AN ORDINANCE redefining the uses of hotel-motel tax revenues, establishing a cultural facilities program and a hotel-motel special support program, amending Ordinance 9279, Sections 1-4, 6-10 and 12; adding new sections; and repealing Ordinance 9279, Section 13.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF KING COUNTY:

SECTION 1. Ordinance 9279, Section 1, is hereby amended to read as follows:

Findings. The Washington State Legislature has decided under the provisions of RCW 67.28.180(3)(a), as amended, that excess proceeds from the hotel-motel tax levied annually in King County shall only be used according to the formula set forth therein ((only)) for:

- (1) the support of the arts, the performing arts, art museums, heritage museums and cultural museums of King County $((\cdot))$; and
- (2) for the support of stadium capital improvements, open space acquisition, youth sports activities and tourism promotion, in a manner reflecting that order of priority.
- A. King County's diverse ((arts and heritage)) cultural organizations and professional artists can enrich and support ((arts and)) cultural education and ((arts and)) cultural tourism in this region. King County is a regional and national center for ((arts and)) culture and has the seventh largest population of individual artists per capita nationwide. These ((arts and)) cultural resources can train young artists, build audiences for the future and attract local residents, children and tourists to their events and programs.
- B. ((Arts and c)) Cultural education in the public schools is an integral part of support for ((the arts and)) cultur((e))al endeavors. It provides the opportunity to observe, participate and engage in the ((arts and)) cultural process with professional artists and community ((arts and))

cultural organizations, as a part of the educational process in and out of the classroom.

C. ((While the state of Washington, through the Basic Education Act, is responsible for funding arts and cultural education as part of basic education, King County and its citizens have a compelling and continuing interest in the education of young people, including education in the public schools in the arts and culture, and may choose to enhance basic education through grants and other means as deemed necessary to implement the enhancement.))

Involving children in creating works of art and · ((D)). providing the opportunities for children to work with arts teachers, artists, and performing arts organizations, both in the classroom and in the community, is necessary as part of a comprehensive ((arts-and)) cultural education program. <u>Cultural</u> ((E)) education ((in arts and culture)) can increase students' awareness, knowledge, and acceptance of ((arts and)) culture; can improve understanding between artists, teachers and administrators; and can encourage cooperation among arts, heritage, and educational institutions and organizations.

D. The transmission of historical and cultural values and traditions from one generation to the next is essential to the well-being and sense of identity of communities, ethnic and cultural groups, and of all citizens of King County. Historic sites and attractions are among the most visited types of tourist attractions in the state and county. The loss or destruction of historic buildings, sites, objects, structures and districts and of historic and prehistoric materials and artifacts constitutes an irreplaceable loss to the quality of life and character of King County.

E. King County's responsibility is to ensure support for development of cultural activities in all parts of the county, including urban, suburban, rural and both incorporated and unincorporated areas, and to assist communities in that

1	process, where necessary. In addition, support for regional
2	centers of activity shall be included.
3	F. King County recognizes that support for major
4	regional, midsized, emerging and community-based cultural
5	organizations should be distributed among them to promote a
6	broad range of creative and cultural expression.
7	G. King County recognizes that support for efforts by
8	individual artists and heritage specialists is conducive to the
9	creative output and historic preservation activities of this
10	region.
11	H. King County recognizes that, in making funding
12	decisions, it will consider to the extent appropriate, the
13	grantee's inclusion of the interests of culturally diverse,
14	disabled and low income participants and audiences.
15	I. King County recognizes that a healthy and well-
16	balanced future citizenry is dependent upon the promotion of
17	cultural education of today's youth.
18	J. King County recognizes the role of arts, culture
19	and heritage in augmenting tourism and building King County as
20	a nationally and internationally recognized cultural center an
21	as a destination for visitors to this county.
22	K. King County recognizes that traditional culture.
23	heritage resources, archaeological sites and landmarks
24	constitute nonrenewable resources that must be protected in the
25	face of fast-paced development and growth.
26	L. King County recognizes the need to preserve
27	indigenous cultures.
28	M. King County recognizes that publicly-owned art
29	fills a need for artistic and cultural expression and visual
30	improvement in communities and supports the efforts to meet
31	that need.
32	SECTION 2. Definitions. Ordinance 9279, Section 2, is
33	hereby amended to read as follows:
34	A. "((Arts and e)) Culture" is defined as the arts and
-35	((cultural)) heritage disciplines, which include but are not

limited to dance, drama/theater, music, visual arts, literary arts, media arts, performing arts, traditional and folk arts, ethnic arts, and history, heritage and historic preservation.

