1 AN ORDINANCE making a net supplemental  
2 appropriation of \$33,948,000 to various general fund

90 ER1 EXPENDITURE RESTRICTION:

91 Of this appropriation, \$10,000 shall be expended or encumbered solely for the  
92 executive to contract with the Evans School of Public Policy and Governance at the  
93 University of Washington to conduct an independent retrospective analysis of the impacts  
94 of coronavirus disease 2019 as described in Motion 15682. The analysis shall include,  
95 but not be limited to, the health, economic and social impacts of coronavirus disease 2019  
96 and the actions taken by King County leaders and public health - Seattle & King County  
97 to respond to the coronavirus disease 2019 pandemic and limit the spread of the virus.  
98 During contract negotiations, the executive may negotiate access to public health and  
99 executive branch leaders in order to prioritize the ongoing pandemic response. The  
100 analysis should be conducted by graduate students using publicly available data and  
101 resources and commence in January 2021.

102 ER2 EXPENDITURE RESTRICTION:

103 Of this appropriation, \$200,000 shall be expended or encumbered solely to  
104 contract with the Pike Place Market Preservation and Development Authority for the  
105 Alaskan Way and Western Access Improvements Elevator Replacement Project.

106 ~~((ER3 EXPENDITURE RESTRICTION:~~

107 ~~Of this appropriation, \$2,000,000 shall be expended or encumbered solely to~~  
108 ~~support a gun violence prevention grant program for community based organizations in~~  
109 ~~response to the COVID-19 public health emergency.))~~

110 ER4 EXPENDITURE RESTRICTION:

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111 Of this appropriation, \$20,000,000 shall be expended or encumbered solely for a  
112 relief program, administered by the office of performance, strategy and budget, to  
113 provide grants to arts, culture, heritage and science organizations that shall include, but  
114 not be limited to, independent live music venues, independent theaters and organizations  
115 that provide facilities for after-school programs. The program shall include, but not be  
116 limited to, the following requirements:

117 A. For grants that shall support projects to prepare facilities for reopening and  
118 financial assistance due to business interruptions from fewer attendees and fewer events  
119 due to the COVID-19 pandemic, grant amounts shall be based on the number of attendees  
120 and number of events during pre-COVID-19 pandemic levels compared to estimated  
121 number of attendees of future events and estimated number of future events;

122 B. Grants shall not support projects and financial assistance before the adoption  
123 of ~~((this or))~~ Ordinance ~~((Proposed Ordinance 2021-0155))~~ 19289;

124 C. The office of performance, strategy and budget shall implement strategies to  
125 ensure that the moneys encumbered in this Expenditure Restriction ER4 are awarded  
126 broadly to as many organizations as feasible and also be available to smaller  
127 organizations that may not have access to or have the resources to apply to state and  
128 federal COVID-19 relief assistance; and

129 D. The office of performance, strategy and budget shall establish a mechanism to  
130 incorporate feedback from all nine councilmembers before awarding grants.

131 ER5 EXPENDITURE RESTRICTION:

132 Of this appropriation, \$500,000 shall be expended or encumbered solely to  
133 contract with an organization that serves as a convener with entities located in the city of

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134 Seattle's downtown area and provides cleaning, safety, concierge and outreach services  
135 throughout the city of Seattle's downtown area. The contract shall support economic  
136 recovery activities in response to the COVID-19 pandemic in the city of Seattle's  
137 downtown area.

138 ER6 EXPENDITURE RESTRICTION:

139 Of this appropriation, \$50,000 shall be expended or encumbered solely to issue a  
140 request for proposals, and to manage and pay a contractor to conduct a study using  
141 ~~((aerial))~~ aerial technology to estimate fugitive landfill emissions from the Cedar Hills  
142 regional landfill in accordance with priority action GHG 3.20.4 in the King County 2020  
143 Strategic Climate Action Plan, which was adopted by Motion 15866.

144 ER7 EXPENDITURE RESTRICTION:

145 Of this appropriation, \$50,000 shall be expended or encumbered solely to contract  
146 with Crime Stoppers of Puget Sound to provide up to a \$50,000 reward to any person or  
147 persons providing information leading to the arrest and conviction of the person or  
148 persons responsible for the hit-and-run death of county employee Michael Colmant,  
149 consistent with applicable state law.

