a solid waste interlocal
2 agreement, as defined herein, exists.

3 J. "Dangerous wastes" means any solid waste designated as
4 dangerous waste by the Washington State Department of Ecology
5 under chapter 173-303 WAC.

6 K. "Demolition wastes" means solid waste, largely inert
7 waste, resulting from the demolition, razing or construction of
8 buildings, roads, and other man-made structures. Demolition waste
9 consists of, but is not limited to, concrete, brick, bituminous
10 concrete, wood and masonry, composition roofing and roofing paper,
11 steel, and minor amounts of other metals like cooper. Plaster
12 (i.e., sheet rock or plaster board) or any other material, other
13 than wood, that is likely to produce gases or a leachate during
14 the decomposition process and asbestos wastes are not considered
15 to be demolition waste for the purposes of this chapter.

16 L. "Designated interlocal forum" means a group of
17 representatives of unincorporated King County and of incorporated
18 cities and towns within King County designated by the council of
19 King County and by interlocal agreement with the cities in King
20 County to discuss solid waste issues and facilitate regional
21 interlocal cooperation in solid waste management.

22 M. "Disposal" means the discharge, deposit, injection,
23 dumping, leaking, or placing of any solid waste into or on any
24 land or water.

25 N. "Disposal facility" is a disposal site or interim solid
26 waste handling facility. This includes, but is not limited to,
27 transfer stations included as part of the county disposal system,
28 landfills, incinerators, composting plants, and facilities for the
29 recycling or recovery of resources from solid wastes or the
30 conversion of the energy from such wastes to more useful forms or
31 combinations thereof.
32
33

1 O. "Disposal site" means a site or sites approved by the
2 council of King County where any final treatment, utilization,
3 processing or disposition of solid waste occurs.

4 P. "Disposal system" means the system of disposal facilities,
5 rules and procedures established pursuant to this title.

6 Q. "Drop box facility" means a facility used for the
7 placement of a detachable solid waste container, i.e., drop boxes,
8 including the area adjacent for necessary entrance and exit roads,
9 unloading, and turnaround areas. Drop box facilities normally
10 serve the general public with loose loads and receive waste from
11 off-site. Drop box facilities may also include containers for
12 separated recyclables.

13 R. "Division" means the solid waste division of the King
14 County public works department.

15 S. "Energy resource recovery" means the recovery of energy in
16 a useable form from mass burning or refuse derived fuel
17 incineration, pyrolysis or any other means of using the heat of
18 combustion of solid waste that involves high temperature (above
19 1200 degrees Fahrenheit) processing.

20 T. "Garbage" means unwanted animal and vegetable wastes and
21 animal and vegetable wastes resulting from the handling,
22 preparation, cooking and consumption of food, swill, and carcasses
23 of dead animals and of such a character and proportion as to be
24 capable of attracting or providing food for vectors, except sewage
25 and sewage sludge.

26 U. "Hazardous wastes" means and includes, but is not limited
27 to explosives, medical wastes, radioactive wastes, pesticides and
28 chemicals which are potentially harmful to the public health or
29 the environment. Unless otherwise defined by the King County
30 board of health, such waste shall have the meaning as defined by
31 the Washington State Department of Ecology and the Washington
32 Administrative Code.
33

1 V. "Hazardous waste management plan" means a plan for
2 managaing moderate risk wastes, pursuant to RCW 70.105.220.

3 W. "Health department" means the Seattle-King County health
4 department.

5 X. "Health officer" means the King County director of public
6 health, or his authorized agent.

7 Y. "Industrial solid wastes" means waste by-products from
8 manufacturing and fabricating operations such as scraps,
9 trimmings, packing, and other discarded materials not otherwise
10 designated as dangerous waste under Chapter 173-303 WAC.