- B. "((Arts and c)) Cultural education" is defined as the sequential and comprehensive study of the elements of the various arts and ((cultural)) heritage forms and how to use them creatively including instruction in skills, critical assessment, the history of the arts and ((cultural)) heritage forms, and aesthetic judgment.
- C. "((Arts and e)) Cultural ((tourism and enrichment))
 enhancement" is defined as arts and ((cultural)) heritage
 institutions, individuals and programs working together with
 the tourism industry to enhance the county's international
 reputation by promoting its cultural ((and artistic))
 attractions and broadening the audiences served. ((Arts and
 e)) Cultural ((tourism and enrichment)) enhancement preserves
 the county's ((artistic and)) cultural identity, strengthens
 the local economy and improves the quality of life for county
 residents.
- D. "Cultural facilities" shall include buildings and structures which are used primarily for the performance, exhibition or benefit of arts and heritage activities, including but not limited to performing arts, visual arts, heritage and cultural endeavors.
- E. "Fixed assets" are defined as tangible objects such as machinery or equipment intended to be held for ten years or more which will benefit cultural institutions.
- SECTION 3. Ordinance 9279, Section 3, is hereby amended to read as follows:

There is hereby created the King County ((Arts and))
Cultural Education Program Fund.

- A. The King County ((Arts and)) Cultural Education Program Fund shall be a special revenue fund.
- B. For investment purposes, the King County ((Arts and))
 Cultural Education Program Fund shall be considered a second

tier fund with the finance section of the office of financial management and designated as fund manager.

- C. Beginning January 1, 1991 and ending December 31, 1991, forty percent of all excess hotel-motel tax revenues collected by King County under the provisions of RCW 67.28.180(3)(a) in any calendar year shall be deposited in the King County ((Arts and)) Cultural Education Program Fund.
- D. Monies expended from the King County ((Arts and))

 Cultural Education Program Fund shall be used only for ((the King County Arts and Cultural Education Program and shall be subject to the conditions as defined in this ordinance))

 Cultural Education Program projects recommended by the county executive and approved by the county council prior to December 31, 1991. Any monies remaining after completion of these projects shall be transferred to the Cultural Education Program in the King County Education and Cultural Development Fund.

((E. First-distribution of funds shall be no later than the 1991-1992 school year. Subsequent distributions shall occur annually for each school year, thereafter.))

SECTION 4. Ordinance 9279, Section 4, is hereby amended to read as follows:

The King County council hereby establishes the King County ((Arts and)) Cultural Education Program. Forty percent of the excess hotel-motel tax revenues allocated to the King County Education and Cultural Development Fund remaining subsequent to the allocation of the King County Cultural Facilities Program pursuant to Section 8 shall be expended for the King County Cultural Education Program, provided that at least twenty percent of the King County Cultural Education Program revenue allocation shall be earmarked for heritage programs and administered by the King County landmarks commission. The program shall consist of one- to three-year grants ((for King County public school and/or public school district initiated projects and programs)) developed by cultural organizations for the purpose of enriching existing and creating new cultural

education programs, reviewed annually, and shall be subject to
the following:

A. Applicants eligible to apply for the King County ((Arts and)) Cultural Education Program grants are all ((King County public schools and/or public school districts in King County)) cultural organizations that meet the ((applicable deadlines)) criteria contained in this ordinance and any applicable guidelines approved by the council for the King County ((Arts and)) Cultural Education Program. School districts and schools shall not receive revenues distributed pursuant to this section.

B. ((Local control of King County's public schools shall be preserved.))

((6.)) Monies granted to the individual ((King County public schools and/or public school districts)) cultural organizations shall be used to enrich existing ((arts and)) cultural education programs or to create new ones and in any event shall be expended only for direct costs for ((arts and)) cultural education as defined in this ordinance, which may include fees for artists, ((arts)) cultural specialists, experts in ((arts)) cultural education, and performing arts organizations. Any application for monies to enrich existing or to create new arts, cultural or heritage programs shall be developed by the applicant(s) in joint cooperation with a King County public school or school district.

