ORDINANCE NO. _

AN ORDINANCE relating to water and sewer comprehensive plans; clarifying review authority and purpose, reducing the size of the Utilities Technical Review Committee (UTRC); establishing the UTRC as the appeals body hearing issues relating to the creation of new public water systems within the boundaries of a Critical Water Supply Service Area; and requiring consistency with coordinated water system plans (RCW 70.116); amending Ordinance 1709, Sections 1, 2, 5, 6 and 7 as amended; and KCC 13.24.010, 13.24.030, 13.24.060; 13.24.080, and 13.24.090; and adding new sections to KCC 13.24.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF KING COUNTY:

<u>SECTION 1</u>. Ordinance 1709, Section 1 as amended and KCC 13.24.010 are each amended to read as follows:

((District)) Water and sewer system comprehensive plans.

A. Comprehensive plans for water and sewer districts ((and)) or any other public or private entities which distribute or obtain water or provide sewer ((service)) collection or treatment, except for the Municipality of Metropolitan Seattle, in unincorporated areas of King County, Washington, shall be adopted by each such ((district, or)) entity and approved by the King County council as a prerequisite for the following: ((granting of new right of way franchises and right of way construction permits and right of way franchise renewals.))

- 1. Operating in unincorporated King County;
- 2. Approval of annexation proposals;
- 3. Granting of new right-of-way franchises and right-of-way franchise renewals; and
 - 4. Approval of right-of-way construction permits.
- B. Except as provided in Section 3 of this ordinance,

 ((5)) such plans shall be reviewed by a utilities technical review committee established by this chapter prior to submission to the King County council for approval. ((+

provided, that sewer and water comprehensive plans approved by the county prior to July 1, 1973 will not require further approval for the purposes of this chapter until December 30, 1976.

<u>NEW SECTION. SECTION 2</u>. The purpose of this chapter is to accomplish the following:

- A. Assure that sewer and water system comprehensive plans are consistent with adopted county plans, policies and land use controls;
- B. Provide information to assist in the preparation of future county plans and policies;
- C. Provide information to assist in the review of new development proposals and right-of-way construction permits; and
- D. To fulfill the county's responsibilities set forth in RCW 90.54 (Water Resources Act of 1971), RCW 36.70 (State Planning Enabling Act), RCW 36.94, RCW 56.02, RCW 57.02, and WAC 248.54.065.

NEW SECTION. SECTION 3. Exemption from council approval of Group B water systems. As provided by RCW 43.20 and WAC 248.54 and KCC Title 12, plans for Group B water systems in unincorporated King County shall be reviewed and approved by the Seattle-King County health department. Plans for Group B water systems shall not require approval of the county council pursuant to this chapter unless a right-of-way construction permit is required. The health department shall prepare and regularly update a list of those Group B systems that have been approved. Included in the list shall be the important characteristics of the systems such as water quality, water quantity, reliability, the operator or manager, and the capacity of the system to serve existing and additional customers. The list shall be provided annually to the utilities technical review committee and shall be consulted when preparing recommendations for, but not limited to, franchises, other water plans, and new developments.

SECTION 4. Ordinance 1709, Section 2 as amended and KCC 13.24.030 are amended as follows:

Comprehensive plans - water purveyors. Water district and distributor comprehensive plans for water systems shall ((consist of)) contain the following:

- A. A narrative report which provides the following information:
 - 1. A short history of the district or company,
- 2. Population projection for the ((distribution))

 existing service area ((or district,)) and for the area

 anticipated to be served in the future as described in

 ((subdivision 7)) paragraph 8 of this subsection, together with
 the source or basis of the projection,
- 3. A description of the existing water sources, storage and distribution facilities, and the physical, chemical, and bacteriological quality of the supply ((7)). An application for a water right to the Washington State Department of Ecology shall not be adequate proof of a valid water source.
- 4. For those systems utilizing surface supplies, with disinfection only, the purveyor shall include a report identifying all facilities, conditions and activities within its watershed, together with a proposed program for necessary surveillance, limitation and control,
- 5. A proposed time schedule for constructing improvements required to ((meet)) correct any existing deficiencies of supply, storage, distribution or quality, including any treatment facilities not in compliance with state or local health requirements,
- 6. Proposed ((plans)) schedule for covering any open distribution reservoirs. Interim facilities, including chlorination, may be considered in the plans for covering,
- 7. A water conservation plan consisting of a water shortage response element dealing with seasonal drought conditions and shortages caused by high turbidity; and a long-range resource conservation element to reduce overall water

usage per capita which will use the geographically relevant coordinated water system plan and the percentages and deadlines contained in the approval legislation as the standard. For those purveyors not included as part of a coordinated water ((supply)) system plan, the conservation element standard will be that of the nearest critical water supply service area.