11 Z. "Interim solid waste handling facility" means any interim
12 treatment, utilization or processing site engaged in solid waste
13 handling which is not the final disposal site. Transfer stations,
14 drop boxes, baling and compaction sites, source separation
15 centers, intermediate processing facilities, mixed waste
16 processing facilities and treatment facilities are considered
17 interim solid waste handling sites.

18 AA. "Intermediate processing" means sorting of mixed
19 recyclables from source separation programs to divide them into
20 individual component recyclable materials or to process them for
21 marketing.

22 BB. "King County Solid Waste Advisory Committee" means the
23 committee formed pursuant to King County Ordinance 6862 and RCW
24 Chapter 70.95 to advise the county on solid waste management
25 planning, assist in the development of programs and policies
26 concerning solid waste management, and review and comment on the
27 plan and other proposed solid waste management rules, policies or
28 ordinance prior to adoption.

29 CC. "Landfill" means a disposal site or part of a site at
30 which waste is placed in or on land and which is not a
31 landspreading disposal facility.
32
33

1 DD. "Landspreading disposal facility" means a facility that
2 applies sludges or other solid wastes onto or incorporates solid
3 waste into the soil surface at greater than vegetative utilization
4 and soild conditioners/immobilization rates.

5 EE. "Liquid" means a substance that flows readily and assumes
6 the form of its container but retains its independent volume.

7 FF. "Littering" means to accumulate, or place, throw,
8 deposit, put into or in any land or water or otherwise dispose of
9 refuse including rubbish, ashes, garbage, dead animals, industrial
10 refuse, commercial waste and all other waste material of every
11 kind and description in any manner except as authorized by this
12 chapter.

13 GG. "Manager" means the manager of the solid waste division
14 of the department of public works of King County.

15 HH. "Medical waste" means all waste so defined by the King
16 County board of health rules and regulations.

17 II. "Mixed municipal solid waste" means waste consisting of
18 solid waste generated by residences, stores, offices, and other
19 generators of wastes that are not industrial, agricultural, or
20 demolition wastes.

21 JJ. "Mixed waste processing" means sorting of solid waste
22 after collection from the point of generation in order to remove
23 recyclables from the solid waste to be disposed.

24 KK. "Moderate risk waste" means:

25 1. any waste that exhibits any of the properties of
26 hazardous waste but is exempt from regulation under RCW Chapter
27 70.105 solely because the waste is generated in quantities below
28 the threshold for regulation, and

29 2. any household wastes which are generated from the
30 disposal of substances identified by the department of ecology as
31 hazardous household substances.
32
33

1 LL. "Noncommercial user" means any person not engaged in the
2 business of solid waste handling.

3 MM. "Operating hours" means those times during which disposal
4 facilities are normally open and available for the delivery of
5 solid wastes.

6 NN. "Person" means any individual, association, firm,
7 corporation, partnership, political subdivision, municipality,
8 government agency, industry, public or private corporation, or any
9 other entity.

10 OO. "Plan" means the coordinated comprehensive solid waste
11 management plan for the county as required by RCW Chapter 70.95.

12 PP. "Problem wastes" means:

13 1. soils removed during the cleanup of a remedial action
14 site, or a dangerous waste site closure or other cleanup efforts
15 and actions and which contain harmful substances but are not
16 designated dangerous wastes, or

17 2. dredge spoils resulting from the dredging of surface
18 waters of the state where contaminants are present in the dredge
19 spoils at concentrations not suitable for open water disposal and
20 the dredge spoils are not dangerous wastes and are not regulated
21 by the Federal Clean Water Act.

22 QQ. "Procurement policy" means the development and
23 implementation of a policy which achieves the purchase of products
24 made from recycled and/or recyclable goods.

25 RR. "Receivers" means persons who will reuse recyclables and
26 to whom source separated recyclables for which a market does not
27 presently exist can be delivered at little or no cost in order to
28 avoid landfilling the materials pending development of economic
29 markets.