((Đ)) <u>C. Organizations proposing projects for ((A))all</u> grades shall be eligible for funding through grants under this ordinance. However, while funds are minimal, <u>projects proposed</u> for grades K-8, or grades K-9 in schools where grade 9 remains in the middle school configuration, shall receive priority for funding.

((Ξ)) \underline{D} . The cost of administering the King County ((Artsand)) Cultural Education Program shall be minimal.

((F. Individual schools shall apply for the grants by February 15th in order to be awarded allocations starting July 1 of the same year.))

- ((G)) \underline{E} . Applications must describe the intended use of The intended use must be for cultural the grant funds. education projects serving King County schools- and/or public school districts((-initiated projects and programs for arts and cultural education as defined in this ordinance)). Grant applications may address the needs of special student populations, such as at-risk students and students with handicaps or disabilities, and other youth of school age who are not currently in school, such as youth in detention and those who have dropped out of school.
- ((H)) \underline{F} . There shall be written guidelines and procedures for applying for grants which shall include eligibility criteria, scope of program, and funding needs. shall be written by the ((Arts and)) cultural education advisory committee and recommended by the arts commission and the landmarks commission and shall be subject to council The advisory committee shall establish procedures approval. for evaluation of programs and accountability of funds. procedures shall be submitted by the arts commission and the landmarks commission to the council for approval.
- ((±)) G. Grant awards shall reflect a county-wide geographic distribution, and shall include projects serving public schools and public school districts from various affluent and less affluent communities.
- ((3)) H. Grant decisions are made on a competitive basis and in accordance with criteria established pursuant to paragraph ((H)) \underline{F} . above. Established criteria shall include commitment and ability to provide student learning in ((arts and)) cultur((e))al endeavors. Grants made under the King County ((Arts and)) Cultural Education Program shall recognize that Bellevue is receiving its own hotel-motel tax revenues, and therefore preference shall be given to applications serving

other areas of the county. Grants to organizations proposing worthwhile projects in Bellevue public schools ((for worthwhile projects)) are not precluded. ((King County Arts and Cultural Education Program grant awards shall be allocated to individual schools by July 1 of each year.))

SECTION 5. Ordinance 9279, Section 6, is hereby amended to read as follows:

There is hereby created the King County ((Arts and)) cultural education advisory committee as a subcommittee of the King county arts commission and the King County landmarks commission to oversee and provide direction for the King County ((Arts and)) Cultural Education Program and make recommendations through the arts commission and landmarks commission to the King County executive and King County council.

- A. The ((Arts and)) cultural education advisory committee membership shall reflect the ethnic and geographic diversity of King County. The committee shall have nine members. The nine members shall include parents, an arts administrator, public school arts teachers, public school teachers, professional artists and heritage professionals, representatives of cultural, heritage and ethnic organizations, interested community volunteers and ((two)) one King County arts Commission member and one King County landmarks commission member((s)).
- B. The members of the advisory committee shall be nominated by the executive and confirmed by the council and shall serve for three-year terms. Three of the initial appointments shall be for three-year terms, three for two-year terms and three for a one-year term to enable terms to be staggered.
- C. The duties and authorities of the advisory committee shall be the following:
- 1. Develop guidelines and evaluation criteria to apply for and award grants under this program.

- 2. Review and ((determine)) recommend eligibility of all grant applications.
 - 3. Submit budget recommendations for the program.
- 4. Recommend through the arts commission and landmarks commission grant awards for approval by the King County executive and King County council.
- 5. Set forth program ideas and suggestions for ((schools)) applicants to consider.
- 6. Encourage a high quality of programs and a diversity of program ideas.
- 7. Assure grant awards to organizations reflect projects in a broad geographic distribution of schools and school districts, and are accessible to children from a wide range of socioeconomic levels, ethnic groups and special student populations.
- 8. Annually report program results through the arts commission and landmarks commission to the King County executive and King County council.
 - 9. Evaluate grant performance and expenditures.
- 10. Make suggestions through the arts commission and landmarks commission to the King County executive and the King County council for program improvements.