150 ER8 EXPENDITURE RESTRICTION:

151 Of this appropriation, \$250,000 shall be expended or encumbered solely to  
152 contract with a nonprofit organization that collects, tests and distributes blood to hospitals  
153 in the county. The contract shall support efforts to secure blood and related supplies,  
154 which have declined due to the COVID-19 pandemic and support efforts to expand  
155 awareness and participation in historically disadvantaged communities.

156 ER9 EXPENDITURE RESTRICTION:

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157 Of this appropriation, \$160,000 shall be expended or encumbered solely to award  
158 grants to (~~(organ transplant)~~) cornea tissue donation transplant providers in (~~(the state of~~  
159 ~~Washington)~~) King County for COVID-19-related increased costs resulting from  
160 business interruptions and implementations of COVID-19 mitigation measure to ensure  
161 continued tissue donation and recovery operations.

162 ER10 EXPENDITURE RESTRICTION:

163 Of this appropriation, \$500,000 shall be expended or encumbered solely to  
164 contract with the Andy Hill Cancer Research Endowment (CARE) Fund to address health  
165 disparities in King County that have been exacerbated due to the COVID-19 pandemic  
166 and to establish a more equitable workforce in the health care industry in King County.  
167 The appropriation encumbered in this Expenditure Restriction ER10 shall also support a  
168 report written by the Andy Hill Cancer Research Endowment (CARE) Fund, which shall  
169 include, but not be limited to, findings, recommendations and next steps identified from  
170 the work completed as a result of the contract. The report should be electronically filed  
171 with the clerk of the council no later than July 31, 2022, who shall retain an electronic  
172 copy and provide an electronic copy to all councilmembers, the council chief of staff and  
173 the lead staff for the community, health and housing services committee, or its successor.

174 ER11 EXPENDITURE RESTRICTION:

175 Of this appropriation, \$400,000 shall be expended or encumbered solely to  
176 contract with the United Food and Commercial Workers International Union Local 21 to  
177 develop a safety and health leader certificate program and to create and expand  
178 apprenticeship opportunities in the grocery industry, particularly for workers that  
179 historically have been disproportionately impacted by inequities and discrimination.

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180 ER12 EXPENDITURE RESTRICTION:

181 Of this appropriation, \$500,000 shall be expended or encumbered solely to match  
182 moneys appropriated by the city of Seattle and support the operation of a waterfront  
183 shuttle in downtown Seattle.

184 ER13 EXPENDITURE RESTRICTION:

185 Of this appropriation, \$250,000 shall be expended or encumbered solely to  
186 support activities related to updating the county's Determinants of Equity report.

187 ER14 EXPENDITURE RESTRICTION:

188 Of this appropriation, \$800,000 shall be expended or encumbered solely to  
189 contract with the Refugee Artisan Initiative to establish its new headquarters. The  
190 contract may include terms to protect public funds in the event of the dissolution of the  
191 Refugee Artisan Initiative or Refugee Artisan Initiative's future conversion out of  
192 nonprofit status, or both.

193 P1 PROVIDED THAT:

194 Of this appropriation, \$400,000 shall not be expended or encumbered until the  
195 executive transmits a fiscal sustainability plan for 2021 through 2031 for the  
196 unincorporated area and a motion that should acknowledge receipt of the plan and a  
197 motion acknowledging receipt of the plan is passed by the council. The motion should  
198 reference the subject matter, the proviso's ordinance number, ordinance section and  
199 proviso number in both the title and body of the motion.

200 The plan shall include, but not be limited to, the following:

201 A.1. A description and identification of all local services currently provided and  
202 expected to be provided in 2021 through 2031 by the county in the unincorporated areas;

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203 and

204           2. Analyses and recommendations of the appropriate levels of service from  
205 2021 through 2031 for each local service identified;

206           B.1. A description of existing funding sources and expected revenues from each  
207 funding source from 2021 through 2031 for each local service identified; and

208           2. An evaluation of whether existing and expected revenues from existing  
209 funding sources is sufficient to support the appropriate levels of service from 2021  
210 through 2031 for each local service identified;

211           C. Methods to fill any identified funding gap to achieve the appropriate levels of  
212 service from 2021 through 2031 for each local service identified. The methods shall  
213 ensure that the county has sufficient financial resources to provide the local services  
214 identified in subsections A. and B. of this proviso. Methods to fill the funding gap in the  
215 plan shall include, at a minimum:

216           1. Prioritizing the use of flexible sources of revenue to local service delivery;

217           2. Imposing funding sources authorized by state law that the county currently  
218 does not use; and

219           3. Identifying policy, land use designation, zoning and code changes to support  
220 tax revenue generation, such as increased neighborhood business or industrial zoned  
221 areas; and

222           D. Identifying of a timeline, milestones, outcomes, performance measures and  
223 reporting to the council, to achieve fiscal sustainability in the unincorporated areas for the  
224 study period of 2021 through 2031.

