These data reports serve as basis for developing an understanding of the current jail population profile by security classification/sex/location so that we can begin to formulate assumptions about the type and quantity of future housing needs.

*What conclusions/findings can be drawn from the collected data?

- The 24-hour secure population, including general population, intake and special custody, constituted 75% of the total jail population during the two months examined.
- The minimum/community and medium classifications account for 70% of the general population and nearly 59% of the total 24-hour population.
- The community based population (NRF, EHD and Work Release) constitute 24% of the total population.
- Special custody population constituted approximately 12% of the total population.
- The psychiatric/mentally ill group make up 48% of the special custody population.

These data reports serve as the basis for understanding the classification subgroup profile of the 24-hour secure jail population.

*What conclusions/findings can be drawn from the collected data?

Observations:

- The 24-Hour secure population constituted approximately 77% of the total population for all facilities including intake, NRP, Work Release and EUD.
- The 24-Hour secure general population subgroups (i.e., unclassified minimum/community, medium and close/maximum) accounted for 64% of total population.
- The special custody population accounted for approximately 13% of total population.
- The unclassified general population (men) subgroup showed the high within group fluctuation over the period examined and the Psychiatric Mentally Ill special custody subgroup experienced the highest relative increase.




Historical Classification Summary

Form 3B(1); Question #3d.

These data provide calculated counts of the daily jail population housed in a segregation unit for disciplinary reasons. These data are provided separately from other special custody categories, since the Classification Reports, used as the sources for the other classification profile reports, do not separate disciplinary segregation from general population. In order to have a total number of segregation cells used currently, the disciplinary segregation data need to be added to the other special custody figures (Forms 1A and 1B). This then completes the current classification profile of the daily jail population, which can serve as a basis for projecting the number and mix of housing types needed in a new detention facility.

*What conclusions/findings can be drawn from the collected data?

Observations:

- o Based on the data given in the attached tables, the disciplinary segregation population averaged 9 men and 2 women in April 1990 and 12 men and 2 women in June 1990.
- o For April 1990, the total male segregation population was 47.3 (38.3 non-disciplinary administrative segregation and 9.0 disciplinary segregation). The total female segregation population was 4.3 (2.3 non-disciplinary

administrative segregation and 2.0 disciplinary segregation).

- o For June 1990, the total male segregation population was 39.9 (28.2 non-disciplinary administrative segregation and 11.7 disciplinary segregation). The total female segregation population was 3.5 (1.9 non-disciplinary administrative segregation and 1.6 disciplinary segregation).
- o The range of daily counts for disciplinary segregation is considerable, particularly for men. In April 1990, the daily disciplinary segregation count for men varied from zero to thirteen. For women, the range was zero to five. In June 1990, the range was five to twenty-three for men and zero to three for women.

These tables indicate in which facilities the classification subgroups of the jail population are currently housed. When combined with the life expectancies of these facilities, to be supplied by the jail planning team, and current and projected jail population figures by classification subgroup, it will be possible to determine which classification subgroups are/will be subject to a deficit of jail space.

*What conclusions/findings can be drawn from the collected data?

Observations:

- o The Tower facility, which has been the Department's most crowded facility, houses very few minimum security men or women. The largest group in this facility is medium security, although the unclassified and close/maximum security groups are also significant.
- o The West Wing, under its expanded operational capacity (395 beds for men; 40 for women), has available capacity, particularly for men. This is true even if the facility were able to absorb all the minimum security men housed in the Tower.
- o The NRF facility also has excess capacity for men.

- The tables reflect the single classification designations for the community-based facilities and programs, including NRF, work release, and EHD.
- Almost one-half of the total jail population is currently housed in a minimum security or community-based facility or program.

These data provide a basis for a detailed understanding of the medical and psychiatric sub-populations in terms of the type of special housing required, the type charge (felony/misdemeanor), and security level. When supplemented with data from the Jail Health Dept., the data will provide a basis for analyzing special housing and service needs in a new detention facility. These data are daily population data, and do not describe the characteristics of all inmates who receive medical or psychiatric services.

*What conclusions/findings can be drawn from the collected data?

