ORDINANCE NO. 11916

AN ORDINANCE relating to the procurement of goods and services from minority and women's business enterprises; directing the Executive to take steps to further make King County's contracting and purchasing procedures fair and equitable; and calling for the creation of an experimental, pilot reserve contracting program.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF KING COUNTY:

SECTION 1. Findings. Concern that King County continue its efforts to provide a level and fair playing field for women and minority businesses seeking to do business with King County resulted in the adoption of Ordinance 11564. Among other things, that ordinance called for the Executive to find and devise ways to have King County contract with minority businesses as prime contractors consistent with their availability.

In part, that concern was engendered by the data contained in the Executive's 1993 women's and minority business enterprise report. The statistical data contained in that report is a cause for continuing concern.

The statistical data contained in the 1993 report suggests that African American, Hispanic and Native American purveyors of goods and services do not receive a significant portion of the public's dollars through contracting and the purchase of goods and services either as prime or sub contractors.

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The King County council finds that making opportunities available to women's and minority businesses serves the public interest and that the furtherance of that public interest requires King County to identify and apply appropriate remedies in advance of the Executive's recommendations on contracting required by Ordinance 11564.

The King County council also finds that an immediate step which may be taken to further the equitable distribution in the contracting of public dollars is the establishment of a reserve contracting component to King County's affirmative contracting efforts.

The department of metropolitan services uses reserve contracting for women and minority business enterprises as an effective tool in combating discrimination in the market place. Therefore, the council finds that the adoption of this contracting option is a desirable public policy tool best tested and introduced to the rest of King County government on a pilot basis.

NEW SECTION. SECTION 2. Reserve contracting. A.

"Reserve contracting", "reserve contracts" and kindred terms shall mean the setting aside of specific contracts and/or dollar amounts for the contracting by King County for specific goods and services to be provided by certified women and/or minority business enterprises through competitive procurement processes, consistent with the requirements of State and local law.

B. The King County executive is directed to immediately identify potentially underutilized purveyors of goods and services, including but not limited to African American, Hispanic and Native American businesses, as suggested by the

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executive's 1993 report on women's and minority business enterprises. The executive is also directed to begin to remedy the apparent underutilization of certified women's and minority businesses seeking to do business with King County by:

- 1. Identifying in which areas of county contracting underutilized minority and women's businesses will benefit from having both contracts and dollars reserved for them both as prime and subcontractors.
- 2. Immediately devising criteria, processes and procedures for reserving contracts to these protected groups designed to immediately remedy the underutilization demonstrated in the county's 1993 women and minority business enterprise report consistent with the advertising and bidding requirements established by both county ordinance and State statute and using the past practices and procedures of the department of metropolitan services, as outlined in Ordinance 11032, as a guide, including but not limited to the following:
 - a. identifying reserve contract goals for underutilized and certified women's and minority businesses in each area of business in which the county contracts public dollars.
 - b. devising methods for reviewing subcontracting opportunities in those instances where the county awards public dollars for public purposes to non-certified businesses.

NEW SECTION. SECTION 3. Limitation allowed. For the purposes of testing and evaluating a reserve contract pilot program for King County contracting, exclusive of the

affirmative efforts of the department of metropolitan services, the executive may limit initial efforts to implement reserve contracting to those contracts or portions of contracts totaling one million dollars or less. Moreover, no underutilized certified business meeting all of the requirements for contracting with King County, including but not limited to insurance, bonding, financing and capitalization requirements, shall be excluded from participating in any other contracting opportunities offered by King County because of participation in a reserved contract.

NEW SECTION. SECTION 4. Implementation of a pilot reserve contracting program. A. The executive shall implement a pilot reserve contracting program as soon as the council shall have approved its proposed configuration.

B. The executive shall report to the council no later than September 30, 1995 the proposed configuration for a pilot reserve contracting program and an evaluation component as contemplated in this ordinance.