225           The executive should electronically file the plan and motion required by this

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226 proviso no later than December 1, 2021, with the clerk of the council, who shall retain an  
227 electronic copy and provide an electronic copy to all councilmembers, the council chief  
228 of staff and the lead staff for the local services committee, or its successor.

229 P2 PROVIDED FURTHER THAT:

230 Of this appropriation, \$200,000 shall not be expended or encumbered until the  
231 executive transmits an implementation plan on the restorative community pathways  
232 program that includes requirements specified in subsections A. through F. of this proviso  
233 and an updated implementation plan on the restorative community pathways program that  
234 includes requirements specified in subsection G. of this proviso, a motion that should  
235 acknowledge receipt of the implementation plan, a motion that should acknowledge  
236 receipt of the updated implementation plan and the motion acknowledging receipt of the  
237 implementation plan and the motion acknowledging receipt of the updated  
238 implementation plan are passed by the council. Both motions should reference the subject  
239 matter, the proviso's ordinance number, ordinance section and proviso number in both the  
240 title and body of the motion.

241 The implementation plan should be developed in partnership with community-  
242 based organizations and include, but not be limited to, the following:

243 A. A program description describing all components of the program, including  
244 roles and responsibilities of participating county agencies and community-based  
245 organizations;

246 B. The request for proposals for awarding contracts to the community-based  
247 organizations. The request for proposals shall include the criteria and selection process  
248 for awarding contracts to community-based organizations;

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249 C. A description of how services will be provided equitably to eligible youth in  
250 all parts of King County;

251 D. A description of the overall program readiness to begin serving an estimated  
252 thirty to fifty eligible youth per month;

253 E. A description of the evaluation plan, including a listing of the qualitative and  
254 quantitative data that will be collected as part of the program evaluation. The data should  
255 include demographic data on participating youth including age, ZIP code of the youth's  
256 home residence, gender and race;

257 F. Milestones for the transition of service provision from juvenile probation staff  
258 to community-based organizations; and

259 G. A progress report summarizing the first three months of the program after  
260 referrals begin from the prosecuting attorney's office.

261 The executive should electronically file the plan that includes requirements  
262 specified in subsections A. through F. of this proviso and motion required by this proviso  
263 no later than July 30, 2021, with the clerk of the council, who shall retain an electronic  
264 copy and provide an electronic copy to all councilmembers, the council chief of staff and  
265 the lead staff for the law and justice committee, or its successor.

266 The executive should electronically file the plan with requirement specified in  
267 subsection G. of this proviso and motion required by this proviso, (~~five~~) nine months  
268 after the prosecuting attorney's office begins referring cases to the restorative community  
269 pathways program, with the clerk of the council, who shall retain an electronic copy and  
270 provide an electronic copy to all councilmembers, the council chief of staff and the lead  
271 staff for the law and justice committee, or its successor.

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272 P3 PROVIDED FURTHER THAT:

273 Of this appropriation, \$50,000 shall not be expended or encumbered until the  
274 office of performance, strategy and budget transmits a study on the feasibility of a  
275 countywide basic income pilot program, a report providing recommendations based on  
276 the study and a motion that should acknowledge receipt of the study and report, and a  
277 motion acknowledging the receipt of the study and report is passed by the council. The  
278 motion should reference the subject matter, the proviso's ordinance number, ordinance  
279 section and proviso number in both the title and body of the motion.

280 The feasibility study shall include, but not be limited to, the following:

281 A. An evaluation of the various types of basic income pilots and programs  
282 currently in existence in the United States and a recommendation on the type of a basic  
283 income pilot program that will achieve King County's specific goals of reducing income  
284 inequality and centering racial equity;

285 B. An analysis on the feasibility and scalability of the recommended basic  
286 income pilot program on a countywide level;

287 C. A description of how residents would be chosen to participate in the  
288 recommended basic income pilot program to ensure equity;

289 D. Recommendations on the amount and frequency at which the county would  
290 disburse funds to participants. In making those recommendations, the study shall take  
291 into consideration cost of living in the county and the timing of when household expenses  
292 are due;