Observations:

Medical Population

- o Only 34% of the medical daily population is housed in the infirmary. Close to half (48%) are housed in the medical observation area (on the Tower's 7th floor), and the remaining 18% are housed outside medical housing areas.
- o Approximately 75% of the medical daily population are felons. This is somewhat higher than the percentage felon for the whole jail population (approximately 67%)

- o Misdemeanants are more concentrated in the infirmary itself as opposed to other housing areas.
- o The infirmary is used at close to full capacity, and it is not known from these data whether those in the observation/overflow area would be better served by placement in the infirmary itself, or whether those in the infirmary could be effectively serviced in another housing area.
- o The medical population displays a substantially different security level profile than that of the whole jail population, and the profile varies by housing area. In the infirmary, a large proportion of the inmates are unclassified (48% - 55%) and this is most likely due to their being sent to the infirmary at booking. In the medical observation area, there is a concentration of medium security inmates. Medical inmates in other housing areas tend to be higher security inmates.

Psychiatric Population

- o Only 40% of the psychiatric daily population is housed in the psych unit. Another 40% are housed in observation/overflow areas, and the remaining 20% are in other areas of the jail, which we assume are primarily high security areas (close, maximum, or admin segregation areas). This assumption is confirmed by the security profile of this group.
- o The vast majority (70%) of the psychiatric daily population are felons. This is consistent for both months studied (April and June 1990).
- o Misdemeanant psychiatric inmates are most likely to be found in the psychiatric unit itself, as opposed to other housing areas, and make up a more substantial portion of the psych unit population (approximately 42%) than they do the psychiatric population as a whole (30%).
- o The psychiatric unit operates at high to complete capacity utilization. Because utilization is so high, it is not known from these data the extent to which the population split between the psych unit and the observation/overflow area represents an accommodation to the available capacity nor whether

some of the inmates housed routinely in the observation/overflow area would be better served by housing in the psych unit itself.

- o The psychiatric population displays a substantially different security level profile from the general population, generally showing a higher proportion of unclassified and high security inmates.

These snapshots provide a basis for developing an understanding of the 24-hour secure residential male population in terms of prisoner status (i.e., sentenced felon, pre-sentenced felons, etc...) by classification. The analysis of this population will provide some insight into the viability of a specialized facility limited to certain statuses or a "limited service facility." These data are only snapshots and do not reflect a representative sample of the prisoner population.

*What conclusions/findings can be drawn from the collected data?

OBSERVATION:

- o For the two days studied, a relatively small percentage of the male 24-hour residential population was purely sentenced (can include state holds) in the community/minimum security classifications. These prisoners are typically the target for special sentenced/limited service facilities. On 9/25/89, there were 101 out of 1340 residential men (7.5%), and on 2/7/90, there were 91 out of 1200 residential men (7.6%).

- Of the community/minimum security purely sentenced men in the 24-hour residential facilities, approximately two-thirds are felons.
- The impact of community based programs and facilities is apparent in the tables, which show the Tower as a facility primarily for medium security and higher, for newly booked unclassified prisoners, and for special custody populations.
- The West Wing is minimum security facility, which the numbers demonstrate, but minimum security covers the full spectrum of statuses. The West Wing is primarily a pretrial and felony facility, with only 21% purely sentenced and with 83% of the population classified as felons. This is again due to the use of community based facilities and programs for housing purely sentenced low security inmates and the misdemeanor population.
- On both days studied, there was sufficient capacity in the West Wing to house all community/minimum security men.
- Even though the sentenced misdemeanor population constitutes a significant percentage of the total misdemeanor population, it only comprises 1.5% of the total male 24-hour secure residential population.
- Approximately 20% of the sentenced felon population housed in the West Wing do not have other open charges. However, 55% of the pre-sentenced inmates located in the West Wing have a pure status.

These two sets of tables provide a partial answer to question 11, which asks for information on jail bookings by geographic region. The tables reflect the agreed upon planning regions being used in the planning study. The tables indicate for 11 historical sample periods from 1988 through July 1990, the number of jail bookings in the five planning region and the arresting agencies responsible for the arrests within each region. Trends over this period are presented to support the analysis of facility options and forecasted jail workload by region.

