AN ORDINANCE related to economic development; providing policy direction for the phased implementation of initiatives resulting in the transformation of King County into a globally competitive community; creating a Metropolitan King County international trade expansion and economic development initiative to assist local businesses; establishing a program oversight board and adding a new chapter in K.C.C. Title 2.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF KING COUNTY:

SECTION 1. In an effort to become more competitive on a global scale, King County will implement policy initiatives in several phases to create conditions further developing its economy, while preserving and maintaining a quality environment, through trade expansion (Phase 1), infrastructure improvement (Phase II), human resource management (Phase III), utilization of technology (Phase IV); manufacturing growth and retention (Phase V), regulatory reform (Phase VI), and a regional funding strategy (Phase VII).

SECTION 2. Phase 1 initiative adopted. The Metropólitan King County International Trade Expansion and Economic Development Initiative is hereby adopted.

SECTION 3. Definitions. The following definitions shall apply in interpretation and implementation of this ordinance:

A. "globally competitive community" means a jurisdiction that puts export-driven manufacturing and manufacturing-related economic activity in such areas as the services sector at the core of its economic growth and

- B. "international trade" refers to federally defined 'wholesale trade' which includes businesses primarily engaged in selling merchandise to retailers, or to contractors, or to professional business users, or to other wholesalers, or to agents or brokers with chief functions that include re-packaging bulk goods and delivery. For the purposes of this ordinance, this definition shall also include exports; marine port and air cargo activity; investment and tourism.
- C. "small business" means companies and businesses with up to fifty (50) employees.
- D. "midsize business" means companies and businesses with between fifty (50) and five hundred (500) employees.
- E. "niche market" means a narrow segment of a larger market category.
- F. "technology transfer" means the transfer of research and development efforts for the purpose of commercialization.
- G. "foreign or 'free' trade zones (FTZs)" are legally outside a nation's customs territory and are operated as public utilities by state and/or local jurisdictions, or corporations. They are designated by the Foreign Trade Zone Board of the U.S. Department of Commerce and operate under the supervision of the U.S. Customs Service. FTZs serve to attract and promote international trade and commerce which allow imported goods to be admitted into a designated FTZ without payment of Customs duties or specific government

taxes, or without general U.S. quota restrictions which are very limited.

## SECTION 4. Findings.

- A. Metropolitan King County is a new regional government created by the voters in 1992 to provide services to its citizens on a more efficient basis and to improve the overall quality of life.
- B. The County, which includes a world class seaport, a multi-site foreign trade zone, and the Seattle-Tacoma International Airport, a well-known international passenger airport, has additional international linkages.
- C. The County also owns and operates an international airport which benefits the public. In 1928, County voters approved a \$900,000 plan to build the King County International Airport (Boeing Field), the region's first public airport for air passengers and mail service. Boeing Field presently is the largest and busiest general aviation facility in the Northwest. With both domestic and international flights, including air cargo activity, it is a designated port of entry where U.S. Customs, immigration, public health and agriculture inspection are available.
- D. As a regional funder and manager of transportation services and capital improvements, the County's ability to move people, materials and goods to domestic and international markets is a vital factor in its future economic productivity. The County is fast-reaching the point where it may have difficulty marketing itself as a good place to do business with businesses that must rely on an efficient local transportation system to move goods and people.
- E. The County has a demonstrated interest in partnerships to enhance world trade and regional economic development. In 1991, the County joined with the Port of Seattle, City of Seattle, the Greater Seattle Chamber of

Commerce and organized labor to form the Trade Development
Alliance of Greater Seattle (TDA) to promote the Northwest
region in targeted overseas markets, including our
traditional Asia Pacific Rim and European trade partners, and
as an international commercial center.

- F. The Countywide Planning Policies adopted for King County require local governments to develop strategies to support and expand "manufacturing, industrial and advanced technology" jobs. These requirements have international economic implications. For example, the County designated Manufacturing/Industrial Centers (MICs) to be regional centers for future family-wage job growth including international trade. According to the Manufacturing Industrial Council of King County, wholesale trade jobs presently (1993) support 68,070 jobs in the region generating average annual family-wage incomes of \$35,354.
- G. The County has a compelling interest in maintaining and expanding a well educated and highly trained workforce which can compete on an international level. This is supported by the King County Comprehensive Plan,

  Economic Development Policy 302 which states in part that the County should provide "leadership and cooperate in efforts to provide training and education programs that will create a globally competitive workforce." In this vein, the County has a long tradition of working with organized labor and education communities including the Puget Sound Educational Service District, the 19 public school districts, technical and community colleges, the University of Washington and Washington State University (Cooperative Extension Service), private schools and colleges.
- H. The County has demonstrated its interest in supporting and expanding "sister county" relationships.