293 E. A description of how the recommended basic income pilot program would  
294 provide data that informs impacts and outcomes related to, but not limited to, income

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295 volatility, both psychological and physical health and well-being;

296 F. An evaluation of how the recommended basic income pilot program could  
297 enhance other existing countywide efforts to improve equity among county residents,  
298 such as the best start for kids levy, childcare subsidies and other programs; and

299 G. A comprehensive budget for the recommended basic income pilot program.

300 The office of performance, strategy and budget should electronically file the  
301 study, report and motion required by this proviso no later than December 31, 2021, with  
302 the clerk of the council, who shall retain electronic copies and provide electronic copies  
303 to all councilmembers, the council chief of staff and the lead staff for the budget and  
304 fiscal management committee, or its successor.

305 P4 PROVIDED FURTHER THAT:

306 Of this appropriation, \$600,000 shall not be expended or encumbered until the  
307 office of performance strategy and budget transmits three reports on progress toward  
308 addressing the civil and criminal case backlog that resulted from the COVID-19  
309 pandemic and progress on addressing new eviction cases after the state eviction  
310 moratorium is lifted. Each report shall be transmitted with a motion that should  
311 acknowledge receipt of the report. Each motion should reference the subject matter, the  
312 proviso's ordinance number, ordinance section and proviso number in both the title and  
313 body of the motion.

314 The first report shall include a baseline definition of how the backlog of criminal  
315 and civil cases being addressed with resources supported in ~~((this ~~o~~))~~ Ordinance  
316 ~~((Proposed Ordinance 2021-0238))~~ 19318 is defined in terms of the age of cases, when  
317 cases were filed and case types, or other relevant criteria, and how many cases meet the

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318 definition by case type for monitoring purposes. The first report shall also identify a start  
319 date for tracking eviction cases.

320 The executive should electronically file the first report and the motion required by  
321 this proviso no later than November 30, 2021, with the clerk of the council, who shall  
322 retain an electronic copy and provide an electronic copy to all councilmembers, the  
323 council chief of staff and the lead staff for the budget and fiscal management committee,  
324 or its successor.

325 The second and third report shall cover the periods from July 27, 2021, through  
326 March 31, 2022, and from April 1, 2022, through September 30, 2022, respectively, and  
327 include, but not be limited to, the following information from district court, the  
328 department of judicial administration, the prosecuting attorney's office, the department of  
329 public defense and superior court:

330 A. A list of positions supported by ~~((this  $\emptyset$ ))~~ Ordinance ~~((Proposed Ordinance  
331 ~~2021-0238~~))~~ 19318 for district court, the department of judicial administration, the  
332 prosecuting attorney's office, the department of public defense and superior court, by job  
333 type, the number of those positions that are vacant and the hire dates for all filled  
334 positions in the period covered by the report and the total since the July 27, 2021,

335 B. How much of the appropriation for district court, the department of judicial  
336 administration, the prosecuting attorney's office, the department of public defense and  
337 superior court ~~((this  $\emptyset$ ))~~ Ordinance ~~((Proposed Ordinance 2021-0238))~~ 19318 has been  
338 expended as of the final day of the reporting period and the total since the July 27, 2021,

339 C. For superior court cases, the number of backlog cases as defined in the first  
340 report, and the number of backlog cases resolved, by charge and type of resolution,

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341 D. For district court cases, the number of backlog cases as defined in the first  
342 report, and the number of backlog cases processed and removed from the system, and

343 E. The identification and discussion of barriers or system challenges to  
344 addressing the backlog or addressing new evictions. The barriers and system challenges  
345 could be general or specific to a certain case type.

346 Moneys shall be unencumbered in \$200,000 increments upon adoption of the  
347 motion acknowledging receipt of each quarterly report is passed by the council.

348 The executive should electronically file the second report and motion required by  
349 this proviso no later than May 16, 2022, and the third report and motion required by this  
350 proviso no later than November 14, 2022, with the clerk of the council, who shall retain  
351 an electronic copy and provide an electronic copy to all councilmembers, the council  
352 chief of staff and the lead staff for the budget and fiscal management committee, or its  
353 successor.

354 SECTION 15. Ordinance 19210, Section 19, as amended, is hereby amended as  
355 follows:

356 OFFICE OF EQUITY AND SOCIAL JUSTICE - From the general fund there is  
357 hereby appropriated to:

358 Office of equity and social justice \$1,425,000

359 The maximum number of additional FTEs for office of equity and social justice

360 shall be: 2.0

361 SECTION 16. Ordinance 19210, Section 20, as amended, is hereby amended as  
362 follows:

363 SHERIFF - From the general fund there is hereby disappropriated from:

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364 Sheriff (\$4,248,000)

365 SECTION 17. The council directs that section 16 of this ordinance takes effect

366 before section 18 of this ordinance.

