AN ORDINANCE related to emergency management, assigning responsibility for it to the office of the deputy county executive and amending Ordinance 1438, Section 3 (part), and K.C.C. 2.16.030 and .060, and Ordinance 7790, Sections 2, 4 and 5 and K.C.C. 2.56.010, .030 and .040.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF KING COUNTY:

Ordinance 1438, Section 3 (part) and K.C.C. 2.16.030, as amended, is hereby amended to read as follows:

Deputy County Executive. The deputy county executive shall, at the discretion of the county executive, assist the executive in the management of all county agencies except as otherwise provided by the Charter or by ordinance. County agencies referenced in K.C.C. 2.16 shall, individually and collectively, constitute the executive organizational structure of King County government.

To assist the deputy in performing assigned management responsibilities, he/she shall be responsible to manage((τ)) and be fiscally accountable for the following administrative offices.

A. OFFICE OF FINANCIAL MANAGEMENT - DIVISIONS - DUTIES. The chief financial officer, under the general supervision of the deputy, shall assist the deputy, shall supervise the administrative office of financial management, including the management of the accounting and financial reporting systems, and the county's insurance and risk management programs consistent with K.C.C. Chapter 4.12; and shall perform such other financial duties as are delegated to him or her by the To assist the chief financial officer in performing deputy. assigned management responsibilities, he/she shall be responsible to manage((τ)) and be fiscally accountable for the following divisions.

1. BUDGET DIVISION. The responsibilities of the budget 1 2 division include: 3 a. Plan, prepare and manage, with emphasis on fiscal 4 management and control aspects, the annual operating and 5 capital improvement budgets; b. Forecast and monitor revenues; 6 7 c. Monitor expenditures and work programs, per Section 475 of the charter; 8 d. Develop and prepare expenditure plans and ordinances 9 to manage implementation of the operating and capital budgets 10 11 throughout the fiscal year; e. Monitor and evaluate the performance of county 12 13 agencies for effectiveness and efficiency through the development of performance indicators. 14 2. FINANCE DIVISION. The finance division shall be 15 responsible for the functions of general financial management 16 17 to include: a. Perform all the duties of treasurer; 18 b. Formulate and implement financial policies for 19 the county and other applicable agencies; 20 c. Bill and collect real and personal property 21 taxes, local improvement district (LID) assessments and 22 23 gambling taxes; d. Receive and invest all county and political sub-24 25 jurisdiction monies; e. Manage the issuance and payment of the county's 26 27 debt instruments. 3. OFFICE DIVISION MANAGER STATUS. Should personnel, 28 presently filling a position as manager of the budget or 29 finance divisions, have career service status, the position 30 shall become exempt when a vacancy occurs. 31 FINES AND PENALTY COLLECTION. There is hereby 32 established the fines and penalty collection section to be 33 responsible for collecting fines and monetary penalties 34 accruing to the county as a result of action taken by the 35

district court. The section shall be administered by the chief accountant of the office of financial management, and shall report directly to the chief accountant. The activities of the section shall be coordinated with the district court and department of public safety. Formal procedures shall be promulgated to ensure that such services are provided in conformance with general law and other related policies of the county.

- B. OFFICE OF PROGRAM DEVELOPMENT. The principal function of the office is to analyze long term issues. Long term is defined as having a meaningful impact in excess of the allocation of resources. Other functions of the office include:
- 1. Coordinate the executive's state legislative program with that of the council through the county's lobbyist.
- 2. Analyze and make recommendations to the deputy on issues involving more than one county agency.
- 3. Analyze and make recommendations to the deputy on issues involving intergovernmental relations among various governmental jurisdictions.
- 4. Conduct short term research evaluation assignments as directed.