*What conclusions/findings can be drawn from the collected data?

Observations:

- o The Seashore (A1) region clearly produces the overwhelming majority of jail bookings, although the percentage has declined from 64% in 1988 to 58% in 1990.
- o The next largest volume of bookings comes from the South (A2) region, which has increased over the study period from 12.1% in 1988 to 14.3% in 1990.
- o The Northeast region (A3) has contributed a fairly consistent proportion of the volume of bookings over the study period at about 6%.

- o The Renton region (A4) has increased slightly over the study period from 3.4% in 1986 to 4.3% in 1990.
- o The Issaquah region (A5) contributes a very small percentage of jail bookings, at 1% or less.
- o A significant proportion of jail bookings comes from a combination of surrenders and arrests from outside the county (A8 + A9). This combined percentage has increased from 14.2% in 1986 to 15.8% in 1990.
- o When the bookings from the South, Renton, and Issaquah regions are combined, the total volume is about 20% of the total (in 1990).
- o The combination of Northeast, Issaquah, and Renton bookings is about 11.6% of the total (in 1990).
- o As Table 11A(2)b shows, part of the Seashore's total bookings comes from non-law enforcement arrests, e.g. arrests via DAD escort or made by State agencies by virtue of their downtown Seattle location. Some of the State bookings are the result of the location of state work release facilities within Seattle, and others are attributed to state community corrections officers working in downtown Seattle office locations. These types of bookings are at the direction of CCO's, and, possibly, could be directed to a jail facility in a location other than downtown Seattle.

Similarly, some of the bookings by the King County Department of Public Safety were generated by virtue of the downtown location of detectives. Many show arrest locations of the County Courthouse, which we assume means that the individual either reported to the DPS office or were brought to the Courthouse for questioning and subsequently escorted to the jail.

Even with these considerations, the Seashore region still represents the vast majority of bookings by virtue of Seattle Police Department activity, which shows a very heavy volume of bookings, particularly for misdemeanor arrests.

These tables provide length of stay information by arrest region, sex, and felony/misdemeanor warrant type. These data will assist with the analysis of how regional booking patterns relate to regional length of stay and jail population and bed needs.

*What conclusions/findings can be drawn from the collected data?

Observations:

- o The total length of stay for bookings from the 1988 samples was 12.87 days and for bookings from the 1989 samples 13.27 days.
- o Among the five planning regions, there are differences in the average length of stay of bookings, but they are not consistent from year to year, and many of the regional figures by region are close.
- o In 1988, the Renton region's bookings had the longest average stay, while in 1989, it was the Seashore region.
- o Excluding the Issaquah region from consideration due to the small number of cases involved, of the remaining four planning regions, the Northeast region's stay is the shortest in both sample years.

- o In both sample years, the Surrender and All Other categories have higher average stays than the five planning regions. The stays of the five planning regions are, in general, more similar to each other than to the Surrender and All Other categories.
- o Women's length of stay is shorter than that of men for both sample years.
- o The distribution of lengths of stay in bed days is given for each region, and there are regional differences in the distributions. Of the five planning regions, Seashore is skewed more toward short stays than the others. The Surrenders consistently show a distribution skewed toward longer stays.

These tables provide some breakdowns of length of stay by status at booking (e.g. pretrial, sentenced, etc.) and type of release (e.g. bail, bond, personal recognizance, transfer to another jurisdiction's custody, etc.) by region. These data provide additional information to assist with the estimates of population levels under the 8 facility options and provide additional descriptive information regarding the population that would be housed under the various options.

*What conclusions/findings can be drawn from the collected data?

Observations:

- o There are significant differences in length of stay patterns by status, with pretrial bookings averaging 4.58 days in 1988 and 5.51 days in 1989.
- o Length of stay for sentenced inmates is greater than for other either pretrial or state hold bookings, averaging 22.94 days in 1988 and 24.83 days in 1989.
- o Sentenced inmates who are released by transfer and state institutional holds tend to have the longest stays, and pretrial bookings with a pretrial release have the shortest stays.
- o Among the five planning regions, there is some consistency from region to region. Pretrial lengths of stay are

similar and range between 3.19 and 6.90 (with the exception of Issaquah in 1988 with a small sample size). Most stays are around 4 days.

