2 AN ORDINANCE making a supplemental
3 appropriation of \$150,595 to the Planning
4 And Community Development Division for
5 the Youth Sports Facilities Grant Fund
6 from 1992 and 1993 sales and use tax upon
7 vehicles used for short-term rental,
8 attaching project award recommendations,
9 and amending Ordinance 10641 by adding a
10 new section thereto.

11 BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF KING COUNTY:

12 SECTION 1. There is hereby approved and adopted a
13 supplemental appropriation of \$150,595 to the Youth Sports
14 Facilities Grant Fund, from funds received from the 1992 and
15 1993 sales and use tax upon vehicles used for short-term
16 rental.

17 NEW SECTION. SECTION 2. There is hereby added to
18 Ordinance 10641 a new section to read as follows:

- 10 b) Project funding amounts requested vs. amounts funded.

11 This report shall also include recommended measures that
12 address any shortfalls in funding of low and moderate income
13 projects.

Project Proposal: Pacific Park Baseball Field Development

Applicants: City of Pacific/Auburn Little League

Community Income Status and
Reduced Match Qualification: Low/moderate-income status by Census tract
qualifying for reduced match of 1:4.

YSFG Funds Requested: \$37,970
Match Amount: 13,796
Total Project Cost: \$51,767

Project Summary: The applicants propose to increase the use of Pacific Park for youth sports by completing construction of one baseball field and adding an additional field.

Evaluation Points: 59.3 out of possible 70

Funding Recommendation: Fund at the full amount of \$37,970. Project proposal demonstrates all elements of community involvement and secured match. Location of project is in an area lacking ballfields. Completion of the project will immediately reduce the number of youth currently on the Auburn Little League waiting list and provide a safe field for both neighborhood and greater community youth.
