AN ORDINANCE related to the Harborview Medical Center

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7	SECTION 1. Findings. The metropolitan King County council finds that:
. 8	A. The citizens of King County and western Washington significantly benefit
9	from Harborview Medical Center (HMC) fulfilling its mission to provide and teach
10	exemplary patient care and to provide health care for those patients King County is
11	required to serve. HMC's mission populations include patients without insurance;
12	patients suffering trauma, requiring specialized emergency care or burn treatment; non-
13	English speaking poor; mentally ill patients; persons with sexually transmitted diseases;
14	inmates of the King County jail; substance abusers and victims of domestic violence and
15	sexual assault.
16	B. For HMC to fulfill its mission at the highest level of quality, the facilities of
17	HMC should be safe, up-to-date and allow for ease of use by patients, efficient

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functioning of the medical and support staff and appropriate access by other agencies requiring service and information from the HMC.

C. K.C.C. 2.42.080A requires that HMC prepare a long-range capital improvement program (CIP) plan that identifies facilities needed to implement its mission. The plan is to be approved by HMC's board of trustees and the county. Any changes to the plan are to be treated as amendments and are to be approved by ordinance. The long-range CIP plan was originally approved by Ordinance 8671 in 1988.

D. HMC has prepared an Operational Master Plan, published August 1999. This plan reiterates HMC's mission, describes priority programs, priority patient groups and facility needs and contains recommended capital projects. These projects are to be added to the long-range CIP plan to address the facility needs, particularly seismic and patient-bed capacity concerns. The board approved the Operational Master Plan as the amendment to the long-range CIP at its July 22, 1999 meeting and forwarded their proposed plan to the county. In conjunction with the CIP plan, the board has prepared an update to its Major Institutional Master Plan and submitted it for approval by the city of Seattle.

E. The council has examined HMC's program and facility needs, and finds that the proposed capital projects are appropriate to meet the facility needs for the period from 2001 through 2010 as expressed in the Operational Master Plan and further described by HMC staff in response to council inquiry.

SECTION 2. The Harborview Medical Center long-range Capital Improvement Program Plan, as approved by Ordinance 8671, as amended, is amended to make seismic and public safety improvements to HMC, including demolishing unsound buildings,

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constructing new buildings and renovating and upgrading existing facilities. A summary
of the capital projects added to the long-range Capital Improvement Program Plan is
found in Attachment A. The total cost for these improvements is estimated to be two
hundred and fifty-seven million four hundred thousand dollars.