367 SECTION 18. Ordinance 19210, Section 20, as amended, is hereby amended as

368 follows:

369 SHERIFF - From the general fund there is hereby appropriated to:

370 Sheriff \$7,525,000

371 The maximum number of additional FTEs for sheriff shall be: 9.0

372 ER1 EXPENDITURE RESTRICTION:

373 Of this appropriation, \$397,933 shall be expended or encumbered solely to keep  
374 the Fourth Avenue entrance to the King County Courthouse open and accessible during  
375 normal operating hours. Moneys restricted by this expenditure restriction shall not be  
376 expended or encumbered until King County has entered Stage 4 of the Governor of  
377 Washington state's Safe Start Plan included in the Governor's "Safe Start - Stay Healthy"  
378 County-By-County Phased Reopening emergency proclamations issued in response to the  
379 coronavirus 2019 disease and the King County Courthouse has returned to normal  
380 operations.

381 ER2 EXPENDITURE RESTRICTION:

382 Of this appropriation, moneys shall not be expended or encumbered for the

383 following:

384 A. To obtain, retain, possess, access or use: (1) any facial recognition service; or

385 (2) facial recognition information;

386 B. To enter into a contract or agreement with any third party for the purpose of

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387 obtaining, retaining, possessing, accessing or using, by or on behalf of the sheriff's office,  
388 any facial recognition service or facial recognition information; or

389 C. To issue any permit or license or enter into a contract or other agreement that  
390 authorizes any third party, on behalf of the sheriff's office, to obtain, retain, possess,  
391 access or use: (1) any facial recognition service; or (2) facial recognition information.

392 ER3 EXPENDITURE RESTRICTION:

393 Of this appropriation, \$20,000 shall be expended or encumbered solely for the  
394 development of a community-led, crime watch pilot program for unincorporated King  
395 County. The program should include processes for unincorporated King County  
396 residents to acquire crime watch signs and establish block watch captains who would  
397 serve as the primary point of contact between the sheriff's office and the neighborhood.

398 ER4 EXPENDITURE RESTRICTION:

399 Of this appropriation, \$25,000 shall be expended or encumbered solely to provide  
400 the city of Maple Valley with moneys for coordination of traffic control with other  
401 jurisdictions in the unincorporated areas around Lake Wilderness park for the national  
402 IRONMAN triathlon scheduled to take place on September 19, 2021.

403 ER5 EXPENDITURE RESTRICTION:

404 Of this appropriation, \$630,000 of general fund revenues shall be expended or  
405 encumbered solely for personnel costs related to the Juneteenth holiday for all county  
406 employees in 2022. The moneys encumbered in this expenditure restriction shall only be  
407 expended upon the enactment of Ordinance 19209.

408 ER6 EXPENDITURE RESTRICTION:

409 Of this appropriation, \$400,000 shall be expended or encumbered solely to

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410 support a mental and behavioral health navigator program in unincorporated King County  
411 for mental and behavioral health professionals to assist sheriff deputies encountering at-  
412 risk individuals to connect the individuals to mental and behavioral health services and  
413 treatments as an alternative to incarceration or hospitalization.

## 414 ER7 EXPENDITURE RESTRICTION:

415 Of this appropriation, \$1,050,000 shall be expended or encumbered solely to  
416 support sheriff deputies performing emphasis patrols around the perimeter of the King  
417 County Courthouse to the end of the biennium in furtherance of the 2017  
418 recommendations from the courthouse security work group.

## 419 ER8 EXPENDITURE RESTRICTION:

420 Of this appropriation, \$200,000 shall be expended or encumbered solely to  
421 support a wellness and resiliency pilot project in the sheriff's office. To improve on-the-  
422 job performance and reduce the use-of-force instances and community complaints, the  
423 wellness and resiliency program shall facilitate and provide for department of public  
424 safety employees access to health and wellness resources, such as programs to combat  
425 dependency on alcohol or drugs and mental and physical health improvement programs,  
426 as well as to provide voluntary debriefs among and with deputies and detectives engaged  
427 in high-stress work such as a rotation in the child pornography investigation unit. The  
428 program may not administer county benefits but, rather, will address the unique stressors  
429 in law enforcement and connect department of public safety employees to resources.