NEW SECTION, SECTION 6. There is hereby created the King County Hotel-Motel Special Support Program.

- A. The Hotel-Motel Special Support program shall be administered by the King County office of financial management under the direction of the King County executive and in accordance with guidelines and policies established by the King County council.
- B. From January 1, 1992 through December 31, 2000 twenty-five percent, and from January 1, 2001 through December 31, 2012 thirty percent, of all excess hotel-motel tax revenues collected by King County under the provisions of RCW 67.28.180(3)(a), as amended, shall be allocated to the Hotel/Motel Special Support Program and shall used for the

following purposes and in a manner reflecting the following order of priority: Stadium capital improvements, acquisition of open space lands, youth sports activities and tourism promotion.

- C. For the purposes of this section, "Stadium capital improvements" include, but are not limited to, a stadium restaurant facility operated by a private concessionaire under a contract with the county; restroom facilities; artificial turf system; seating facilities; parking facilities; and a scoreboard and information system adjacent to or within a county-owned stadium, together with equipment, utilities, accessories and appurtenances necessary thereto.
- D. "Tourism promotion" includes activities intended to attract visitors for overnight stays, arts, heritage, and cultural events, and recreational, professional, and amateur sports events. Monies distributed for tourism promotion shall be in addition to and may not be used to replace or supplant any other funding by the county. Eligible applicants shall only include nonprofit organizations formed for the express purpose of tourism promotion in the county. Such organizations shall use monies distributed under this section to promote events in all parts of the county.
- E. There shall be written guidelines and procedures for allocating funds under this section. The guidelines shall be written at the direction of the executive and shall be approved by the council.

SECTION 7. Ordinance 9279, Section 7, is hereby amended to read as follows:

There is hereby created the King County ((Arts,)) Education and Cultural Development Fund.

- A. The King County ((Arts,)) Education and Cultural Development Fund shall be a special revenue fund.
- B. For investment purposes, the King County ((Arts,)) Education and Cultural Development Fund shall be considered a

second tier fund with the finance section of the office of financial management designated as fund manager.

C. Beginning January 1, 199((1))2, and through December 31, 2000, ((sixty)) seventy-five percent and beginning January 1, 2001 through December 31, 2012, seventy percent of all excess hotel-motel tax revenues collected by King County under the provisions of RCW 67.28.180(3)(a), as amended, in any calendar year shall be deposited in the King County ((Arts,)) Education and Cultural Development Fund. The King County ((Arts,)) Education and Cultural Development Fund will fund the King County Cultural Facilities Program, the ((new)) King County ((Arts and)) Cultural Tourism and Enrichment Program, the King County Cultural Education Program and the ((new)) King County Opportunity Grant Program.

D. Monies expended from this fund shall be used only for the purposes established in this ordinance and shall be subject to the conditions of this ordinance. Monies distributed to art museums, cultural museums, heritage museums, the arts, and the performing arts shall be in addition to and may not be used to replace or supplant any other cultural programs funded by the county from general revenues.

E. At least forty percent of the revenues distributed pursuant to this section for the period January 1, 2001, through December 31, 2012, shall be deposited in an account and shall be used to establish an endowment. Principal in the account shall remain permanent and irreducible. The remaining sixty percent, along with the earnings from investments of balances in the account, may only be used for the purposes stated in this ordinance.

F. Recommendations for grants from the King County Education and Cultural Development Fund shall be made by the King County arts commission and the King County landmarks commission and submitted to the county executive for recommendation and to the county council for review and approval.

NEW SECTION, SECTION 8. There is hereby established a King County Cultural Facilities Program.