30 SS. "Reclamation site" means a location used for the
31 processing or the storage of recycled waste.
32
33

1 TT. "Recyclables" means any material that can be kept out of
2 or recovered from solid waste and the resources therein be
3 transformed and/or reused including, but not limited to, mixed
4 paper, newsprint, cardboard, aluminum, glass, plastics, chemicals,
5 oil, wood, compostable organics (food and yard debris), ferrous
6 metal, and inorganics (rubble and inert material).

7 UU. "Recycling" means either source separation or the
8 processing of solid waste mechanically or by hand to segregate
9 materials for sale or reuse. Materials which can be removed
10 through recycling include but are not limited to mixed paper,
11 newsprint, cardboard, aluminum, glass, plastics, chemicals, oil,
12 wood, compostable organics (food and yard debris), ferrous metal,
13 and inorganics (rubble and inert material). Recycling does not
14 include combustion of solid waste or preparation of a fuel from
15 solid waste.

16 VV. "Refuse" means garbage, rubbish, ashes, swill and all
17 other putrescible and nonputrescible wastes, except sewage, from
18 all public and private establishments and residences.

19 WW. "Regional approach" means the development and
20 implementation of a solid waste management program in cooperation
21 with municipalities in King County and with other counties within
22 the Puget Sound area.

23 XX. "Regional direct" means any solid waste transported to
24 Cedar Hills disposal site by conventional long haul transfer
25 vehicles, transporting from solid waste transfer stations solid
26 waste generated and collected in King County.

27 YY. "Reuse" means the return of a commodity into the economic
28 stream for use.

29 ZZ. "Rubbish" means all nonputrescible wastes from all public
30 and private establishments and from all residences.

31 AAA. "Secured load" means a load of solid waste which has
32 been secured or covered in the vehicle in a manner that will
33

1 prevent any part of the solid waste from leaving the vehicle while
2 the vehicle is moving.

3 BBB. "Solid waste" means all putrescible and nonputrescible
4 solid and semisolid wastes, except wastes identified in WAC
5 173-304-015, including but not limited to garbage, rubbish, ashes,
6 industrial wastes, swill, demolition and construction wastes,
7 abandoned vehicle or parts thereof, discarded commodities, sludge
8 from wastewater treatment plans and septage from septic tanks,
9 woodwaste, dangerous waste, and problem wastes. This includes all
10 liquid, solid and semisolid materials which are not the primary
11 products of public, private, industrial, commercial, mining and
12 agricultural operations. Unrecovered residue from recycling
13 operations shall be considered solid waste.

14 CCC. "Solid waste interlocal agreement" means an agreement
15 between a city and the county for use of King County disposal
16 system for solid waste generated or collected within the city.

17 DDD. "Solid waste management" means the systematic
18 administration of activities which provide for the reduction in
19 generated volume, source separation, collection, storage,
20 transportation, transfer, recycling, processing, treatment and
21 disposal of solid waste. This includes public education and
22 marketing activities.

23 EEE. "Source separation" means the process of separating
24 recyclable materials from material which will become solid waste
25 at its source.

26 FFF. "Suspect waste" means any waste the manager suspects may
27 be unauthorized waste.

28 GGG. "Swill" means every refuse accumulation of animal, fruit
29 or vegetable matter, liquid or otherwise, that attend the
30 preparation, use, cooking, dealing in or storing of meat, fish,
31 fowl, fruit and vegetables, except coffee grounds.
32
33

1 HHH. "Transfer station" means a staffed, fixed, supplemental
2 collection and transportation facility used by persons and route
3 collection vehicles to deposit collected solid waste from off-site
4 into a larger transfer vehicle for transport to a permanent
5 disposal site. It may also include recycling facilities.

6 III. "Unauthorized waste" means waste which is waste not
7 acceptable for disposal at any or a specific disposal facility
8 according to applicable rules and regulations or a determination
9 of the manager.

