ORDINANCE NO. 10152

AN ORDINANCE relating to clearing and grading permits; exempting livestock flood sanctuaries from clearing and grading permit requirements; amending Ordinance 9614, Section 100, and K.C.C. 16.82.050 and declaring an emergency.

PREAMBLE:

THE COUNCIL HEREBY FINDS THAT:

- Scotion 17 of Chapter 322, 1991 Washington Laws requires that local governments include provision in their floodplain regulations for livestock flood sanctuary areas.
- During the Thanksgiving 1990 flood, farmers in the 2. Snoqualmie Valley lost over 500 cows, calves, and heifers and hundreds of tons of alfalfa hay, oat hay, dry grain, and straw.
- Agriculture is a preferred land use for the Snoqualmie 3. River Basin according to the Snoqualmie Valley Community Plan.
- Agriculture is a land use compatible with flood hazard 4. areas.
- Construction of livestock flood sanctuary areas will help 5. assure the continued viability of agricultural activity in the Snoqualmie River Valley.
- The Soil Conservation Service provides assistance to dairy 6. farmers in the construction of manure storage lagoons, and would consider construction of these areas to be a similar service.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF KING COUNTY:

SECTION 1. Ordinance 9614, Section 100 and K.C.C.

16.82.050 are hereby amended to read as follows:

Clearing and Grading Permit required - Exceptions. A. No person shall do any clearing or grading without first having obtained a clearing and grading permit from the director except for the following:

1. An on site excavation or fill for basements and footings of a building, retaining wall, parking lot, or other structure authorized by a valid building permit. This shall not exempt any fill made with the material from such excavation nor exempt any excavation having an unsupported height greater than five feet after the completion of such structure;

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1	 The depositing or covering of any garbage,
2	rubbish or other material at any solid waste facility operated
3	by King County;
4	3. Maintenance of existing driveways or private
5	access roads within their existing road prisms, provided that
6	the performance and restoration requirements of this chapter
7	are met and best management practices are utilized to protect
8	water quality.
9	4. Any grading within a publicly owned road
10	right-of-way;
11	5. Clearing or grading by a public agency for the
12	following routine maintenance activities:
13	a. Roadside ditch cleaning provided the ditch
14	does not contain salmonids;
15	b. Pavement maintenance;
16	c. Normal grading of gravel shoulders;
17	d. Maintenance of culverts;
18	e. Maintenance of flood control or other approved
19	surface water management facilities;
20	f. Routine clearing within road right-of-way.
21	6. Any clearing or grading for roads within a
22	preliminary or finally approved residential plat which has been
23	approved by the director and for which a bond has been posted;
24	7. Maintenance or reconstruction of the facilities
25	of a common carrier by a rail in interstate commerce within its
26	existing right-of-way; provided restoration is consistent with
27	the requirements of Section 16.82.110; provided that this
28	exception does not apply if the clearing or grading is within a
29	sensitive area as regulated in K.C.C. Chapter 21.54.
30	8. Cemetery graves; provided that this exception
31	does not apply except for routine maintenance if the clearing
32	or grading is within a sensitive area as regulated in K.C.C.
33	Chapter 21.54;
34	9. Clearing or grading within a preliminarily or
35	finally approved residential plat not involving any excavation

 exceeding five feet in vertical depth or any fill exceeding three feet in vertical depth, regardless of the amount of material to be removed; provided that this exception does not apply if the clearing or grading is within a sensitive area as regulated in K.C.C. Chapter 21.54;