## 430 ER9 EXPENDITURE RESTRICTION:

431 Of this appropriation, \$248,000 of general fund revenues shall be expended or  
432 encumbered solely for one (~~non-commissioned~~) FTE position for a recruiter to support

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433 recruitment of new deputies.

434 ER10 EXPENDITURE RESTRICTION:

435 Of this appropriation, \$175,000 shall be expended or encumbered solely to  
436 support sheriff's deputies overtime costs associated with additional security in White  
437 Center and the sheriff's office response to the White Center fires.

438 ER11 EXPENDITURE RESTRICTION:

1666 with the Rainier Beach Action Coalition.

1667 ER13 EXPENDITURE RESTRICTION:

1668 Of this appropriation, \$25,000 shall be expended or encumbered solely to contract  
1669 with the Seattle Children's Theatre.

1670 ER14 EXPENDITURE RESTRICTION:

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1671 Of this appropriation, \$25,000 shall be expended or encumbered solely to contract  
1672 with the Seattle Fishermen's Memorial.

1673 ER15 EXPENDITURE RESTRICTION:

1674 Of this appropriation, \$25,000 shall be expended or encumbered solely to contract  
1675 with Seattle Shakespeare Company.

1676 ER16 EXPENDITURE RESTRICTION:

1682 contract with Three Rivers Chapter of Trout Unlimited for a milfoil removal pilot  
1683 project in Lake Sammamish.

1684 ER18 EXPENDITURE RESTRICTION:

1685 Of this appropriation, \$25,000 shall be expended or encumbered solely to contract  
1686 with Urban Family Center Association.

1687 ER19 EXPENDITURE RESTRICTION:

1688 Of this appropriation, \$50,000 shall be expended or encumbered solely to contract  
1689 with the White Center Community Development Association.

1690 ER20 EXPENDITURE RESTRICTION:

1691 Of this appropriation, \$1,455,000 shall be expended or encumbered solely to  
1692 continue support of the following existing Public Defender Association-led programs  
1693 through January 30, 2021:

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1694           A. The Co-LEAD program in the city of Burien and south King County intended  
1695 to reduce the level of contact spreading of coronavirus disease 2019 among individuals  
1696 who have committed certain law violations by diverting them from possible incarceration  
1697 and providing short-term shelter, community-based care coordination and support  
1698 services instead of processing them through the traditional criminal justice system. The  
1699 moneys provided by this subsection shall not be conditioned on referral by police or law  
1700 enforcement; and

1701           B. The Just Care program that provides funding for deintensification of existing  
1702 shelter facilities and hotel vouchers to those vulnerable populations living without shelter

1706 providers for coronavirus disease 2019 related behavioral health services as part of the  
1707 implementation of the demonstration program. The program responds to current  
1708 coronavirus disease 2019 conditions, including: (1) the reduction of congregate shelter  
1709 capacity due to the closure and deintensification of shelters in the Pioneer Square and the  
1710 Chinatown-International District neighborhoods that has led to an increased number of  
1711 unsheltered persons in those neighborhoods; (2) the reduction of hours and accessibility  
1712 to both physical and behavioral health providers for that vulnerable population; and (3)  
1713 the difficulty in accessing federal and state provided economic relief assistance by  
1714 program participants due to required closures of government and service provider offices.  
1715 The program elements include, the following: (1) providing rapid assessment of program  
1716 participants; (2) securing rooms for temporary lodging in underutilized hotels to be used

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1717 by program participants through the earlier of the end of public health emergency in King  
1718 County or January 31, 2021; (3) providing access to hygiene facilities to program  
1719 participants to facilitate compliance with coronavirus disease 2019 public health  
1720 precautions; (4) providing intensive case management for program participants designed  
1721 specifically to mitigate coronavirus disease 2019 effects and enable compliance with  
1722 coronavirus disease 2019 public health precautions; and (5) administrative costs  
1723 associated with services to program participants for opportunities to transition them to  
1724 permanent supportive housing.

## 1725 ER21 EXPENDITURE RESTRICTION:

1726 Of this appropriation, \$3,200,000 shall be expended or encumbered solely to  
1727 award grants to organizations to support emergency assistance that will address unmet  
1728 need related to or resulting from the COVID-19 pandemic. The department of  
1729 community and human services shall collaborate with council districts one, two, four,  
1730 five, six, seven, eight and nine to administer \$400,000 of the appropriation encumbered

1738 operated by cities that have received federal relief moneys in response to the COVID-19  
1739 pandemic that would be eligible to support senior centers.

