ORDINANCE NO. 11825

AN ORDINANCE relating to adult use establishments, and extending the moratorium on applications for permits and licenses concerning adult use establishments.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF KING COUNTY:

SECTION 1. Findings. Based on evidence, information, documents and materials submitted to and reviewed by the Metropolitan King County Council, including the record supporting passage of Ordinance 9915, the Metropolitan King County Council makes the following findings of fact:

- A. The findings contained in Ordinance 11647, Section 1 are incorporated herein by reference.
- B. In response to the concerns evidenced by these findings, the Council enacted Ordinance 11647 to impose temporary moratoria on the issuance of building permits, the acceptance of building permit applications, the issuance of business licenses, and the acceptance of business license applications for adult use establishments and facilities. By its terms, Ordinance 11647 expires on July 2, 1995.
- C. Since enactment of Ordinance 11647, King County has undertaken extensive review of existing zoning and licensing requirements and has taken the following steps toward enactment of an ordinance that fulfills the purposes and policies embodied in Ordinance 9915 while safeguarding constitutionally-protected rights to free speech:

(1) The Department of Development and Environmental Services, (DDES) has conducted studies to ascertain the current uses of the approximately 4,600 acres in unincorporated King County which, absent the moratorium, would be available for adult establishments or facilities.

- (2) DDES has studied how best to ensure that separation is maintained between adult use establishments and the gathering places of minors.
- (3) DDES has consulted with the Licensing Section of the Department of Executive Administration and with the Department of Public Safety in an attempt to determine whether the purposes of Ordinance 9915 are best addressed by set-back requirements, by dispersing adult use establishments, by concentrating them, or by other appropriate regulation.
- (4) DDES has employed its GIS mapping system to identify potential locations for adult use establishments and facilities. Using GIS, DDES is evaluating the effects of various distance and use setback scenarios on the total number of eligible sites to achieve separation from minors and minimize harmful secondary effects while providing ample alternative channels for constitutionally protected expression.
- (5) The Law, Justice and Human Services Committee of the Council held an open public meeting on April 18, 1995, to consider the regulatory scheme governing adult use establishments and facilities.
- D. Several work items have not yet been completed by King County that must be performed prior to the council considering adoption of changes to its zoning ordinance.

(1) DDES has not yet finished its work evaluating the effects of various distance and use setback scenarios on the total number of available sites for adult use establishments to achieve separation from minors and minimize harmful secondary effects while providing ample alternative channels for constitutionally protected expression.

- executive must develop and transmit to the council an ordinance with his recommended changes to the zoning code that have been reviewed by the office of the prosecuting attorney. The executive must also notify the state of any proposed amendments to the zoning code at least sixty days prior to final adoption pursuant to the Growth Management Act, RCW 36.70A.106(3).
- through the legislative process. This process normally takes approximately 45 days from the date of introduction of an ordinance until the date it becomes effective, due to the time limits required by the county charter and council rules. The proposed ordinance is introduced and referred to a council committee for review. After the committee has acted on the proposed ordinance it is forwarded to the full council for review and action. Ten days notice must be given of the public hearing on the proposed ordinance pursuant to RCW 36.32.120(7). After council adoption of the ordinance, it is presented to the executive for his signature.
- E. The county performed substantial work necessary to develop an ordinance that will replace regulations struck down by the court in Hon's Entertainment Inc. v. King County. There is not sufficient time, however, to complete the work

to develop an ordinance, nor time for the ordinance to proceed through the legislative process prior to the 2 expiration of the current moratorium. 3 SECTION 2. Moratorium Extension. The moratoria on the issuance of building permits, the acceptance of building 5 permit applications, the issuance of business licenses, and 6 the acceptance of business license applications established 7 through Ordinance 11647 shall continue in full force and 8 effect through January 3, 1996 or until new land use 9 regulations governing the location of adult use 10 establishments take effect, whichever occurs sooner. 11 SECTION 3. Severability.