- A. The Cultural Facilities Program shall be administered by the cultural resources division under the direction of the King County executive and in accordance with guidelines and policies established by the King County council. The program shall consist of grants responding to priorities established by the council, reviewed annually, to performing arts, visual arts, heritage and cultural organizations.
- B. Beginning January 1, 1992 and through December 31, 2000 at least seventy percent of the revenue allocated to the Education and Cultural Development Fund shall be expended on the King County Cultural Facilities Program, provided that at least twenty percent of the King County Cultural Facilities Program revenue allocation shall be earmarked for heritage programs and administered by the King County landmarks commission.
- C. The funds allocated to the Cultural Facilities Program shall be used only for the purchase, design, construction, and remodeling of performing arts, visual arts, heritage, and cultural facilities, and for the purchase of fixed assets that will benefit art, heritage, and cultural organizations.
- D. Funds may be spent on providing assistance for planning and improvement of cultural facilities, providing for the preservation and restoration of cultural facilities otherwise eligible for funding pursuant to this ordinance, and providing funds to cultural organizations to comply with Section 504 of the Federal Rehabilitation Act of 1973, as amended.
- E. Funds received under this section may be used for payment of principal and interest on bonds issued for capital projects. The office of financial management will manage the program's debt to ensure continued high credit quality, access to credit markets, and financial flexibility. All of the program's debt management activities will be conducted to

The (ofice

maintain at least the current credit ratings assigned to the county's debt by the major credit rating agencies and to 2 maintain an adequate debt service coverage ratio. Long term 3 debt will not be used to support operating expenses. 4 of financial management will develop and maintain a central 5 system for all debt-related records which will include all 6 official statements, bid documents, ordinances, indentures, 7 leases, etc., for all of the program's debt and will accurately 8 account for all interested earnings in debt-related funds. 9 These records will be designed to ensure that the program is in 10 compliance with all debt covenants and with state and federal 11 laws. 12 13 14

- F. Eligible applicants shall include performing arts, visual arts, heritage and cultural organizations. Eligible applicants must be financially stable and have at least the following:
- 1. A legally constituted and working board of directors;
- 2. A record of artistic, heritage, or cultural accomplishments;
 - 3. At least a two-year operating history;
- 4. Demonstrated ability to maintain net current liabilities at less than thirty percent of general operating expenses;
- 5. Demonstrated ability to sustain operational capacity subsequent to completion of projects or purchase of machinery and equipment; and
- 6. Evidence of an independent financial review of the organization.

SECTION 9. Ordinance 9279, Section 8, is hereby amended to read as follows:

There is hereby established the King County ((Arts-and)) Cultural ((Tourism and Enrichment)) Enhancement Program. program shall consist of competitive grants, reviewed annually, to arts and ((cultural/)) heritage organizations, individual

artists, community educational organizations and community arts groups which reflect the multi-cultural, ethnic and geographic diversity of King County. Applications must describe the intended use of the grant funds, and applicants may request full cost recovery. Consideration shall be given to the potential of each project for ((developing tourism related to)) enhancing arts and ((cultural/)) historic events and features in King County.

A. There shall be written guidelines and procedures for applying for grants which shall include eligibility criteria, scope of program, and funding needs. The guidelines shall be written by the cultural resources division and recommended by the executive, and shall be subject to council approval. The cultural resources division, through the executive, shall submit for council review an annual report which evaluates the King County ((Arts and)) Cultural ((Tourism and Enrichment))

Enhancement Program and accounts for fund expenditures.

B. ((Two-thirds)) Forty percent of the excess hotel-motel tax revenues allocated to the King County ((Arts,)) Education and Cultural Development Fund remaining subsequent to the allocation to the King County Cultural Facilities Program pursuant to Section 8 shall be expended for the King County ((Arts and)) Cultural ((Tourism and Enrichment)) Enhancement Program, provided that at least 20% of the King County ((Arts and)) Cultural ((Tourism and Enrichment)) Program revenue allocation shall be earmarked for heritage programs and administered by the King County landmarks commission. The landmarks commission may propose grant guidelines which reflect commission priorities in awarding grants.