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## 1740 ER23 EXPENDITURE RESTRICTION:

1741 Of this appropriation, \$500,000 shall be expended or encumbered solely to  
1742 contract with an organization whose mission is to enhance the greater Seattle region's  
1743 economy and quality of life through sports by attracting and hosting sporting events,  
1744 serving as a support system to event organizers and communities and serving as a one-  
1745 stop resource to sports teams, university athletic departments, sports venues and youth  
1746 sports organizations. The contract shall support youth and amateur sports leagues  
1747 throughout the county to resume operations in accordance with safety guidelines to  
1748 mitigate community transmissions of COVID-19.

## 1749 ER26 EXPENDITURE RESTRICTION:

1750 Of this appropriation, \$5,000,000 of general fund revenues shall be expended or  
1751 encumbered solely to contract with charitable, nonprofit organizations to provide  
1752 financial assistance to eligible clients applying for immigration relief, as well as a  
1753 contracted nonprofit organization's costs to administer and advertise the assistance. The  
1754 assistance shall be in the form of defraying the fees associated with the eligible client's  
1755 immigration relief process. For the purposes of this expenditure restriction, "eligible  
1756 client" means a person, including a person who is not eligible for federal or state benefits  
1757 because of the person's immigration status: (1) whose household income, excluding any  
1758 asset limit program requirements, would qualify the person to receive one of the  
1759 following types of state-administered public assistance: temporary assistance for needy  
1760 families, aged, blind or disabled assistance benefits, medical care services, pregnant  
1761 women assistance benefits, poverty-related veterans' benefits, food stamps or food stamp  
1762 benefits transferred electronically, refugee resettlement benefits, Medicaid or

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1763 supplemental security income; and (2) who resides, works or attends school in King  
1764 County or is currently detained but immediately before the detention resided, worked or  
1765 attended school in King County. The financial assistance supported by this appropriation  
1766 shall not exceed \$3,000 per eligible client or \$6,000 per eligible client's household.

1767 ER27 EXPENDITURE RESTRICTION:

1768 Of this appropriation, \$900,000 shall be expended or encumbered solely to  
1769 contract with the Together Center to support development of a human services hub as  
1770 part of its campus redevelopment project.

1771 ER28 EXPENDITURE RESTRICTION:

1772 Of this appropriation, \$50,000 shall be expended or encumbered solely to support  
1773 costs related to the Equitable Development Initiative, which may include, but not be  
1774 limited to, workgroup facilitation costs and compensation, if established by separate  
1775 ordinance, for workgroup participants.

1776 ER29 EXPENDITURE RESTRICTION:

1777 Of this appropriation, \$300,000 shall be expended or encumbered solely to  
1778 contract with the African Community Housing & Development to support nonpartisan  
1779 civic engagement activities conducted by the Black Suffrage Network.

1780 ER30 EXPENDITURE RESTRICTION:

1781 Of this appropriation, \$50,000 shall be expended or encumbered solely to contract

1891 support a bicycle safety and helmet distribution program. The program shall make  
1892 specific emphasis on unhoused individuals and individuals who historically have been  
1893 disproportionately impacted by inequities and discrimination.

1895 Of this appropriation, \$2,000,000 shall be expended or encumbered solely to  
1896 support a gun violence prevention grant program for community-based organizations in

2260 E. An analysis and recommendation on the establishment of a wastewater  
2261 capacity charge exemption or reduced rate for identified populations, and identification of  
2262 program considerations such as the estimated numbers of persons who may be eligible to  
2263 participate in such exemption or reduced rate, including any changes to the King County  
2264 Code or county policies necessary to implement an exemption or reduced-rate program.

2265 If the recommendation of the executive is to propose an exemption program or a

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2266 reduced rate, then the executive shall transmit a proposed ordinance to the council to  
2267 effectuate the recommendation. Included in the qualification criteria for an exemption

2291 ratepayers from commercial and industrial ratepayers; and

2292 C. A discussion of the appropriate balance of costs between the residential sector

2293 and the commercial/industrial sector in sewer rate revenues, and the criteria impacting

2294 that balance.

