| 7 | PREAMBLE: |
| 8 | King County is the employer of several thousand persons. Facilities that |
| 9 | the county owns or leases are the locus for these employees to conduct |
| 10 | county business. County facilities also are open to the general public and |
| 11 | offer access to courtrooms, public meetings and county business |
| 12 | transactions. The county is charged with strategically planning to furnish |
| 13 | an adequate and safe environment for its employees, the general public and |
| 14 | the provision of county services. |
| 15 | For the purpose of effective space and facilities planning the King County |
| 16 | council makes the following legislative findings: |
| 17 | 1. King County has adopted the 1994 King County Comprehensive Plan |
| 18 | to meet the requirements of the Washington state Growth Management Act |

| 19 | (GMA). |

| 20 | 2. K.C.C. 20.12.010 states that the King County Comprehensive Plan |
| 21 | shall be the principal planning document for the orderly development of |
| 22 | the county and shall guide the provision of public facilities and services. |
| 23 | 3. The King County Space Plan is a subelement of the capital facilities |
| 24 | element of the King County Comprehensive Plan. |
| 25 | 4. K.C.C 20.12.100 states that the King County Space Plan shall be the |
| 26 | governing document in the development of all facility master plans, |
| 27 | facility program plans and CIP and lease requests for space housing county |
| 28 | agency operations. |
| 29 | 5. In 1997, the council adopted Ordinance 10259, which amended the |
| 30 | space plan and directed the executive to pursue a buttressed addition to the |
| 31 | courthouse to provide additional office space and seismically stabilize the |
| 32 | building. This ordinance also established a policy goal of reducing leased |
| 33 | office space in downtown Seattle to no more than one-hundred thousand |
| 34 | square feet. The courthouse addition was to help in meeting this goal; a |
| 35 | lease-to-own option for King Street center was approved to house all of the |
| 36 | department of transportation and the department of natural resources; and |
| 37 | the Tashiro-Kaplan building was reserved as a potential means of meeting |
| 38 | additional space needs. |
| 39 | 6. In the executive-proposed amendments to the space plan submitted in |

1998 and 1999, the buttressed addition to the courthouse was abandoned.

7. The King Street center, upon completion in 1999, was found to be too

| 42 | small to fully house the departments it was intended to house. |

| 43 | 8. In 1999, the executive proposed surplusing the Tashiro-Kaplan building |
| 44 | rather than reusing it for county purposes. |
| 45 | 9. In proposed amendments to the space plan submitted in 1999, the |
| 46 | executive describes a plan to build a new facility on the Goat Hill property |
| 47 | sometime within the next ten years. |
| 48 | 10. In separate legislation the executive also proposes moving the |
| 49 | emergency communications center to a newly constructed facility in |
| 50 | Renton and proposes numerous agency relocations and lease extensions in |
| 51 | the central core which do not reduce leased space to the desired level. |
| 52 | 11. The lack of implementation of the 1997 space plan, the executive's |
| 53 | departure from council-approved space plan policy and the county's |
| 54 | ongoing dependence on leased space in the downtown core are cause for |
| 55· | concern for the council. |
| 56 | 12. Uncertainties regarding the effect of Initiative 695 and the possible |
| 57 | need for downsizing at the county also throws previous assumptions |
| 58 | regarding future space needs into question. |
| 59 | 13. The safety of building occupants and visitors as it relates to seismic |
| 60 | stability is an ongoing concern for the council. |
| 61 | 14. For these reasons, the council finds it necessary to seek input from |
| 62 | industry experts to ensure that a prudent plan is developed for providing |
| 63 | county space and facilities. |
| 64 | BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF KING COUNTY: |

SECTION 1. Creating and appointing a county space and facilities peer review panel.

A. The county space and facilities peer review panel shall be composed of up to nine industry experts from the following areas of expertise: architecture; structural engineering; mechanical engineering; banking with a construction finance background; commercial real estate; property development; construction contracting; public facilities planning or urban design; and telecommunications with an understanding of telecommuting, remote conferencing and broadband and wireless technology, and how these are affecting and might in the future affect space needs for an institution such as King County.

The panel shall report to the budget and fiscal management committee's capital budget subcommittee.

The panel shall issue a report with findings to the budget and fiscal management committee's capital budget subcommittee by September 1, 2000, which should assess:

- 1. The county's existing space and facilities standards;
- 2. The county's existing space and facilities use, including adherence to space standards, colocation issues, appropriateness of use to facility, appropriateness of space arrangements to function, and opportunities for improved use or reuse of existing facilities;
 - 3. The county's future space and facilities needs;
- 4. The executive's proposed year 2000 space plan and the assumptions behind the plan, its conformance with Growth Management Act-mandated goals, and the county's current overall approach to space planning;

| ٠ | 5. The executive's proposal to seismically retrofit the courthouse using |

| 'dampi | ng' technology and the structural and mechanical capability of that technology to |
| succes | sfully stabilize the courthouse against seismic shocks; |

- 6. The possibility of and need for construction at the Goat Hill site or some other site, either downtown or in another part of the county, to meet current or future space and facilities needs;
- 7. Alternatives to new construction for satisfying future space and facilities needs, including more efficient use of currently owned space, the purchase of additional already built space or the use of telecommunications to reduce space needs; and
- 8. Appropriate use and protection of county-owned air rights including the potential for using air rights and rooftop surfaces to support affordable housing objectives as well as "green technologies," which reduce heating and cooling costs and provide visual aesthetics.
- B. The panel shall consist of the following members: Steve Goldblatt, Craig Kinzer, William Luria, Gary Towe, Arun Bhagat, and Brian Horman. Additional appointments may be jointly made by the chairs of the Budget and Fiscal Management Committee and the Capital Budget Subcommittee.

SECTION 2. Compensation.

- A. Each member of the peer review panel created under section 1 of this ordinance shall receive a per diem allowance of one hundred seventy-five dollars for official work in excess of six hours. A per diem allowance of one hundred dollars shall be paid for official panel work of more than four hours but less than six hours.
 - B. Members of the panel and panel staff shall be provided parking in the county

garage for official meetings.

C. Members of the panel and panel staff shall be furnished with meals when official public meetings are required to extend through meal hours as defined in K.C.C.3.24.080A.1. The meal expenses shall be limited to the per diem fixed allowance rates established by the federal travel regulations published annually in the Code of Federal Regulations, 41 C.F.R. Sec. 301 app. A.

D. Members of the panel whose primary residences are out of state may be reimbursed by the county for travel expenses to official meetings, if approved in advance by the chair of the budget and fiscal management committee.