C. The funds expended for the King County ((Arts and))

Cultural ((Tourism and Enrichment)) Enhancement Program shall

be used to assure the financial stability and expand the role

of local ((arts and)) cultural organizations and individuals as

artistic and cultural educational resources which develop King

County as a ((tourism attraction)) through arts and

((cultural)/))historic events and features in King County, within the intent and purposes authorized by RCW 67.28.180(3)(a)((-)), as amended. The purpose of these funds is to:

- Enhance the ability of arts organizations and of individual artists to produce and present challenging high quality art works.
- 2. Enhance the exhibits and/or permanent collections that are the unique features of the museums and visual arts centers.
- 3. Assist in providing and bringing touring programs and exhibits on the regional and national level to King County.
- 4. Improve audience development ((and arts and cultural opportunities for)), with particular emphasis on special populations, multi-cultural audiences and King County youth.
- 5. ((Provide assistance for planning and improvement of arts and cultural facilities.
- 6. Provide for preservation and restoration of cultural/historical facilities.))
- ((7)) Encourage and provide an exchange of services and technical assistance between larger and smaller organizations, individual artists and heritage professionals.
- 6. Produce special events and programs such as festivals that will highlight the region's cultural resources.
- ((8. Provide funds for arts and cultural/heritage organizations and museums to comply with Section 504 of the Federal Rehabilitation Act of 1973, as amended.))
- D. Eligibility. Eligible applicants shall include but not be limited to individual artists, arts and ((cultural/)) heritage organizations, community arts and cultural groups, community educational organizations and family and youth programs relating to ((arts and)) cultur((e))al endeavors which reflect the multi-cultural, ethnic and geographic diversity of King County.

SECTION 10. Ordinance 9279, Section 9, is hereby amended to read as follows:

The King County ((Arts and)) Cultural ((Tourism and Enrichment)) Enhancement Program shall be a separate program under the direction of the cultural resources division with input from both the King County arts commission and the King County landmarks commission.

- A. The duties and authorities of the cultural resources division shall be the following:
- Develop guidelines and eligibility criteria for the King County ((Arts and)) Cultural ((Tourism and Enrichment))
 Enhancement Program.
- 2. Submit project proposals to the King County arts commission or the King County landmarks commission as applicable for review and eligibility determination of all project proposals.
- 3. Submit project proposals for ((review)) approval and appropriation by the council.
- 4. Annually report program results to the King County executive and King County council.
- 5. Review, evaluate and account for expenditures of funds.
- B. The cost of administration of the King County ((Arts and)) Cultural ((Tourism and Enrichament)) Enhancement Program shall be minimal.

SECTION 11. Ordinance 9279, Section 10, is hereby amended to read as follows:

There is hereby established the King County Opportunity Grant Program.

A. The Opportunity Grant Program shall be administered by the cultural resources division under the direction of the King County executive and in accordance with the guidelines and policies established by the King County council. The Opportunity Grant Program shall consist of competitive grants, reviewed annually, for funding innovative endeavors relating to

((arts,)) cultur((e))al((/heritage)) and education which are not funded by existing programs. Projects may include individual or collaborative efforts, but the cultural resources division shall give special consideration to applications which reflect collaboration between any of the ((art and culture)) cultural disciplines, educational institutions and community ((arts and heritage)) cultural groups. Grant awards are intended to fund smaller and diverse organizations and activities. Applications must describe the intended use of the grant funds.

B. ((One-third)) Twenty percent of the excess hotel-motel tax revenues allocated to the King County ((Arts,)) Education and Cultural Development Fund remaining subsequent to the allocation to the King County Cultural Facilities Program pursuant to Section 8 shall be expended for the King County Opportunity Grant Program, provided that at least 20% of the King County Opportunity Grant Program revenue allocation shall be earmarked for heritage programs and administered by the King County landmarks commission. The landmarks commission may propose grant guidelines which reflect commission priorities in awarding grants.

c. Eligibility. Eligible applicants shall include but not be limited to individual artists, mid-sized and smaller ((arts and)) cultural((/heritage)) organizations, community arts and cultural groups, ((public educational institutions,)) community educational organizations, and family and youth programs relating to ((arts and)) cultur((e))al endeavors which reflect the multi-cultural, ethnic and geographic diversity of King County.

D. There shall be written guidelines and procedures for applying for grants which shall include eligibility criteria, scope of program, and funding needs. The guidelines shall be written by the cultural resources division and recommended by the executive to the council for approval. The cultural resources division, through the executive, shall submit for

1	council review an annual report which evaluates the King County
2	Opportunity Grant Program and accounts for fund expenditures.
3	E. Opportunity grants can include but are not limited to
4	endeavors that:
