1.	AN ORDINANCE for the June 2001 public transportation service
2	improvements for King County, creating a Transit Good Neighbor
3	Program and adding a new section to K.C.C. 28.94.

6	PREAMBLE:
7	The Council intends to approve not less than 124,000 additional hours of
8	bus service in September 2001. These additional service hours shall
9	restore cancelled June 2001 service changes and shall include banked
10	service hours that were not redeployed following the introduction of
11	Sound Transit Regional Express bus service.
12	BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF KING COUNTY:
13	SECTION 1. The June 2001 addition of King County bus routes 178 and 179,
14	substantially as described in Attachment A dated April 30, 2001 to this ordinance,
15	cancelled by the executive, are hereby reinstated.
16	SECTION 2. These transportation service improvements will be implemented
17	effective June 9, 2001

	SECTION 3.	There is hereby	added to K	.C.C. 28.94 a	new section	to read as
follo	ws:					

Transit Good Neighbor Program. A. There shall be established within the Metro transit division of the King County department of transportation a Transit Good Neighbor program, which shall be implemented in cooperation with interested cities and the labor unions representing transit division employees. The purpose of the Transit Good Neighbor program is to obtain additional transit capital funds for bus shelters, benches and other passenger amenities in exchange for advertising on the shelter, bench or other amenity, and to develop partnerships for litter control.

- B. The Metro transit division of the King county department of transportation shall develop a plan, by September 1st, 2001, to implement the program that includes, but is not limited to:
- 1. Identification of cities that want to participate in this program and whose codes permit advertising in the public right-of-way;
- 2. Identification of cities, organizations and businesses that want to adopt shelters by providing funds for shelter capital costs and by assisting with litter control;

3. Development of standards for advertising esthetics on the adopted shelters, 34 benches and other passenger amenities; and 35 4. OBJECTIVES:

Provide service to new Twin Lakes park-and-ride. (Strategy C-3 Six Year Transit Development Plan 1996 – 2001, Increase utilization of existing or programmed park-and-ride lots.)


IMPACTED SERVICE AREA:

Twin Lakes and Mirror Lake Neighborhoods

SERVICE CHANGE:

Revise to directly serve the new Twin Lakes park-and-ride located at 21st Avenue Southwest and Southwest 344th Street, and discontinue service on Southwest 344th Street, 35th Avenue Southwest and 336th/340th Streets.

Revise service to operate between South 312th Street and South 320th Street via 1st Avenue South instead of 8th Avenue South.



ROUTE: 179

OBJECTIVES:

Provide service to new Twin Lakes park-and-ride. (Strategy C-3 Six Year Transit Development Plan 1996 – 2001, Increase utilization of existing or programmed park-and-ride lots.)

IMPACTED SERVICE AREA:

Twin Lakes Neighborhood

SERVICE CHANGE:

Operate a new weekday commuter route between the Twin Lakes Park-and-Ride and downtown Seattle via 21st Avenue Southwest, Southwest 320th Street, South 320th Street, and I-5.

Provide up to seven a.m. and seven p.m. trips on weekdays.

Operate through downtown Seattle in the morning via I-5, Seneca Street, Fourth Avenue, Pine Street, and Second Avenue, and in the afternoon via Second Avenue, Fourth Avenue, the I-90 ramp and I-5.