C. OFFICE OF HUMAN RESOURCE MANAGEMENT - DIVISIONS DUTIES. The office of human resource management is an
administrative office under the general supervision of the
deputy that is primarily responsible for administration of an
effective personnel system for the county as mandated by
section 510 of the King County Charter; including formal
hearings before the personnel board; coordinating orientation
programs for new employees, developing and administering
centralized employee and supervisory training, and other
employee development programs; developing and administering
employee benefit programs, negotiate contracts with providers,
manage employee benefit funds, and conduct benefits enrollment
processes; and monitoring King County's payroll system. The

chief of human resource management shall be responsible to manage and be fiscally accountable for the following divisions:

- 1. HUMAN RESOURCE SERVICES DIVISION. The functions of the human resource services division include:
- a. Manage and administer King County's career service personnel system, including classification, compensation and hiring (recruitment, examination and selection), and provide professional personal service and support to employees, county agencies and, as appropriate, residents of the county.
- b. Serve as staff support, when appropriate, to other public agencies in recommending and performing personnel administrative functions related to non-career service employees.
- c. Coordinate performance appraisal and merit review processes for King County employees.
- d. Manage the county's participation in the work study program and other temporary or part-time employment programs.
- e. Develop, manage, and monitor the county's affirmative action plans and policies consistent with legal requirements to ensure equality of King County employment as required by K.C.C. 3.12.180.
- 2. LABOR RELATIONS DIVISION. The responsibilities of the labor relations division include:
- a. Advise the executive and the director, office of human resource management, on labor policy.
- b. Negotiate collective bargaining agreements with recognized bargaining agents for approval of council.
- c. Represent county interests in union grievance processes.
- 3. SAFETY AND CLAIMS MANAGEMENT DIVISION. The responsibilities of the safety and claims management division include:

- a. Develop and implement safety programs, including inspection of work sites and dissemination of safety information to employees, to promote work place safety.
- b. Administer King County's self-funded industrial insurance/worker's compensation program, as authorized by Title 51, RCW.
- provide effective direction, control and coordinated response to emergencies. The Office shall be responsible for functions as defined in K.C.C. 2.56.

SECTION 2. Ordinance 1438, Section 3(c) and K.C.C. 2.16.060 is hereby amended to read as follows:

Department of public safety - duties - divisions. A. The department of public safety is responsible to keep and preserve the public peace and safety including the discharge of all duties of the office of sheriff under State law, except those duties relating to jails and inmates which are performed by other departments of county government. The functions of the department include:

- 1. Oversee a crime prevention program, investigate crimes against persons and property and arrest alleged offenders.
- 2. Execute the processes and orders of the courts of justice and all other mandated functions required by law.
- 3. In coordination with the office of emergency management, plan and coordinate resources for the public safety and welfare in the event of a major emergency or disaster.
- 4. Provide service and administrative functions which support but do not duplicate other governmental activities, and which have the potential to be fiscally self-supportive.
- B. The department of public safety shall be composed of the following divisions:
- 1. Field operations division. The division of field operations shall be responsible for administering resources

allocated to the functions of police patrol, general criminal investigation, crime prevention, traffic, and emergency management.

- 2. Technical services division. The division of technical services shall be responsible for administering resources allocated to the functions of:
 - a. Civil process;
 - b. Fiscal control;
 - c. Communications;
 - d. Personnel and training;
 - e. Records and identification, and
- f. Property management, including evidence; stolen, lost or unclaimed property; and department equipment and supplies.
- 3. Criminal investigation division. The division of criminal investigation shall be responsible for administering resources allocated to the functions of major crimes investigation, narcotics investigation, gambling and vice investigation, criminal warrants service, and sundry criminal investigations not conducted in the field operations division.

SECTION 3. Ordinance 7790, Section 2 and K.C.C. 2.56.010 is hereby amended to read as follows:

Declaration of policy and purpose. Because of the existing and increasing possibility of ((disasters of unprecedented size and destructiveness,)) emergencies which exceed local resources, in order to ensure that the preparations of King County are adequate to deal with such ((disasters)) emergencies, to ensure adequate support for search and rescue operations, to manage recovery from such emergencies, to generally protect the public peace, health and safety, and to preserve the lives and property of the people of the county, it is hereby found and declared to be necessary:

A. To establish a county organization for emergency management within the ((department of public safety;)) office of the deputy county executive;