- 8. A ((projection)) list of anticipated system ((needs)) improvements for at least ten years into the future for ((districts and distributors)) water systems having more than one thousand services; or a ((projection)) list of anticipated system ((needs)) improvements for at least five years in the future for all other ((districts and distributors)) water systems,
- 9. A proposed construction schedule to meet projected system needs and a plan setting forth the means for financing the proposed improvements,
- 10. A description of any agreements, or any attempts to reach agreements, with neighboring sewer and water districts, municipalities or special districts,
- 11. A ((description of developer extension plans and/or a statement)) list of minimum criteria and standards for developer extension agreements required by the ((district)) purveyor to be met by developers,
- 12. A description of the satellite management program, including sample agreements and conditions for service.
- 13. An explanation of the relationship between the ((district's or distributor's)) purveyor's existing and proposed system and the basinwide water and/or sewerage plan as approved by the State Department of Ecology and the State Department of ((Social and)) Health ((Services)),
- ((13.)) 14. A discussion of the ((relationship))

 consistency between the ((district)) purveyor's comprehensive

 system plan and county adopted plans, policies, and land use

NEW SECTION. SECTION 5. Water system plans shall be revised every five years from the date of the last approval of the county council.

<u>SECTION 6.</u> Ordinance 1709, Section 5 as amended and KCC 13.24.060 are each amended to read as follows:

Comprehensive plans - Approval requirements.

Comprehensive plans approved by the county shall contain the elements listed in Sections 13.24.030 or 13.24.040 and shall not be inconsistent with the following:

- A. King County Code Chapter 17.08 relating to the installation of fire hydrants and water mains;
 - B. State and local health standards;
- C. The creation and maintenance of logical service areas consistent with the relevant coordinated water system plan (RCW 70.116).
- <u>D. The elimination and/or prevention of duplicate</u>
 facilities;
- E. The promotion of the most reliable and healthful service to the public:
- F. The provision of service at a reasonable cost and maximization of the use of existing public facilities;

H. County comprehensive plan, adopted community plans, and other pertinent county adopted plans and policies; ((provided, that in those areas where a community plan has not been adopted, the approval of new significant general purpose improvements to water systems, including pumping, storage, source, or transmission mains, shall be limited to serve existing or permitted uses. Existing or permitted uses shall not be construed to mean new residential subdivisions, short subdivisions, or planned unit developments;))

- ((D.)) <u>I.</u> Coordinated water system plans ((for areas designated as critical water supply service areas in K.C.C.

 13.23 pursuant to)) RCW 70.116;
- $((E_7))$ <u>J.</u> The basinwide water and/or sewerage plan when approved by the State Department of Ecology and the State Department of ((Social and)) Health ((Services));
- $((F_{-}))$ <u>K.</u> Applicable state water quality and waste management standards; ((and))
 - L. The State Water Resources Act, RCW 90.554; and

 ((Gr)) M. The King County Sewerage General Plan.
- N. Adopted ground water management plans pursuant to RCW 90.44.400 and WAC 173-100.

SECTION 7. Ordinance 1709, Section 6 as amended, and KCC
13.24.080 are each amended to read as follows:

Utilities technical review committee - Creation and composition. A utilities technical review committee is created consisting of one representative each from the ((department of budget and program development, division of budgets,)) department of parks, planning and resources ((community development)), the divisions of planning and community development and ((of)) building and land development; department of executive administration, the real property division; the department of public works ((and transportation)); the Seattle-King County department of public

health; ((and)) the King County fire marshal and a King County council staff member. Such representatives shall be appointed by the director of each department. ((The executive secretary of the King County boundary review board and a King County council staff member shall be ex officio members of the committee.))

SECTION 8. Ordinance 1709, Section 7, as amended and KCC 13.24.090 are each amended to read as follows:

Utilities technical review committee - Authority. utilities technical review committee shall review and make recommendations to the King County executive and ((to)) the King County council on the adequacy of all sewer and water system comprehensive plans and related matters, and determination of their consistency with the King County comprehensive plan; provided, further, that the committee shall have the authority to approve additions and betterments to council-approved sewer and water comprehensive plans without referral to the council in order to serve developments which have received preliminary approval from the King County council. The utilities technical review committee shall serve as an appeals body to hear issues relating to the creation of new public water systems and the extension of existing public water service within the boundaries of a critical water supply service area as provided for in the utility service review procedures contained in the coordinated water system plans; the key determinant is whether an existing water purveyor can provide service in a timely and reasonable manner (WAC 2248-56-<u>620).</u>

NEW SECTION. SECTION 9. Certificates of water availability. The issuance of a certificate of water availability is required to document that adequate water service is available to proposed development projects within King County. Water availability shall be consistent with a system's supply, provided, that a district shall not issue

certificates of water availability which when added to existing 1 connections, exceed the system's supply by two percent. 2 NEW SECTION. SECTION 10. Severability.