  These relationships were started in 1977 by the Metropolitan

King County Council and have proven an essential ingredient in the establishment of business, professional and cultural ties to further King County's commitment to economic development on an international basis. The County has established two "sister county" relationships in Kaohsiung, Taiwan and Hwasong, Korea.

- I. The King County Council broke new ground by participating in a two-year Ford Foundation grant project, "Southern Africa Awareness: Building a Constituency for Africa." As part of this effort, the Council planned and hosted the first African Trade Mission of governments from that region to the state of Washington in 1991.
- J. The County participates in trade missions led by regional business and trade promotion organizations and agencies to both our traditional trade regions in Europe and the Asian Pacific Rim in addition to the new emerging markets of developing countries. The personal contact between officials and business people results in economic development and trade expansion for the region.
- K. The County has a vital interest in economic development activities which support international trade. Historically, the County has promoted local, regional and international economic development through the Cooperative Extension, farmlands preservation and agriculture commission programs; job training, the federal community development block grant and economic assistance programs, the Central Puget Sound Economic Development District, the Pacific Northwest Economic Region (PNWER) and in other partnerships with federal, state, port and other local governments. The King County Library System since the 1980's has provided an international business information service (the International Pacific Rim Collection) to assist local businesses with international trade and economic development inquiries and

referrals. The County has traditionally worked in partnership with local chambers of commerce, commercial clubs, convention and visitor bureaus as well--all to promote regional economic growth.

- The County realizes the importance of historical, artistic and cultural understanding which creates within our community a sense of pride and richness in the celebration of our different heritages. The County has strongly supported and promoted vital international arts and cultural activities which have increased our communities' visibility to the entire world. Through the County's support of the Goodwill Games and professional sports franchises, the economy of the entire region has benefited. These amenities attract tourists and convention-goers who contribute some \$5 billion to the state's economy each year.
- King County firms are creating new products and technologies essential to the emerging high tech, global economy such as software, electronics, biotechnology and computer equipment.
- The Council finds that forging a strategic trade expansion and economic development initiative, by articulating a shared vision between government and business on such a policy; by bringing together various policies and programs, would be beneficial to the economy of the region and its citizens. This compels the County to provide greater leadership on behalf of the region by promoting expanded trade and economic development activities which can be quantified through performance measurements. Specifically, the Council finds that the County needs to effectively facilitate through appropriate partnerships the development of international trade markets for small and midsize businesses both in Unincorporated areas and cities in King County.

1 SECTION 5. Policy. It is the policy of King County as 2 the regional government to provide leadership necessary to 3 provide increased opportunities for international trade and related economic development for the benefit of the people 4 5 and businesses in smaller cities and Unincorporated communities throughout urban and rural areas in the County. 6 7 This applies particularly to midsize and small businesses, engaged in or desiring to be engaged in international 8 exporting, joint venture partnerships, technology transfer, 9 10 niche marketing and related local job creation. 11 initiative addresses two issues related to trade expansion: 12 first, it is concerned with providing greater efficiency, 13 productivity and organizational purpose among the various 14 County-managed trade-related activities. Second, the 15 initiative is intended to assist businesses located in the 16 County to access markets in an increasingly complex 17 international economy. The County further intends its 18 expanded trade initiative to be complimentary not duplicative 19 of existing trade and economic development activities in the 20 Consistent with this effort, the County intends to 21 continue promotion of reciprocal cultural, professional and 22 trade exchanges, including "sister county" relationships 23 which can help to launch trade and economic development 24 opportunities between newly identified businesses abroad and 25 local companies. It is the policy of the County to measure the accomplishment of purposes of this ordinance, in part, by 26 27 means of public performance criteria by which it will be held 28 accountable.