- depth not involving more than one hundred cubic yards of earth or other material on a single site; provided that the exception does not apply if the clearing or grading is within a sensitive area as regulated in K.C.C. Chapter 21.54;
- 11. Fill less than three feet in vertical depth not involving more than one hundred cubic yards of earth or other material on a single site; provided that the exception does not apply if the clearing or grading is within a sensitive area as regulated in K.C.C. Chapter 21.54;
- 12. Minor stream restoration projects for fish habitat enhancement by a public agency, utility or tribe as set out in K.C.C. 21.54.
- livestock manure storage facilities or associated nonpoint source pollution facilities designed to the standards of and approved in a conservation plan by the King County conservation district, and constructed and maintained to those standards or livestock flood sanctuaries constructed and maintained to the standards approved by the Soil Conservation Service and conservation district and the best management practices approved by King County.
- 14. Clearing and grading, performed as Class I, II, III or IV Special forest practice in the F (Forestry) zone, that is conducted in accordance with RCW 76.09 and WAC 222.
- 15. The following activities are exempt from the clearing requirements of this chapter and no permit shall be required:
- a. Clearing outside of sensitive areas and buffers as regulated in K.C.C. 21.54 unless the development

proposal site is within an area subject to clearing restrictions contained in a critical drainage area administrative rule or in p-suffix conditions in an adopted community plan. b. Within sensitive areas, as regulated in K.C.C. 21.54, the following activities are exempt from the clearing requirements of this chapter and no permit shall be required. (1) Normal and routine maintenance of existing lawns and landscaping subject to the limitations on the use of pesticides in sensitive areas as set out in K.C.C. 21.54. (2) Permitted agricultural uses; provided the clearing is consistent with the agricultural exemptions in sensitive areas as regulated in K.C.C. 21.54. imminent danger or hazard to persons or property.

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- (3) Emergency tree removal to prevent
- (4) Normal and routine horticultural activities associated with commercial orchards, nurseries, or Christmas tree farms in existence on the effective date of Ordinance 9614 (November 27, 1990) subject to the limitations on the use of pesticides in sensitive areas as set out in K.C.C. 21.54. This does not include clearing or grading in order to develop or expand such activities.
- (5) Normal and routine maintenance of existing public parks and private and public golf courses. This does not include clearing or grading in order to develop or expand such activities in sensitive areas.
- (6) Removal of noxious weeds from steep slope hazard areas and the buffers of streams and wetlands subject to the limitations on the use of pesticides in sensitive areas as set out in K.C.C. 21.54.
- (7) Pruning and limbing of vegetation for maintenance of above ground electrical and telecommunication facilities; provided that the clearing is consistent with the

electric, natural gas, cable communication and telephone utility exemption in sensitive areas as regulated in K.C.C. Chapter 21.54. (8) Class I, II, III and IV Special forest practices outside of areas zoned F provided they occur on parcels that meet all of the following criteria for long term forestry: (a) The parcel is enrolled under the current use taxation program as timber land pursuant to RCW 84.34 or as forest land pursuant to RCW 84.33; (b) A long term management plan is approved for the parcel by the Washington Department of Natural Resources; (c) The parcel is located within areas

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designated rural or agricultural by the King county comprehensive plan or applicable community plan;

(d) The parcel is located outside of expansion areas for incorporated cities or rural activity centers as designated in community plans, and;

(e) The parcel equals or exceeds 5 acres in size.

B. TEMPORARY PERMITS. The director shall have the authority to issue temporary permits for excavations, processing, quarrying and mining, and removal of sand, gravel, rock and other natural deposits, together with the necessary buildings, apparatus or appurtenances incident thereto for specific jobs on application for highway, road, street, airport construction, flood control and other public works projects. In conjunction with such operations, allied uses such as, but not limited to, rock crushers, concrete-batching plants and asphalt-batching plants may be authorized by this temporary permit.

The division of building and land development shall consider the effect of the proposed operation on the county road system and any effect it may have on surface or

groundwater drainage and flood control, and shall make such 1 recommendations as are necessary to protect the public interest 2 in this regard. 3 The division of building and land development shall also 4 consider the effect of the proposed operation on the current 5 and future land use in the area affected by the proposed 6 operation and shall condition permits as necessary to protect 7 the public interest in this regard. Temporary permits are good Я for the life of the contract of the specific job but must be 9 reviewed annually. Each temporary permit site shall be fully 10 restored during the term of the temporary permit, unless the 11 site is subsequently designated with a QM zone classification 12 or included in an unclassified use permit. 13 SECTION 2.