- o Sentenced stays are substantially longer than pretrial stays, and there is some variation across regions and years.
- o The longer stays for the Surrender category are due to the concentration of the cases in the sentenced status with a sentence expired or suspended release. In 1988, 263 of 277 bookings fell into this category, and in 1989, 304 of 330 bookings.

These tables indicate the court having jurisdiction over all charges for all sample bookings by region. All charges for which the jail records show a court code are summarized. The table indicates the number of times each court within a planning region and each court outside of the planning region is represented. As such, it gives an indication for each planning region of the need and the extent of the need for either courtroom space, transport, or mixed venue arrangements that would have to be made under the various facility options being considered.

*What conclusions/findings can be drawn from the collected data?

Observations:

- o The summary page indicates the number of charges with a valid court code which are then displayed by region and court on the following tables. The 3870 bookings on the four 1988 sample periods produced 6307 charges with court codes. For 1989, 4280 bookings produced 6727 court coded charges, and for the three 1990 sample periods, 3140 bookings produced 4878 coded charges. (Not all charges have a court code, depending on the type of charge and status. Consequently, this is not a count of total charges for the sample bookings.) This is an average of 1.59 coded charges per booking over the entire sample period.

- o For all five planning regions, there are charges with court activity in another planning region. For Seashore, the percentage of such charges is much less than for the other planning regions (6.05%), although the number of such charges is fairly large (682) due to the large number of bookings in the Seashore region.
- o In the South region 24%, in the Northeast region 26%, in the Renton region 44%, and in the Issaquah region 30% of the charges involve courts in another planning region. The very high level of such activity for the Renton region may be due to the nature of the transportation corridors and the artificial boundary separation between Renton and the South region.
- o Seattle Municipal Court (SMC) charges are present in fairly significant numbers in all planning regions, which has implications for venue rules or transportation requirements when analyzing the various facility options. In the South region, there were 287 SMC charges or 13% of the region total; in the Northeast region, there were 123 SMC charges or 11% of the region total; in the Renton region, there were 124 SMC charges or 17% of the region total; and in the Issaquah region, there were 9 SMC charges or 7% of the region total.
- o In the All Other category, courts from all planning regions are represented, but the Superior Court and courts outside of King County are most heavily represented, followed by Seattle Municipal Court.
- o In the Surrender category, courts from all planning regions are represented with the Superior Court and Seattle Municipal Court most heavily represented. The District Courts, and particularly Northeast District Court, make up most of the remainder with very few municipal court charges outside of Seattle included in the category.
- o In the Seashore region, a very high count for Seattle District Court (469 charges) includes charges from other planning regions which are heard on the "courtesy" or "early bird" calendars, which in essence changes the venue for some types of hearings.
- o There are significant numbers of Superior Court charges in

These tables address the issue of the type of charges in terms of seriousness and status represented in the jail population by region. The tables use a "ranking charge" system developed by the department, summarizing the bookings according to their highest ranked charge. The categories are displayed in "rank" order on the tables. These data assist with the analysis of jail population characteristics by region and help provide a descriptive view of the population that would be housed under the various facility options.

*What conclusions/findings can be drawn from the collected data?

Observations:

- o There are noticeable differences among the regions in the charge/rank characteristics of the bookings that are consistent across the three sample years. This would indicate that there are differences in the type of arrests by region, and that they do not simply mirror each other, but with varying numbers of bookings.
- o Although there are differences by region, there are similarities also, particularly in the tendency for bookings to represent offenses at the less serious end of the spectrum. The proportion of bookings with traffic or nonviolent misdemeanor offenses as the ranking charge

(ranks 15 - 25) varies from 38% to 49% in 1990. The percentages vary, but the weighting of less serious offenses in the bookings is true of the other sample periods as well.