SECTION 6. Program Management. The King County

International Airport is designated as the advocate and lead agency to implement the County's international trade expansion and related economic goals through management of contracts with the appropriate agencies.

SECTION 7. Program Description. The County intends to accomplish the purposes of this ordinance in partnership with an agency or agencies presently collaborating with both the public and private sectors to promote the trade interest of this region in domestic and international markets.

SECTION 8. Initial Goals. The initial goals of the international trade expansion and economic development initiative shall be as follows:

- Enhance and expand the global trade and business development activities for local small and midsize businesses, chambers of commerce, and cities/Unincorporated areas in the County in coordination with the King County International Airport;
- B. Manage the County's "sister county" program -ultimately expanding it to seven of the major emerging global market regions including Africa (e.g. the Southern Africa economic consortium), Asia (Pacific Rim countries including Taiwan, Korea and the Philippines), Canada, India, Israel, Mexico and South America (e.g. Argentina, Chile and Peru);
- C. Support trade exchanges in conjunction with the "sister county" program, local chambers of commerce local communities;
- Research local markets (for example provide local company profiles to verify the stability of potential business ventures abroad);
- Recommend training for local businesses concerning accessing international markets through local chambers of commerce and use of the King County International Airport for trade development. This could include matching local businesses with businesses in various foreign countries;
- Identify in cooperation with the County's agricultural program "niche markets" for locally farmed products and recycled materials to sell abroad;

- G. Collaborate with trade and economic development organizations to facilitate business development activities following outbound and/or inbound trade missions;
- H. Identify fields for potential "technology transfer" and match with local research;
- I. Explore ways of providing direct communication between local businesses in King County and potential international trade partners through technology;
- J. Facilitate exchange of "best practices" between local governments, special purpose districts and school districts with entities providing comparable services in foreign countries.

## SECTION 9. Oversight Board.

- A. There is created an International Trade Expansion and Economic Development Initiative Oversight Board, referred to in the body of this ordinance as the "board", staffed and supported by the executive through the manager of the King County International Airport.
- B. The purpose of the board shall be to provide oversight, advice and assistance to the executive and council with respect to the international trade expansion and economic development initiative, including but not limited to the following:
- 1. conduct an analysis of the region's economy to determine components related to King County's global competitiveness;
- 2. inventory the state and region's trade-related organizations to determine functions and goals in order to avoid duplicating same;
- 3. Develop a business plan. The board shall develop and adopt in cooperation with the executive an annual business plan to guide the activities of the initiative;

4. sister county program. The board shall promote, foster and publicize the sister county program as appropriate;

- 5. hosting foreign guests. The board shall advise the executive and council with regard to visits to the County by foreign guests and assist in hosting of events for such guests as directed by the County;
- 6. oversight of contracts. The board shall provide oversight to the County regarding contracts executed to implement the purposes of this ordinance;
- 7. adoption of measures to gauge the performance of contractors;
- 8. promotion of international relations. The board shall be responsible for fostering and promoting international relations. The board shall advise and make recommendations to the council and executive on participation in such international relations and programs;
- 9. report to the council and executive on an annual basis on progress addressing goals listed in the Section 8;
- 10. coordinate with other County programs and activities which perform functions related to international trade and economic development including, but not limited to the King County Library System, Arts Commission, Agriculture Commission, Cooperative Extension, Commission for Marketing Recyclable Materials;
- 11. council and executive requests. The board shall perform such other functions and advise the County on such other international trade, economic development and related matters as the County may request;
- C. The Board shall consist of sixteen(16) voting members and three (3) non-voting members appointed by the executive and confirmed by the council. Board members shall serve terms of three years as specified in K.C.C. 2.28. The initial terms

SECTION 10. Work Plan. The board shall develop and recommend to the executive and council, within six months of confirmation of a majority of its members by the council, a work plan, performance objectives and first annual budget for accomplishing the program and goals described in Sections 7 and 8 of this Ordinance. SECTION 11. Executive authorized to sign contracts. The executive is authorized to negotiate and sign contracts to achieve the purposes of this ordinance consistent with K.C.C. 4.16. SECTION 12. Severability. Should any section, subsection, paragraph, sentence, clause or phrase of this ordinance be declared unconstitutional or invalid for any reason, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portion of this ordinance.