10 JJJ. "Uncompacted waste" means any solid waste in an
11 uncompressed or loose condition.

12 KKK. "Waste reduction" means reducing the amount or type of
13 waste generated.

14 LLL. "Woodwaste" means solid waste consisting of woodpieces
15 or particles generated as a by-product resulting from the handling
16 and processing of wood, including, but not limited to, hog fuel,
17 sawdust, shavings, chips, bark, small pieces of wood, stumps,
18 limbs and any other material composed largely of wood which has no
19 significant commercial value at the time in question, (but shall
20 not include slash developed from logging operations unless
21 disposed of on a different site), and does not include wood pieces
22 or particles containing chemical preservatives such as creosote,
23 pentachlorophenol, or copper-chrome-arsenate.

24 NEW SECTION. SECTION 4. Keeping and use of solid waste
25 containers. Each person in possession, charge or control of any
26 dwelling, flat, roominghouse, apartment house, hospital, school,
27 hotel, club, restaurant, boardinghouse or eating place, or in
28 possession, charge or control of any shop, place of business or
29 manufacturing establishment, or any place where garbage, refuse or
30 swill is created or accumulated, shall at all times, keep or cause
31 to be kept portable solid waste containers, for the deposit
32
33

1 therein of garbage and refuse, and to deposit, or cause to be
2 deposited the same therein.

3 NEW SECTION. SECTION 5. Construction, maintenance and
4 placement of solid waste containers. Solid waste containers shall
5 be constructed in such a manner as to be strong, watertight, not
6 easily corroded, rodentproof, insectproof, and shall have adequate
7 handles, and tight fitting lids. Such container shall be kept in
8 a sanitary condition with the outside thereof clean and free from
9 accumulative grease and decomposing material. Each container
10 shall be kept in a place accessible to the collector of garbage
11 and refuse on scheduled collection days. The standards for
12 receptacles for separated recyclables may be established to meet
13 the requirements of the applicable recycling programs.

14 NEW SECTION. SECTION 6. Separation of solid waste. The
15 county may by ordinance require the separation of paper, yard and
16 garden waste or other component parts of solid waste and may
17 require the deposit thereof in separate cans or receptacles and
18 may prescribe the methods of handling thereof.

19 NEW SECTION. SECTION 7. Removal or storage of swill. Swill
20 may be eliminated by use or may be sold by the person producing
21 the same or may be removed by persons; provided they receive the
22 approval of the health officer, and that the removal or storage of
23 the swill is carried out according to good sanitary practice.

24 NEW SECTION. SECTION 8. Littering and unlawful dumping.

25 A. It is unlawful to place, throw, deposit or otherwise
26 dispose of refuse other than in a receptacle provided for that
27 purpose, in any public place, public road, public park, on any
28 private property or in the waters within King County, except as
29 specifically authorized by this title or at the official solid
30 waste disposal facilities provided therefor by King County.
31
32
33

1 B. It is unlawful for the owners or occupants of private
2 property to deposit or accumulate, or to permit the deposit or
3 accumulation of refuse upon such private property; provided,
4 however, that this shall not prohibit the storage of garbage,
5 rubbish, or recyclable materials in public or private receptacles,
6 or in solid waste containers or other approved receptacle, or in
7 securely tied bundles when such receptacles or bundles are for
8 immediate or approved periodic disposal; provided, further:

9 1. the use of a compost pile or bin shall not be prohibited
10 if the use and maintenance thereof is in such a manner as to
11 prevent the attraction, breeding and/or harboring of insects and
12 rodents;

13 2. nor shall any recycling operation be affected if it is
14 operating in accordance with all applicable rules, regulations,
15 laws or other permit requirements. Any such use permitted
16 hereunder shall not be construed to permit a nuisance as defined
17 by state law.