1	B. To confer upon the county executive the emergency
2	powers necessary for carrying out emergency management
. 3	functions;
4	C. To represent the emergency management functions of the
5	county in all dealings with public or private agencies
6	pertaining to emergency services and disasters;
7	((C.)) D. To provide for rendering of mutual aid among
8	the political subdivisions of the state within King County and
9	to cooperate with the state government with respect to carrying
10	out of emergency management functions;
11	$((\theta_{-}))$ E. To provide programs, with intergovernmental
12	cooperation, to educate and train the public to be prepared for
13	emergencies;
14	$((E_{\cdot}))$ F. To ensure that to the maximum extent possible
15	all emergency management operations of the county ((be)) are
16	coordinated with the comparable functions of the state and
17	federal government and with private agencies of every type to
18	the end that the most effective preparation and use may be made
19	of the area's manpower, resources and facilities for dealing
20	with ((any disaster)) emergencies that may occur.
21	G. To ensure coordination and cooperation consistent with
22	the provisions of R.C.W. 38.52.070, as amended, between
23	divisions, services, and staff of the emergency services
24	functional units of this county, and resolving questions of
25	authority and responsibility that may arise among them.
26	SECTION 4. Ordinance 7790, Section 4, and K.C.C. 2.56.030
27	is hereby amended to read as follows:
28	Emergency management organization - establishment. There
29	is established pursuant to state law a King County emergency
30	management organization, the operation of which shall be the
31	responsibility of the ((director, department of public safety,
32	hereafter referred to as the "director")) deputy county
33	executive. The mission of the emergency management
34	organization shall be to provide for the effective direction,
35	control and coordination of county government emergency

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34 35 services functional units ((operations)), and to provide liaison with other governments and the private sector, in compliance with an approved emergency management plan.

SECTION 5. Ordinance 7790, Section 5, and K.C.C. 2.56.040 is hereby amended to read as follows:

Powers and duties. A. The county executive, through the ((director)) deputy executive, shall have general supervision and control of the emergency management organization and shall be responsible for implementing the provisions of K.C.C. 2.56 in the event of a disaster.

- B. In performing his duties pursuant to this ordinance, and to effect its policy and purpose, the county executive is further authorized and empowered to:
- 1. Make, amend and rescind the necessary orders, rules, and regulations to implement the provisions of this chapter within the authority conferred upon him herein and in Chapter 12.52 of the King County Code, consistent with the provisions of state law and the plans of the state and federal government.
- 2. Cooperate with the state, ((and)) federal government, local governments and with other counties, and with private agencies in all matters pertaining to the emergency management operations of the county.
- 3. Prepare a comprehensive plan and program for the emergency management of the county pursuant to state law, and to submit the plan and program including but not limited to elements addressing mitigation activities, preparedness, responses to disasters and emergencies, and recovery operations to the state director of emergency management for his recommendations thereto and certification for consistency with the state comprehensive emergency management plan in order to ensure that local emergency operations are coordinated with the state plan and program.
- 4. In accordance with such plan and program for county emergency management, procure supplies and equipment, institute professional and public training programs and public

information and educational programs, manage and coordinate disaster drills, and take all other preparatory steps including the full or partial mobilization of the emergency management organization in advance of an actual disaster to ensure the furnishing of emergency management personnel in time of need.

- 5. Act as the hazardous material incident coordinating agency for King County as referenced in federal Title III, the Emergency Planning and Community Right-to-Know Act of 1986, as amended.
- 6. Coordinate preparation of disaster declarations and the appropriate documentation thereof for the purpose of obtaining state and federal relief and assistance.
- 7. Following implementation of the 800 MHZ regional emergency communications system, manage and coordinate the county's internal interdepartmental radio communications system and prioritize communications in emergencies which exceed local resources;
- 8. Following implementation of the 800 MHZ regional emergency communications system, represent the county concerning the management of the county's share of the system consistent with any interlocal agreements with other jurisdictions.
- ((5.)) 9. On behalf of the county, enter into mutual aid arrangements in collaboration with other public and private agencies within the state for reciprocal emergency aid and assistance in the event of a disaster too great to be dealt with unassisted.
- ((6.)) 10. Delegate any administrative authority vested in him pursuant to this chapter and provide for the subdelegation of any such authority.
- SECTION 6. Transitional Plan. The executive shall submit for council review and approval by September 15, 1993, a plan specifying how the transfer of the office of emergency management from the department of public safety to the deputy executive shall take place.

1	SECTION 7. Effective Date. This ordinance shall become
2	effective March 15, 1994 except Section 6 which shall become
3	effective in accordance with provisions of the charter.