2295 The executive should electronically file the report and motion required by this

2296 proviso no later than August 1, 2021, with the clerk of the council, who shall retain the

2297 electronic copy and provide an electronic copy to all councilmembers, the council chief

2298 of staff and the lead staff for the regional water quality committee and the budget and

2299 fiscal management committee, or their successors.

2300 P4 PROVIDED FURTHER THAT:

2301 Of this appropriation, \$300,000 shall not be expended or encumbered until the

2302 executive transmits a status report and a final report on toxics in King County wastewater

2303 effluent, evaluating the presence of toxic elements in the effluent of treatment plants, and

2304 a motion that acknowledges receipt of the final report and a motion acknowledging the

2305 receipt of the final report is passed by the council. The motion should reference the

2306 subject matter, the proviso's ordinance, ordinance section and proviso number in both the

2307 title and body of the motion.

2308 The report shall include, but not be limited to, a summary of the results of an

2309 evaluation of toxic elements in the effluent of treatment plants. The evaluation shall

2310 comply with the following:

2311 A. The evaluation shall be based on testing of the undiluted effluent of treatment

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2312 plants, and shall be compared with chemical elements being discharged as industrial  
2313 wastes into the wastewater collection system; sampling of effluents shall be timed to  
2314 include at least one seasonal period of high winter discharge volumes;

2315           B. The evaluation shall address and report on the presence, origin, volume,  
2316 toxicity, environmental fate and impacts to the marine environment from toxics including  
2317 metals, volatile organic compounds, chemicals of emerging concern and other toxics in  
2318 the undiluted effluent of treatment plants;

2319           C. While the evaluation shall be as broad as possible within costs, to the extent  
2320 necessary to narrow the scope of the evaluation in light of the extensive range of  
2321 potentially toxic elements, the focus shall be on:

2322           1. Those elements considered most toxic to the marine environment generally;

2324           2. Those elements considered potentially toxic to Southern Resident Orcas and  
2325 the hierarchy of marine species upon which the Southern Resident Orcas depend;

2326           D. The evaluation shall assess whole effluent toxicity of the discharges, to assess  
2327 the impact of the complex mix of toxic elements on marine species. The assessment shall  
2328 be designed to indicate whether undiluted wastewater effluent represents a potential  
2329 source of deleterious toxic influence to Puget Sound marine organisms, and to Southern  
2330 Resident Orcas and the hierarchy of marine species upon which they depend particularly;

2331           E. The evaluation shall include an assessment of the accumulation of those toxic  
2332 elements in marine organisms, either directly or through bioaccumulation, and shall  
2333 discuss potential impacts on metabolic processes, behavior and mortality. The  
2334 assessment may be accomplished either through analysis of the tissue of selected species,

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2335 or through bioaccumulation modeling;

2336 F. The evaluation shall describe potential wastewater treatment technologies that  
2337 have the capacity, in part or in whole, to limit or control the discharge of toxics in  
2338 wastewater effluents to a significantly greater extent than is currently being accomplished  
2339 at King County treatment plants; and

2340 G. The evaluation shall be contracted to an entity with the capacity to address the  
2341 required elements of the evaluation. Preference shall be given to entities with a  
2342 demonstrated history of evaluating and reporting on the impacts of wastewater effluents  
2343 on the marine environment, including impacts on Southern Resident Orcas or their prey  
2344 species, and that have the capacity for modeling the bioaccumulation of toxics.

2345 The executive should file electronically a report on the status of the evaluation  
2346 project by December 31, 2021, and the final report and motion required by this proviso  
2347 by June 30, 2022, with the clerk of the council, who shall retain the original and provide  
2348 an electronic copy to all councilmembers, the council chief of staff and the lead staff for

3140 Development project request for information ("RFI") report required in this proviso; (2)

3181 the next ten years and how those revenues were calculated; and

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- 3182           3. An analysis of the benefits and opportunities provided or not provided by  
3183 each vendor response related to the following council priorities:
- 3184           a. increase the capacity and affordability for service to either underserved or  
3185 unserved areas of the county, or both, as defined in the county's 2020 Broadband Access  
3186 Study, including those residing in affordable and public housing;
- 3187           b. encourage equitable economic development;
- 3188           c. preserve or advance the potential for a county-owned broadband system;

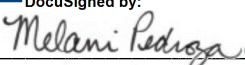

To mitigate confusion in naming convention, PSB has updated the fund name in the fund section header to be the legal name from KCC 4A.200, while the fund names in fund totals section retain the Finance/EBS names.

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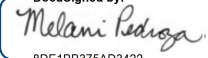