18 C. Hauling restrictions. It is unlawful for any person, firm
19 or corporation to haul refuse, garbage, rubbish, dead animals,
20 ashes, or any other waste material of the kind defined in this
21 chapter on the highways and roads in King County unless such
22 materials are properly stored, covered and otherwise secured so as
23 to prevent spillage or littering. (WAC 173.304.200)

24 SECTION 9. Ordinance No. 7708 Section 1, as amended and
25 K.C.C. 10.08.030 are hereby amended as follows:

26 Acquisition of solid waste disposal ((sites)) facilities. The
27 county may acquire by purchase, lease, contract with private
28 parties or other necessary means, disposal ((sites)) facilities
29 which are needed for disposal of solid waste generated and
30 collected in King County and other jurisdictions with which an
31 interlocal agreement exists, pursuant to K.C.C. 10.08.130.
32 Selection of such disposal ((sites)) facilities shall be
33

1 consistent with the King County Comprehensive Plan and all
2 federal, state, and local requirements, including, but not limited
3 to, comprehensive land use planning, fire protection, water
4 quality, air quality, and the consideration of esthetics. To the
5 extent practicable, solid waste disposal facilities shall be
6 located in a manner which equalizes their distribution around the
7 county, so that no single area of the county will be required to
8 absorb an undue share of the impact from these facilities. More
9 than one alternative must be considered and evaluated in the
10 siting of planned solid waste disposal facilities. The county
11 may acquire disposal ((sites)) facilities on a continuing basis,
12 as is required by the volume of solid waste generated and
13 collected within the county.

14 SECTION 10. Ordinance No. 7708, Section 1, and K.C.C.
15 10.08.040 are hereby amended as follows:

16 Operation of solid waste disposal ((sites)) facilities by
17 county. The division shall be the operating authority for all
18 solid waste disposal ((sites)) facilities owned or operated by King
19 County. Nothing herein shall prohibit the county by ordinance
20 from contracting with another entity, public or private, to own,
21 construct and/or operate a disposal ((site-er)) facility. The
22 council of King County shall establish by ordinance the hours of
23 operation of disposal ((sites)) facilities, disposal fees charged,
24 and types of waste for which each ((site)) facility is intended.
25 The manager shall prepare operating regulations for solid waste
26 disposal ((sites)) facilities, which shall govern all other
27 matters necessary to assure compliance with federal, state and
28 local regulations applicable to such ((sites)) facilities. The
29 county reserves the right to provide in said operating rules that
30 certain solid wastes, such as bulky wastes, problem wastes and
31 woodwaste, based on source, type or volume, shall not be accepted,
32 or only conditionally accepted, at ((sites)) facilities owned or
33

1 operated only by the county. The operating rules for such
 2 ~~((sites))~~ facilities shall be consistent with this chapter and
 3 ~~((with))~~ no less stringent than regulations promulgated by the
 4 board of health.

5 SECTION 11. Ordinance No. 7708 Section 1 as amended, and
 6 K.C.C. 10.08.050 are hereby amended as follows:

7 Use of county disposal ~~((sites))~~ facilities.

8 A. Interlocal operations.

9 ~~((1-))~~ Solid waste disposal ~~((sites))~~ facilities owned or
 10 operated by the county shall be available to accept solid wastes
 11 generated and collected ~~((in-municipal-corporations))~~ within
 12 cities situated within the county which ~~((have-been-using-county~~
 13 ~~disposal-sites-as-of-April-1, 1986, -provided-an-interlocal~~
 14 ~~agreement-with-any-such-jurisdiction))~~ have an executed solid
 15 waste interlocal agreement pursuant to K.C.C. 10.08.130.

16 ~~((2--Any-jurisdiction-or-any-commercial-hauler-not-using-a-~~
 17 ~~county-disposal-site-as-of-April-1, 1986, -shall-be-required-to~~
 18 ~~enter-into-an-agreement-with-King-County-subject-to-King-County~~

21 B. Individuals. Any individual may use King County disposal
 22 facilities designated for individual use, in compliance with any
 23 applicable rules and regulations.