- o Among the five planning regions, the Seashore region has the highest percentage of bookings with the most serious offenses (ranks 45 - 60) and this is consistent across all three sample years. The percentage of bookings with ranks 45 - 60 charges was the highest in 1989 (10.8%) and lowest in 1988 (8.5%), with 1990 between the other two years (9.4%).
- o Of the five planning regions and following Seashore, the South planning region shows the next highest percentage of bookings with the most serious offenses (ranks 45 - 60), which is also consistent across the three sample time periods.
- o Following the South region, Renton exceeds the Northeast in its bookings being characterized by the most serious charges (ranks 45-60), but the differences are not great.
- o Bookings with the most serious charges are most heavily represented in the Surrender and All Other categories, and this is consistent across all sample time periods.
- o For the traffic and nonviolent misdemeanor offenses (ranks 15 - 25), the regional pattern varies somewhat over the sample time periods. Among the five planning regions, the Northeast's bookings consistently represent the highest proportion of these misdemeanor offenses.
- o In 1990, the region with the next highest proportion of traffic and nonviolent misdemeanors among its bookings is Seashore (eliminating Issaquah from consideration due to the small number of bookings which leads to an erratic pattern). Seashore's bookings are characterized by both the largest percentage of very serious and a high percentage of the least serious offenses.
- o Of all the categories, the Surrender category has the highest representation of the least serious misdemeanor offenses (ranks 15 - 25). The Surrender category is a mixed group in terms of including a high proportion of very serious offenses and the least serious offenses.
- o Of all the categories, the All Other category has the lowest representation of the least serious misdemeanor.

offenses (ranks 15 - 25). When bookings originate outside the county borders, they are less likely to be for the least serious misdemeanors than for some other type of offense.

- o Some of the special status categories are heavily skewed to the Seashore region. In 1990, 19 of the 23 state holds were from Seashore, and 43 of the 72 probation and community service violators.
- o Over the 11 sample periods examined, approximately 34% of the charges were felony offenses and the remaining 64% were misdemeanor offenses. Less than a 2% variance over the same split was observed for all three years. Within the felony offenses, miscellaneous felons (rank 35) accounted for approximately 43% of the felony offenses and nonviolent criminal misdemeanor offenses (rank 20) represents the highest percentage of misdemeanor offenses (approximately 50%).

Pretrial Records indicate a pretrial status at booking.

Release Methods:

Pretrial Release: Released bail or bond; PR; investigation released.

W/ Court Action: Release code indicates high likelihood of court action in many or all cases, e.g. case dismissed; conditional release; fine payment. Most releases are pretrial.

Sentenced at Release: Release code indicates that inmate was sentenced subsequent to booking; sentenced released; sentenced suspended.

All Other: All other release codes, e.g. transfer of custody.

Sentenced Records indicate a sentenced status at booking.

Release Methods:

Released Bail/Bond: Release code indicates bail or bond was posted and charge was sentenced.

Conditional Release: Release code indicates court action and, in many cases, a conditional release other than expiration or suspension of sentence, e.g. conditional release, fine payment, PR, case dismissed.

Sentence Released/Suspended: Release code indicates sentence expired or was suspended.

Transferred: Release code indicates inmate was transferred to the custody of another jurisdiction.

State Hold Records indicate a state hold at booking. The state hold subtypes indicate the specific types of state hold including parole holds, probation or SRA noncompliance cases, state work release holds, and state institutional holds. All release methods are included for each subtype.

This snapshot of a day's jail population is the basis for an understanding of the 24-hour secure male population in terms of prisoner status and security classification. This analysis provides a more detailed profile of prisoner statuses than 7A, breaking out the state hold category separately, so that the numbers of prisoners in specific subgroups can be identified. These data are applicable to detention facility planning, non-capital alternatives analysis, and to the analysis of special status or "limited service" facility options being considered.

*What conclusions/findings can be drawn from the collected data?

OBSERVATIONS:

- o As a result of separating the state holds from the sentenced felons (they were combined in 7A), the number of sentenced felons, and particularly purely sentenced felons is reduced over the 7A figure. Pure sentenced felons totalled 58 in the Tower on the sample day and 26 in the West Wing. This represents 6.3% of the male 24-hour secure population, and only 5.6% of the Tower male population.

Pure sentenced misdemeanors totalled 104, 28 of which were housed in the West Wing. After subtracting the number of
