ORDINANCE NO.

AN ORDINANCE relating to the King County approval of water utility comprehensive plans, inserting requirements for conservation programs and requiring consistency with coordinated water supply plans (RCW 70.116); amending Ordinance 1709, Section 2 and 5 as amended, and K.C.C. 13.24.030 and 13.24.060.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF KING COUNTY:

SECTION 1. Ordinance 1709, Section 2 as amended and K.C.C. 13.24.030 are amended as follows:

<u>Comprehensive plans - Water purveyors</u>. Water district and distributor comprehensive plans shall consist of the following:

- A. A narrative report which provides the following information:
 - 1. A short history of the district or company,
- 2. Population projection for the distribution area or district, and for the area anticipated to be served in the future as described in subdivision 7 of this subsection, together with the source or basis of the projection,
- 3. A description of the existing water sources, storage and distribution facilities, and the physical, chemical and bacteriological quality of the supply,
- 4. For those systems utilizing surface supplies, with disinfection only, the purveyor shall include a report identifying all facilities, conditions and activities within its watershed, together with a proposed program for necessary surveillance, limitation and control,
- 5. A time schedule for improvements required to meet any existing deficiencies of supply, storage, distribution or quality, including any treatment facilities not in compliance with state or local health requirements,

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- 6. Proposed plans for covering any open distribution reservoirs. Interim facilities, including chlorination, may be considered in the plans for covering,
- 7. A water conservation plan consisting of a water shortage response element dealing with seasonal drought conditions and shortages caused by high turbidity; and a long-range resource conservation element to reduce overall water usage per capita which will use the geographically relevant coordinated water system plan as the standard. For those purveyors not included as part of a coordinated water supply plan, the conservation element standard will be that of the nearest critical water supply service area.
- ((7-))8. A projection of anticipated system needs at least ten years into the future for districts and distributors having more than one thousand services; or a projection of anticipated system needs at least five years in the future for all other districts and distributors,
- $((8 au)) \underline{9}$. A proposed construction schedule to meet projected system needs and a plan setting forth the means for financing the proposed improvements,
- ((9.))10. A description of any agreements, or any attempts to reach agreements, with neighboring sewer and water districts, municipalities or special districts,
- $((10\tau))$ 11. A description of developer extension plans and/or a statement of minimum criteria and standards required by the district to be met by developers,
- ((+++))12. An explanation of the relationship between the district's or distributor's existing and proposed system and the basinwide water and/or sewerage plan as approved by the State Department of Ecology and the State Department of Social and Health Services,

 $((12\tau))$ 13. A discussion of the relationship between the district comprehensive plan and county adopted plans, policies, and land use controls;

- B. A map of the plan area which depicts the following requirements:
- 1. Existing and proposed mains, and existing and proposed fire hydrants, with documentation demonstrating that such system meets county standards.
 - 2. Critical elevation and pressure zones,
 - 3. Storage and pumping facilities, with capacities noted,
- 4. Existing <u>corporate and service area</u> boundar((y))<u>ies</u> and ((anticipated-boundary-or)) <u>proposed future</u> service area ((expansion;)) <u>boundaries consistent with the coordinated water</u> system plans (RCW 70.116) where applicable.
 - 5. Existing zoning,
 - 6. Existing land use.

SECTION 2. Ordinance 1709, Section 5 as amended and K.C.C. 13.24.060 are amended as follows:

Comprehensive plans - Approval requirements.

Comprehensive plans approved by the county shall contain the elements listed in Sections 13.24.030 or 13.24.040 and shall not be inconsistent with the following:

- A. King County Code Chapter 17.08 relating to the installation of fire hydrants and water mains;
 - B. State and local health standards;
- C. County comprehensive plan; adopted community plans, and pertinent county adopted plans and policies; provided, that in those areas where a community plan has not been adopted, the approval of new significant general purpose improvements to water systems, including pumping, storage, source, or transmission mains, shall be limited to serve existing or permitted uses. Existing or permitted uses shall not be construed to mean new

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residential subdivisions, short subdivisions, or planned unit
developments;
D. Coordinated water system plans for areas designated as
critical water supply service areas in K.C.C. 13.28 pursuant to
RCW 70.116.
$((B_{\overline{\tau}}))^{\underline{E}}$. The basinwide water and/or sewerage plan when
approved by the State Department of Ecology and the State
Department of Social and Health Services;
((E-))F. Applicable state water quality and waste management
standards; and
((F.)) <u>G.</u> The King County Sewerage General Plan.