24 C. Dangerous and hazardous waste. Under no circumstances
 25 shall any person deliver to any King County solid waste disposal
 26 facility for disposal any waste that is defined as "hazardous
 27 waste" per the Federal Resource Conservation and Recovery Act, 42
 28 USC §6901-6991i, or rules or regulations thereunder, or defined as
 29 "extremely hazardous wastes" or "dangerous wastes" per Chapter
 30 70.105 RCW or rules or regulations thereunder except: (1) in those
 31 specific cases where the county has expressly authorized the
 32

1 place, time, type and manner of the delivery of such waste after
2 full disclosure or (2) at a time and place expressly specified for
3 dangerous and hazardous waste collection.

4 D. No person shall deliver any waste to any King County
5 disposal facility which has not been handled and treated in the
6 manner required by applicable operating regulations adopted by the
7 division and the King County board of health rules and regulations.

8 E. Notwithstanding any other provision of this chapter, no
9 municipal corporation or agent thereof or any commercial hauler
10 shall deposit in any King County solid waste disposal facility
11 solid waste generated or collected within the boundaries of a city
12 which (~~was not using King County solid waste disposal facilities~~
13 ~~before April 1, 1986 and which~~) has not entered into and
14 currently has a valid ((a)) written use agreement with King County.

15 SECTION 12. Ordinance 7708 Section 1, and K.C.C. 10.08.060
16 are hereby amended as follows: Establishment and operation of
17 solid waste management system. Pursuant to Chapter 70.95 RCW, no
18 disposal ((site)) facility in King County, whether acquired
19 publicly or privately, shall be established, altered, expanded,
20 improved, operated or maintained without prior compliance with the
21 following:

22 A. The disposal ((site)) facility and proposed method of
23 operation shall be consistent with the King County comprehensive
24 solid waste management plan and shall be approved by the health
25 department; and

26 B. The disposal ((site)) facility shall be constructed,
27 operated and maintained in accord with terms of permit from the
28 health department and such other permits as are required by law.

29 C. All other federal, state and local laws, ordinances and
30 regulations shall be met.
31
32
33

1 SECTION 13. Ordinance 7708 Section 1, and K.C.C. 10.08.020
2 are hereby amended as follows:

3 A. Under the authority provided by the King County home Rule
4 Charter and RCW 36.58.040, a system is hereby established for
5 disposal of all solid waste generated and/or disposed in
6 unincorporated King County. Additionally this system shall
7 include all solid waste generated and/or collected in any other
8 jurisdictions with which an interlocal agreement exists pursuant
9 to K.C.C. 10.08.130.

10 B. Disposal in King County. It is unlawful for any person to
11 dispose of controlled solid waste except at disposal sites and in
12 a manner authorized by King County. ~~((except-that-nothing-herein
13 shall-prohibit-a-person-from-dumping-or-depositing-solid-waste
14 resulting-from-his-own-activities-onto-or-under-the-surface-of
15 ground-owned-or-leased-by-him-when-such-action-does-not-violate

17 C. Disposal outside King County. Unless specifically
18 permitted by state law or specifically authorized by King County
19 ordinance, it is unlawful for any commercial hauler or other
20 person or entity to deliver or deposit any controlled solid waste
21 outside the borders of King County unless it is authorized by the
22 adopted King County comprehensive solid waste management plan.

23 NEW SECTION. SECTION 14. Enforcement. The director of the
24 Seattle-King County department of public health is authorized and
25 responsible to enforce or seek the enforcement through the
26 prosecutor's office of Sections 4, 5, 7, 8, and 12 of this
27 ordinance, and K.C.C 10.08.070-10.08.090, and any rules and
28 regulations promulgated thereunder pursuant to but not restricted
29 to the enforcement and penalty provisions of Title 23.


1 The manager is authorized and responsible to seek the

6 Both the director of the department of public health and the
7 manager are authorized and responsible for enforcement for
8 Sections 6, 11C and 11D of this ordinance and any rules and

10 to the enforcement and penalty provisions of Title 23.


