1 AN ORDINANCE making a supplemental appropriation of  
2 \$750,000 to several appropriation units for immigrant and  
3 refugee programs; and amending the 2017-2018 Biennial  
4 Budget Ordinance, Ordinance 18409, Sections 45 and 89,  
5 as amended.

6 BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF KING COUNTY:

7 SECTION 1. This ordinance makes a supplemental appropriation of \$750,000 to  
8 several appropriation units for immigrant and refugee programs.

9 SECTION 2. Ordinance 18409, Section 45, as amended, is hereby amended to  
10 read as follows:

11 GENERAL FUND TRANSFER TO DEPARTMENT OF COMMUNITY AND  
12 HUMAN SERVICES - From the general fund there is hereby appropriated to:

13 General fund transfer to department of community and human  
14 services \$750,000

15 SECTION 3. Ordinance 18409, Section 89, as amended, is hereby amended to  
16 read as follows:

17 COMMUNITY SERVICES OPERATING - From the community services fund  
18 there is hereby appropriated to:

19 Community services operating \$750,000

20 ER1 EXPENDITURE RESTRICTION:

21 Of this appropriation, \$250,000 shall be expended or encumbered solely to  
22 contract with Solid Ground for the operation of Connect Up and Homelessness  
23 Prevention programming.

24 ER2 EXPENDITURE RESTRICTION:

25 Of this appropriation, \$5,021,835 shall be expended solely to contract with the

93 ER4 EXPENDITURE RESTRICTION

94 Of this appropriation, \$100,000 shall be expended or encumbered solely to  
95 contract with nonprofit organizations to do one or more of the following:

96 A. Develop education materials to share information about available community  
97 resources for immigrants and refugees;

98 B. Develop and provide education to the broader community about immigrant  
99 and refugee cultures;

100 C. Provide coordination with other nonprofit entities serving immigrant and  
101 refugee populations for distribution of those materials;

102 D. Provide support services, counseling and connection to other resources for  
103 immigrants and refugees; and

104 E. Track and report on hate and bias crimes committed against immigrant and  
105 refugee communities.

106 ER5 EXPENDITURE RESTRICTION:

107 Of this appropriation, \$350,000 shall be expended or encumbered solely to  
108 contract with the Seattle Foundation to provide culturally-specific support services to  
109 immigrant and refugee communities. The contract shall provide that the Seattle  
110 Foundation shall develop and facilitate a funding collaborative called the Resilience Fund  
111 to provide timely, flexible funding to address urgent needs of marginalized populations

112 disproportionately impacted by unanticipated and emerging challenges, through which  
113 those moneys shall be distributed as grants to or contracts with nonprofit organizations.

114 A.1. The contract shall require the Seattle Foundation to prepare a report to the  
115 council on the expenditure of the funding authorized in this Expenditure Restriction ER5.

116 The report shall address:

117 a. the total amount of moneys distributed to nonprofit organizations for the  
118 purposes identified in this Expenditure Restriction, by source and amount;

119 b. identification of the organizations to which moneys were distributed, by  
120 recipient and amount;

121 c. a description of the activities and services performed by funding recipients;

122 and

123 d. the overhead or administrative fee assessed by the Seattle Foundation.

124 2. The report shall be filed by January 30, 2019, in the form of a paper original  
125 and an electronic copy with the clerk of the council, who shall retain the original and  
126 provide an electronic copy to all councilmembers.

127 B. The Seattle Foundation shall work to generate additional funds to be  
128 distributed for this purpose, including by committing at least \$125,000 of Seattle  
129 Foundation moneys and working to secure funding from other private or public sector  
130 fundors. The Resilience Fund shall include a shared decision-making process facilitated  
131 by the Seattle Foundation, in which the King County executive, or the executive's  
132 designee who has knowledge of and experience with King County equity and social  
133 justice principles, shall represent King County. The executive, or the executive's  
134 designee, shall work to ensure activities and services supported by these moneys are

135 aligned with King County's equity and social justice principles.

136 The support services shall include, but are not limited to:

137 1. Customizing "know your rights" education materials in a culturally specific  
138 way;

139 2. Providing outreach to immigrant and refugee communities about available  
140 resources and options for those at risk of deportation; and

141 3. Providing resources and guidance for immigrants and refugees in  
142 communities requiring culturally specific outreach.

143 4. Providing training to nonattorneys on immigration law to accredit them under  
144 the United States Department of Justice accreditation program to represent clients on  
145 immigration matters.

146 ER6 EXPENDITURE RESTRICTION:

147 Of this appropriation, \$300,000 shall be expended or encumbered solely to  
148 contract with nonprofit organizations to fund legal defense for people with limited  
149 financial resources and in need of legal representation for issues related to their  
150 immigration statuses, who are:

151 A. Residents eligible for and on the path to naturalization; or

152 B. Immigrants and refugees.

153 SECTION 4. In administration of all contracts funded with appropriations

154 contained in this ordinance, the executive shall take all necessary measures to ensure  
155 compliance with state and federal law.


